Transforming Education in Cambodia

At the end of July and early August 2024, Apex Australia embarked on an impactful journey to Cambodia, spearheading a pivotal educational initiative through the "Teacher In A Box" program. This initiative saw the deployment of 104 tablets and 11 server units across 11 schools in Siem Reap, enabling over 500 children to access a wealth of educational resources offline.

Empowering Education with Technology

"Teacher In A Box" serves as a digital library loaded onto servers that broadcast educational content to nearby devices via a local Wi-Fi network created by the server itself. This technology allows students in remote or underserved areas to access educational materials similar to those available online, without the need for internet connectivity. The content ranges from textbooks and interactive learning modules to educational videos, all tailored to enhance the learning experience and improve educational outcomes.

Sustainable Impact


The initiative was made possible through our collaboration with Ripple Effect Rides and local NGOs, ensuring the project was not only about installation but also about sustainable integration into the educational practices of the communities. The project's sustainability is further secured as local educators receive ongoing training to effectively use and maintain these digital libraries.

APEX FOUNDATION



Your Apex Foundation has had another busy and successful year, with \$165,000 in grants made, taking all time grants to well over \$10 million. In addition, accommodation at our three facilities has provided many happy holidays worth several hundreds of thousands of dollars this year.

\$88,000 of grants were distributed to 'people in need' and various community projects from the Family Care Trust. A special mention goes to the many Apex Clubs that applied to the Foundation for grants on behalf of those in need in their communities. Apex Clubs are reminded that your Foundation can provide funding for certain community projects and are encouraged to contact us. Please refer to our website for details.

Additionally, \$5,000 was allocated to fine arts programs, reflecting the Foundation's commitment to cultural enrichment. These achievements underscore the Foundation's dedication to supporting communities across Australia.

The Apex Foundation Public Ancillary Fund continues its commitment to causes such as Children's Cancer and Melanoma, providing over \$70,000 in grants this year to registered charities. Key donations include a further \$25,000 to the Children's Cancer Institute, \$7,500 to Bloomhill Cancer Care, and \$15,000 to Melanoma Patients Australia. Support also extended to mental health initiatives, with White Cloud a beneficiary of \$3,025 for training volunteers, and \$10,000 granted to Dementia Australia for workshops in rural areas. Apex Clubs are encouraged to submit ideas for future grants, as the Foundation remains eager to support charities that are really making a difference in their communities.

The SHACK, a sanctuary for families with chronically ill or disabled children since 1992, is undergoing significant upgrades to enhance guest comfort. Located near Seven Mile Beach, the facility features new beds, curtains, and refurbished floors across its six units. New caretakers have joined to maintain the property and assist visitors, ensuring a supportive environment. The SHACK remains a vital retreat, offering families a peaceful, stress-free stay close to nature.

Apex Copper Coast Retreats in Wallaroo, established by several Apex Clubs, offers free holiday accommodation to families battling cancer. Partnered with Cancer Council SA, these five cabins are heavily utilized, providing a much-needed respite for families during or after treatment. Located near the beach, the retreats aim to create positive memories and alleviate the burdens of cancer, both physical and emotional.

Since 1979, the Magic Castle Chalet, located near Mt Kosciuszko, has been a 24-bed retreat for underprivileged and chronically ill children and their families. In celebration of its 45th anniversary, the Chalet is receiving new double-glazed windows and doors this October, enhancing the warmth and comfort of the facility. Bookings are welcomed, as the Chalet continues its mission of providing a safe and welcoming environment.

The Apex Foundation remains deeply committed to community projects, reflecting its rich history of supporting diverse causes. From sending students to youth mental health forums in Western Australia to collecting donations for working dogs on bushfire-affected farms in Eununda, the Foundation embraces initiatives both large and small. Apex Clubs are reminded that funds are available for projects, reinforcing the Foundation's dedication to fostering positive community impact across Australia.



APEX OUTBACK POSTIE BIKE RIDE

The 2024 Apex Outback Postie Bike Ride was a resounding success. This year's event took participants through some of South Australia's Gawler Ranges showcasing stunning and rugged landscapes, offering an unforgettable experience for both riders and support crew.

We're amazed by this year's fundraising total, which has now reached an incredible \$111,840 supporting the Apex Copper Coast Retreats, and Cancer Council SA. Thank you to everyone who donated for your generosity.

With this year's contributions, the total funds raised over the past 18 years have surpassed an impressive 1.75 million.

A huge thanks to First Care Medical for their sponsorship, particularly to Matt Callaway and Paul Vinar, who provided excellent care to our injured riders. Unfortunately, they had their hands full this year, but we're pleased to report that all injured riders are on the road to recovery. We extend our best wishes to them all.



