## NATIONAL PRESIDENT REPORT

My year as National President, while challenging at times, was a great year and I would like to pass on my thanks to all the members for your support during my term and hope that you were able to achieve the successes you had hoped for. Unfortunately, because of Covid I was unable to get to all the Clubs and events that I committed to but hope to still get there when I can.

At the close of nominations for National Board not all positions had been filled and I would like to thank everyone who came on board to help and work as part of a team with the Association and its members as the core focus of the challenges ahead. I truly admire the honesty and integrity of the Board members and thank them for their commitment to keeping a high standard of governance as well as transparency and openness to all members.

The National Convention was held on the beautiful Yorke Peninsula in South Australia. Hosted by the Kadina Club it was a great time that showcased Kadina and Wallaroo and brought together members from all around Australia as well as those from various overseas Associations. The event ran very smoothly, and everyone was made to feel welcome, and we thank the members for all the hard work that went in to make it happen. One member of the host Club describing it as *"the best Convention of all time"*. Delegates committed to supporting Lifeline through the Bairnsdale's Clubs proposal. A subcommittee was also set up to assist Clubs with increasing membership in the 20 for 20 program. Members at the convention walked from Kadina to Wallaroo in recognition of 50 years since Apex Australia Members walked a lap of Australia raising money and starting the Autism Trust. Neil Sawley was inducted as a Life Governor of the Association, a title well deserved, and we thank him for his ongoing commitment to all things Apex.

The Apex Magic Castle celebrated a milestone with the 40-year anniversary being marked a week after the Convention. It is estimated that around 40,000 people have experienced the Magic Castle over that time. Thankfully, the Castle survived the bushfires earlier in the year and will be around a bit longer to continue sharing the Magic with many more. If you are interested in going to the Magic Castle or wish to donate, please contact Jamie Vincent (Apex Club of Blacktown). It is well worth the visit and truly a magical place.

The Apex Foundation AGM was held in Sydney with Tony Wilshire being duly elected and taking over as Chairman. Tony is a long-time member of the Foundation and with his board is committed to working with the National Board and continue working together for the benefit of both organisations. The Foundation is also committed to

working with Clubs, and assist where possible, those in genuine need within your own communities. I thank Tony for all his help, commitment, and support of his board over the year. It was great to see firsthand all that the Foundation accomplishes.

Summer saw one of the worst fire seasons Australia has experienced for some time. Considering this, the Apex Foundation challenged the Association to create an appeal and raise \$25,000 and they would match it. Everyone chipped in to help, from business's to kids wanting to donate the money they had worked hard for. Donations not only came in from all over Australia but also our overseas Apex nations helped with some generous donations, despite themselves facing Natural Disasters of their own. In the end just over \$32,000 dollars was raised and, with the Foundations commitment, over \$57,000 was disbursed back through Apex Clubs to directly assist Communities that had been so severely affected. Our thanks go out to all who donated and made a difference.



The first weekend in March was the annual Apex WA State Catch-up weekend. Hosted this year by Manjimup in the beautiful South West region. The National Board committed to connect with members in the West as it had been quite some time since a Board had journeyed West. This was a great opportunity for the National Board to meet with the members from the

West and discuss face to face all things Apex. Tony Wilshire once again attended a catch-up with the focus of continuing to work with Clubs and promoting help available through various Foundation grants. The WA catch-up weekend is open to everyone and not just WA members, dependant at this time of Covid travel restrictions.

The Covid issue was something we did not fore see. The overall impact both here and abroad is huge. It has led to several events needing to be cancelled, including the 2020 National Convention, to be held in Perth. The National Board has tried to soften the impact on Clubs by funding two drawdowns from reserves with the situation being monitored there on. Clubs that were financial still had the opportunity to fund their commitment to the Association. It is still unknown how long this situation will last but we are committed to ensuring the safety of our members and continue working towards being prepared for our eventual reopening of borders and coming together in Fellowship.

A work party was planned for around Easter to build a Day Care Centre working with Apex Club of San Pablo City, the Apex Women's Club of San Pablo City and members of Apex Australia. It was due to take place around Easter and in conjunction with the Philippines national convention. Unfortunately, with the Covid crisis evolving it was decided to put this project on hold, but still commit to the

project when possible. A lot of work from members of the National Board and the Apex Clubs in the Philippines has gone into this project and I thank you for this work. If you wish to get onboard with this project, please keep an eye out for info on Apexian magazine or Apex Australia Facebook page as the Covid situation changes.

Apex Australia had representation to most overseas Conventions where possible. We attended The Philippines, Singapore, Malaysia, and India. Unfortunately, we were unable to get to Bangladesh due to the bushfire disaster we faced at the time. I would encourage members to travel to overseas conventions as well as taking the opportunity to host visiting overseas members as much can learned by working together and building a greater understanding of each other.

