Eric Hooper was our Associations first President, a charter member of the first		
Apex Club in Geelong and was present at the inaugural meeting of the young		
men's organisation on 19th November 1930 when the idea of Apex first

He was subsequently on the first Geelong Apex Club Board when it formed on 10th March 1931. In 1932 in Geelong at the second Apex Conference and the		
first as the Association of Apex Clubs, Eric Hooper was appointed as the first		
Association President for the 1932-33 year.		
In recognition of the excellent services he rendered to Apex, he was		
appointed the Association's first Life Governorship in 1936. This Award was		
named in his honour as our first Association President and one of the true

He was instrumental, with his peers in the commencement of Apex Sri Lanka, and was awarded Life Membership of the Griffith Apex Club in 1974. Infortunately, Don Mackay is better known for his mysterious disappearance of July 1977, a result of being named in court as an informant in relation to the location of a drug crop in 1976. He was never seen again. Don Mackay ras one who stood against the tide of those that produced and sold drugs to
o ci p	ur children. When he saw a wrong, he tried to make it right. He was not utspoken, but he was a competent, effective speaker, a concerned, active tizen and devoted family man that worked tirelessly to assist those he erceived to need a hand.
o tr ai d	on Mackay through his untimely disappearance in 1977 inspired the model f integrity all Apexians should hold dearly. He worked for his community prough active citizenship living a simple life of altruism out of genuine care and concern for his fellow citizens because he believed he could make a ifference, and by sharing his dreams with others he knew they would experience this too.

Young Apexian of the Year – In memoriam of Sir John Buchan As one of the three founders of Geelong Apex, and a prominent figure in the subsequent formation of the Association of Apex Clubs, the name John Buchan is synonymous with our history. At the second Convention held in Geelong in 1932 the Association was formed and John Buchan was appointed as Association Secretary-Treasurer. He was National President in 1935 and was awarded Life Governorship in
1945. Sir John Buchan was a strong advocate for youth both in his days as an Apexian and beyond. He served on numerous National forums to discuss youth related issues and was influential in the restructure of the Apex Association in the 90's. He was a visionary and saw our Association as one that had an important part to play in Australia's future. In a recent letter to the National Board from Sir John Buchan's daughter, Deb Buchan, she describes how he founded <i>The National Committee for the</i> <i>Development of Youth Employment</i> 1984 – 1986 which led to several
successful state and national initiatives, including a national forum that led to 25 recommendations being presented to the Prime Minister of Australia as well as every State and National M.P. Sir John Buchan viewed the role of youth as vital for Australia and this award named in his honour, recognises the achievements of the young men and women in Apex. Nominees

Stephen Woodgate – Traralgon Apex Club
Stephen has been a member of the Traralgon Apex Club since 2018, filling the positions of Commissariat, Social Director, Vice President, Secretary and Raffle Coordinator.
He has always been keen to put his name forward for any roles and turned up to all events that he could. He is also a keen volunteer with the SES and has been undertaking additional fundraising for his Relay for Life Team for the 2nd year running. Congratulations Stephen
Apexian of the Year - in memoriam of Ewen Laird The greatest achievement any Apexian can make is that of service to their community, their Club and to themselves. Ewen Laird, was one of those people.

As part of the developing Club, he served on the Committee of the initial Young Business Men's Club soon to evolve into Apex. It was Ewen's imagination and forethought that developed the symbol we wear over our hearts today: the Apex symbol. The first meeting of Apex Victoria held on 26th July 1931 adopted a coat emblem designed by Ewen Laird as the official badge. Consisting of a triangle enclosing five rays of the rising sun it symbolized the rising generation of youth with the base of Citizenship and sides of Fellowship and Service. It was Ewen Laird's imagination and dedication that led us to where we are today.

Awarded Life Governorship in 1945, Ewen Laird remains as one of the three fathers of modern Apex. This award is dedicated to his memory and presented to an Apexian who symbolizes what our Association strives for. It is presented to an Apexian who upholds all that was first developed by Ewen Laird and Buchan and Proud, one who upholds the Ideals of Apex and serves their Club and community in an exemplary manner. **Nominees**

Preamble/Introduction

Give to Keep the Gribbo Spirit Alive

Hello Apexians,

I am writing to you all to put forward an Apex Australia National Project for the 2021-2022 that fits in with the ideal of Building Better Communities, this project should cost the Association a minimal amount of money as I would think the parties that we are raising awareness for would be able to supply all pamphlets etc.