Celebrating the Inaugural Charter Dinner Apex Club of Capricorn West





Starting in May 2023, the Apex Club of Milton Ulladulla, acting in support of our local teenage 'A to Z Group' (who promote diversity and inclusion within Ulladulla High School) have embarked on what we have coined the **MUCK Up** initiative – inspired by the nation-wide "Do It For Dolly" campaign targeting bullying through the promotion of positive social interactions.

The main strand of this has been the commitment that MUCK Up will help to promote inclusion and kindness across our community through the running of various "community kindness" events across 2024 and beyond. These have included events around sports, food, arts and culture where locals can be shown first hand just how wonderful it can be to interact with one another in a positive way.

Escape Room and Family Fun Day - we have formed a junior committee of year 7 aged students to help us plan and deliver certain events aimed toward improving social interactions within that age group. The first of these was to hire a mobile escape room and arrange a family fun day which saw over 100 kids come through with families on the day to work together on the escape room and partake in the fun activities we had set up including the paper airplane competition shown here

Kayaking - the funding received from Apex Foundation was critical toward this in particular and was an event which saw the formation of our junior committee who took on Apexians (and our local state member Liza Butler) in a survivor style kayaking challenge on the waters of Mossy Point - sadly the kids won but a great day was had by all and the junior committee was formed as a result.

Do It For Dolly Round - Held a 'blue' round to mark "Do It For Dolly" Day 2024 - won by the local Netball club who got right behind the initiative and were awarded \$500 for their presentation day

Chorus for Kindness: Do It For Dolly Day - on "Do It For Dolly" day itself we held our second "Chorus for Kindness" fundraiser - a pub choir style event where we sang "That's Freedom" together and raised \$1000 for Dolly's Dream and a further \$2500 toward the MUCK Up initiative

Cooking Up Kindness - Local chefs paired with teams of youth on a MasterChef style challenge cooking from a mystery box of ingredients prepared by local Apexian and chef Jonny Staples from Citrus Catering



Mural - On the same day as Cooking Up Kindness was completed we unveiled our butterfly mural (inspired by Dolly's Dream) which is located directly across from the Ulladulla High School entrance with the message of #choosekindness and the local Apex logo proudly displayed

Singer / Songwriter Workshop and Showcase - our most ambitious project of all was to bring together youth aged 12-18 to create and perform original songs at our local Milton Theatre across a weekend led by professional musicians/mentors.

We wanted to pass on how successful the initiative has been and how crucial the support of Apex Foundation and the organisation as a whole has been toward our success thus far.

STATE RECORD SMASHED AGAIN BY BARRA BASH WITH 1,400+ ANGLERS AND EPIC CATCHES!

For the second year running, this weekend's Apex Kununurra Barra Bash has smashed the State record for most entrants in a fishing competition with 1,412 anglers registering for the popular community fundraising angling extravaganza!

The East Kimberley competition has gone from strength to strength in recent years attracting all ages (more than 300 juniors), genders, backgrounds and fishing abilities with anglers coming from as far as Tasmania to participate!

And despite high tides and the odd tropical downpour, the fishing did not disappoint with 393 barra entered – five of which were over the magic metre mark – with the biggest fish caught by Ben Quinlivan measuring in at a hefty 1.085m.

The comp, supported by a Recfishwest community grant, also had 207 catfish entered – one measuring 1.1m falling to Kelly Ejai – along with 136 sooty grunter.

The awards ceremony was filled with excitement as local lad Harry Flatt won the 4.18m Seajay Creek Masta with a 30HP Suzuki engine, while Susan Swan claimed a luxury three-night stay at Kimberley Coastal Camp for the mystery barra prize. A Quadbike and other great prizes added to the draw, with the modest entry fee of \$60 for seniors and free for juniors, making it a hit for fishing families.

Organiser Aaron Macnamara credited the event's success to the high-quality competition and fantastic fishing on offer. "We're thrilled to have smashed the record with 300 more entrants this year," he said. "It's become a destination event with participants from across the country including Broome and the NT and as far away as Tassie. The Lower Ord and the lake are fishing brilliantly, offering plenty of great, accessible spots for anglers."

"It's a really great event for the town and we've got to thank our incredible sponsors. As our main fundraiser for the year, the event growth has meant we've been able to donate more than \$75,000 to the community over the last couple of years from the proceeds of entry fees, shirt and food sales – so it's a win-win-win for everyone."

Recfishwest CEO Dr Andrew Rowland praised the Apex team for their efforts, highlighting the event's role in supporting regional communities and the benefits of the long-running barra stocking program in Kununurra. "The Barra Bash keeps getting better and shows how vital fishing is to Kununurra. Long may it continue!"