As the uncertainty continues, I would ask all members to be patient and have understanding as we go forward. There will be an end to this pandemic, and we need to be ready for it. I look forward to a time when we can come together again to discuss the business of the Association and get together in genuine fellowship. I personally thank you for your commitment to the Association and its Ideals, I encourage you to get the most out of Apex and take on a higher role or to go out and visit another Club. Whilst the Perth Convention has been cancelled please consider getting along to Bundaberg in 2021 as National Conventions are always fun.

I would like to wish Bethany and her Board all the absolute best for your year and may it bring it all that you expected. Your greatness is not what you have, but what you give, and I know together you all will be able to achieve great things.

Finally, I would like to thank my wonderful wife Melinda for your support over the last twelve months. No stranger to all things Apex I hope you enjoyed the journey and had fun along the way, and I thank everyone for making us feel welcome as we travelled around this great association.

## NATIONAL SECRETARY REPORT

### Secretary:

It has been a challenging year as National Secretary. Preparing agendas, minutes, letters, forms, and AGM documents, I have bombarded various board members with countless questions, battled with my OCD tendencies and stayed up way past my bedtime on far too many occasions, however I have learnt so much about the National Board and Apex and it has been a fantastic learning experience. My parting words from this role is 'Get your reports in on time!'.



### Social media:

I have thoroughly enjoyed my role as the Communications Director for Apex over the past two years. In my first year, our Facebook followers doubled from 630 to 1,413, and in the past year, our followers have doubled again to over 3,000 followers, resulting in a 476% increase in followers since commencing the Communications role in 2018. When I started the role, our Facebook page had a total of 29 posts in the history of the page, in the past 2 years I have done over 600 media social posts. The combination of increased followers and posts has meant that we now regularly reach between 2,000 to 7,000 people on a daily basis. Consequently, we are reaching a high number of members and non-members, and are marketing our organisation to a wide range of potential new members.

Moreover, social media has been an effective method of documenting award winners, promoting National Projects and sharing fundraising and social event ideas. Through Social Media, we have celebrated the great work of Apex Clubs amongst our Apex members and supports from within Australia and overseas. The inter-club support and positive comments have been heart-warming. The positive content markets Apex as a fun and social organisation, and explains to the wider public what Apex is all about.

Membership of the 'Apex Australia Members' is more selective, with screening questions in use. The purpose of this group is for current Apexians to communicate with each other, as opposed the Apex Australia Facebook Page, where content is exclusively posted and managed by the Apex Australia Board. Although there are occasional negative comments from a small group of individuals, posts and comments by members have most often been very positive and informative.

Our Instagram and Twitter accounts are important, however are slightly more challenging to use due to word limits and hashtag requirements, and are arguably less effective in engaging with members of the public compared to Facebook. Nevertheless, use of Instagram and Twitter is certainly worth expanding in the year ahead.

### Website:

Following last year's reskin and restructure, our Website still requires some fine tuning, but it is a vast improvement on our previous website, and continues to give us a fresh, contemporary, and functional website to represent our Association.

### Summary:

- Kadina Convention was a success. Unfortunately the 2020 Convention needed to be cancelled.
- We increased the member and club fees.
- The last of the marketing grants were funded.
- Mick instigated the wonderful thought of raising funds to support bushfire affected areas. Apex Australia along with the Apex Foundation raised over \$50000 that were distributed to numerous fire affected districts.
- Covid hit with a vengeance early in the year affecting the fundraising opportunities for clubs. As a result the National Board supported clubs financially by waiving the final drawdowns for the 2019/20 financial year.
- The National Board minimised expenditure to support clubs with the waiver.
- A substantial saving was made due to the lack of international travel.
- Our finances are looking good.

- Our bookkeeping process is moving from Reckon to Xero.
- To enable Regional Communicators and the Regional Communicator Coordinator to travel to, support struggling and charter new clubs we have increased this area of the budget and look forward to witnessing the progress.
- With Covid continuing to impact our world our budget, processes, expenditure and income will need to be flexible.

Apex Australia has a great existing relationship with Inology who have been supporting Apex over many years with their hosting of the National Website. The new database platform is currently in Beta testing and it is hoped that we can start rolling this out to clubs in the new year. For hopefully the last year the board has decided to undertake a census with the vision of importing current data into the new database. Early indicators are very favourable that the new database will function better, faster and with fewer bugs than its predecessors.

## IPNP/INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS REPORT

Our National Convention in October 2019, hosted by the Kadina Apex Club, seen representation from Bangladesh and the Philippines including the Apex Global Chair. With great reports filtering back on what was a successful and professional weekend, some great lessons and experiences taken back to the respective Apex Countries. Something this Board and all previous Boards strive to achieve with our overseas delegates.