This Project is named after the 2000 – 2001 National President Steve Gribbin who passed away on the 29th of February 2020 Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia (ALL), Steve was an inspirational Apexian who gave everything his all no matter what people thought of the idea. He also was a great support and role model for me during my term as National President.

The project will promote organ donation through Donate Life Australia, an organisation for which Steve was a community volunteer doing media interviews, promotion of organ donation, donor registration and education through telling of his own transplant experience. In addition, the project will also promote blood and plasma donation through the Red Cross. Due to Covid19 the Blood Bank is

experiencing record downfalls in donations and as a community group we should be leading the way. Apexians will be encouraged to record their donation as a donation for 'Apex Australia', so that statistics can be gathered nation wide.

It is of my belief if we contacted both Donate Life and the Red Cross that they would be more than willing to get someone to record an interview to help the National Board promote the project to the clubs.

The project would require each club to hold one donation information community session in conjunction with Donate Life and the Red Cross during Donate Life Week 2022 as well as hold 10 stalls throughout the year promoting the awareness of both organisations. If the associations gets 2,000 extra donors to match the year that Gribbo was our National President that would be an awesome result but even just one person signing up is a great result because that is one person who will save the lives of people within the communities where our Apex clubs operate.

MOTION 7 - NATIONAL PROJECT BEAR COTTAGE - ALBURY APEX CLUB

Preamble/Introduction

Bear cottage was built entirely from community support in 2001. The facility was an initiative of the Westmead Children's Hospital in Sydney providing respite, support, and end of life care for children with life limiting conditions. Unlike most hospital facilities, Bear Cottage aims to provide a more home like environment for children and their families.

The facility provides specialised therapy assisting the children from art, music to social work, they provide special camps allowing families to spend more time together during treatment and more therapeutic facilities based around children's needs.

Goals of Bear Cottage:

- To give the best care possible to these special children
- To provide temporary respite care to give families a much needed break.
- To develop rapport and provide support to families as their child's condition progresses.
- To provide end-of-life care and bereavement support, sensitive to the needs of the individual families.

Facilities Include:

- Individual children's rooms
- Family suites
- Multi-sensory room
- Sensory garden
- Beautiful gardens with ocean views
- Spa
- Multi-media/games room
- Wheelchair accessible play areas
- Parent's retreat and quiet area
- Commercial kitchen and dining room
- Clifton Gardens -end-of-life room

Same as the Apex Magic Castle, Bear Cottage was established by community support to provide hope for disadvantaged and vulnerable children.

Fundraising Suggestion - 200 Club

Event Summary

A 200 Club is a social event aimed at fundraising for a set cause. It is a ticketed event based around sales. A 200 club would be set for 200 guests where a 300 club would be set for 300 guests, all depending on sales capability. The ticket includes a bar tab, barbeque lunch and a chance to win the major cash prize. For the major prize, the ticket holder does not have to be in attendance to win, allowing for more profits due to a smaller catering fee. To make maximum profit from the event, the host would need at least 3 months of sales and keep a ticket book register to monitor sales from the ticket book holders.

Apex Options

For Apex Clubs to host a 200 Club there are two options to consider. One is to host the event at a licensed venue, where a bar tab would have to be monitored throughout the event and meals would have to be catered for within budget affecting profit to the event. The second option would be Apex Clubs host the event in their own space needing to apply for a temporary liquor license (exemptions available) and follow liquor and gaming state laws. The club would be able to cater meals on the day based on attendance and run their own bar facility allowing smaller costs of liquor.

Cost and Run Sheet

To determine the cost of the event would be based on the size of the event and the capability of the club to make sales. An Apex club of 15 members would be more suited to a 200 club selling tickets at \$50.00 than a football club of 150 members selling 300 tickets at \$100.00. The prize money and catering cost would also vary based on what the club decides to offer. I have provided a previous budget based on a 200 Club held at a licensed venue, which after hosting the event still made

over \$3000.00 profit in a day as it was not a sold-out event. To cater for the bar, only beer, wine and soft drink were available.

200 tickets @ \$50.00	\$10000.00
Printing @\$50.00 (full colour, perforated) = 1 ticket	-\$50.00
Cash prize @ \$1000, \$250 & \$100 = 27 tickets	-\$1350.00
Bar tab @ \$3000.00 = 60 tickets	-\$3000.00
Lunch @ \$1000.00 = 20 tickets	-\$1000.00
Total Profit	\$4600.00

Based on this budget, the event is profitable after selling 108 tickets.
