"We had people come up from the Hunter Valley, Narrabri, Tamworth, all around. I think there were a couple from Newcastle who came up."

Hotel manager Zac Wheatland said the numbers were higher than last year and there was a great atmosphere.

"Everyone was yelling and cheering every race," he said. "It was something different and everyone could bring their kids along. "It was a better event this year and I can only see it getting bigger from here."

Ms Wilde said the funds would be used for the benefit of the community and the club was currently looking for suggestions for their projects in 2017.

"We've put a call-out to the Gunnedah community on ideas for what they think we should do next. Is there something that we're missing or we need?," she said.

Northam

The fundraiser was organised to help the family of 10-year-old Chloe with associated costs of the illness including travel to and from Princess Margaret Hospital.

Roma & Toowoomba

THE Apex Clubs of Toowoomba and Roma have come together to help the family of a three-year-old boy with a rare brain ailment. Myles Rauchle developed a brain abscess which now requires regular treatment and monitoring at the Lady Cilento Children's Hospital in Brisbane.

For the Roma-based family that required a three-day trip which proved not only stressful for young Myles, but took his mum Rebecca Rauchle away from her other three children. "Myles doesn't travel well so what is normally a four-hour trip from Roma to Toowoomba takes five hours," his mother said.

"I've clocked eight to 10,000km in the past six months."

Apart from the stresses of the travel, it was also a financial burden on the family.

So, the Apex Clubs of Roma and Toowoomba banded together to resettle the family in Toowoomba.

The Apex Club of Roma covered the cost of removal vans to transport the family's furniture and goods to their new home in Toowoomba where the Apex Club of Toowoomba members helped settle them in. The House Call Doctor group also came on board and will organise Rebecca and Myles' trips to and from Brisbane from now on, saving the family that added cost.

"Without them (Apex clubs) we wouldn't have made it down here yet," Mrs Rauchle said as she moved her family into the new home in Toowoomba. "Myles and Zanda (4) are here with me but Braiden (7) and Skyla (10) are still in Roma but they will come down here to be with us later in the week.

Mrs Rauchle said there was no long-term diagnosis for Myles at the moment but he required MRI scans every three months and a visit to the neurosurgeon every six to eight weeks. "He had his first surgery on October 2 to drain the abscess and he was started on IV antibiotics. "Three days later they operated to remove it and he was in hospital for six weeks on IV antibiotics.

"He had a shunt put in to help drain it because his body can't do it. "Just looking at him you wouldn't think there is anything wrong but he struggles with some things like even walking up stairs."

Busselton

The sun was shining down for a beautiful start to Busselton Apex's first attendance at Busselton Relay for Life, providing service in raising funds for Cancer Council.

Alec, Cassie and her son Tyler, set up the tent and prepared for the

Including our families in fellowship, Liv entertained her Dad Dunk/Allen for a stroll around the 500m corse, whilst Mum Jen, ran a few laps to push up our lap total. Thanks also to Amy for her effort in running laps while Tim slept in the Apex tent. Paul was definitely the trooper who put us to shame and not to forget the mini Blackford clan that kept the tally board up to date and honest. 264 was our final tally.

11am and the 24 hour relay had come to an end. We may not have

taken out the most laps but we did manage to pick up the award of best baton, all thanks to Donnetta and her family. Congratulation to everyone that made this event one to remember. As some of you may or may not know: Over 40 years ago the Overseas Bursary Scheme was set up to assist Filipino students complete their high school and university educations. The Bursary is still running today in the Philippines and has also been further outreached to our neighboring and newest Apex Nation, Indonesia.

The Indonesia Bursary is slightly different, although arguably will assist more young people. The Bursary involves sending an Australian over to Lombok to teach English. Past WA & National President Kate Huth is currently in Lombok as part of the inaugural Bursary.

In early July Kate's tenure will be over and currently there are no funds to send another Australian to teach in Lombok. The budgeted cost for each six month tenure is \$6500.

I urge you all to consider contributing to this wonderful project. Ways this could be done is to promote the Bursary to local businesses, visit local schools and share with the LOTE department or have your Apex club make a donation.

WHAT IS THE BURSARY SCHEME?

The Overseas Bursary Scheme is an initiative of Apex Australia. It originated 42 years ago by Australian sponsors assisting Filipino scholars to complete high school and University. We believe that knowledge is Power and that the greatest gift an individual can be given is Education.

WHAT IS APEX?

Apex Australia is a Service organisation for 18-45 year olds. Apex celebrates 85 years of working in our community and there are now seven other Apex countries worldwide. The partnership between Apexians in different countries is the key to our Bursary success.

IS THIS NEW?

The Bursary Scheme has been running for 42 years in the Philippines. 2017 will be the inaugural year of the Bursary Scheme operating in Lombok, Indonesia.

HOW WILL THE LOMBOK PROGRAM OPERATE?

Australian teachers will apply for a 6-month tenure to volunteer as an English teacher in a high school in Mataram, Lombok, Indonesia. The school, SMP20, is on the Southern Side of the Capital city and draws a large percentage of its students from rural farming families.

Apex Australia through sponsorship from Apex Clubs, individuals and corporations will cover the teachers' air fares, medical insurance and basic living expenses.

The teacher will experience living in a local community, learning the local language and culture, whilst teaching English in a school of approximately 500 students and staff. It has been identified that the real benefit is learning pronunciation from a native English speaker.

For Indonesians, learning English opens so many opportunities for employment, especially in tourism.
