# Apex Clubs Working with our Apex Foundation to benefit our communities



Apex Busselton have worked in partnerhip with the Apex Foundation and a young boy's social worker to benefit a local family in need. Parents of Ziggy, Ryan and Ruby Howell plan to purchase a new Kia Carnival with the funds raised.

Their five-year-old son is one in 18 people around the world living with Vici syndrome – a severe, neurodevelopment, progressive disorder caused by a mutation in the inherited EPG5 gene. The disorder would affect Ziggy's motor development, vision and hearing.

His upper airway secretions would require frequent suctioning, he would suffer from seizures and be dependent on a feeding tube.

There is no cure but the couple said their son's condition would be treatable. Through the Apex Foundation WA Civilian Widow's Trust a donation of \$20,000 has been secured. "The car would assist us with taking Ziggy to school and picking him up everyday, doctors appointment which can occur up to three times a week and when he's in and out of hospital," Mrs Howell said.



#### WHAT IS THE APEX FOUNDATION?

"Heart of a community, Hope of a Nation"

Apex Foundation improves the quality of life of Australians who have special needs. The main beneficiaries are children – Australia's future.

The Apex Foundation achieves this by managing various Trusts established as a result of successful nation wide fundraising schemes by Apex Clubs.

The Foundation is also responsible for the distribution of annual grants to the beneficiaries of the various Trusts within Apex Foundation, as well as ensuring that the grants are used in accordance with the various trust deeds.

One of the principal ideals which the Apex Foundation has adhered to over its history, is the principle that the success of any project depends upon community support at all levels. They have, therefore, not relied upon government funding for the success or continuation of any projects.

#### WHAT DOES THIS MEAN FOR APEX CLUBS?

A number of trusts can make distributions to worthy causes that your club wishes to support. Chief among these is the Apex Necessitous Circumstances Trust - see next page.

Clubs in NSW, Qld and WA can also apply for help through the Civilian Widows Trusts. Examples of successful partnerships between the Foundation and Apex Clubs in all 3 states can be found in this Apexian.

#### **APEX ROMA**

Matthew Russell climbed up onto a make shift stove top (as the family were renovating their kitchen), and pulled over a saucepan, with boiling water pouring onto Matthew resulting in third degree burns to 18 percent of his body.

Matthew's Mother, Cindy, cooled Matthew down by showering him in cold water for well over half an hour until paramedics arrived.

This act (stated by medical staff) saved his life.

Matthew needed an air conditioner in every room he will be living in whilst recovering in his family home in Yuleba. The Russell family are battling financially but are proud people, never asking for help.

The Roma Apex Club received letters from the Yuleba Community stating the financial strain this accident has caused the Russell Family. This financial strain will continue to burden the family as Matthew grows and needs constant appointments with medical staff in Brisbane.

The Roma Apex Club wrote to the Apex Foundation to ask for assistance in the costs of the air conditioner and replacement floor coverings. The Apex Foundation, through its

Queensland Civilian Widows Trust approved a grant of \$3,890 to helpfloor coverings for the family of Mathew Russell hoping that this grant will help him recover well from the burns.

#### **NSW CIVILIAN WIDOWS**

Pedro Kalimnakis, a beautiful little boy is two and a half years old. Like all children of his age, he is extremely cheeky, loves to giggle and play and is the light of his parents' lives. Pedro suffers from Norrie disease, which is an extremely rare and debilitating genetic disease affecting only 200 people worldwide. Norrie disease has some devastating physical and psychological impacts. He is congenitally blind with no vision or light perception.

He has been diagnosed with developmental delays due to autism and possibly intellectual disability. He will also lose his hearing in the coming years to a level of severe to profound hearing loss. Given he will lose his hearing, it's especially important to help build his language before the hearing loss starts.

Based on advice from his specialists, Pedro needed to undertake 12 hours a week of Applied Behaviour Analysis (ABA) therapy which costs \$7,200 per term.

After being approached by his mother, Radmilla Kalimnakis, Apex Foundation, through its NSW Ciivilain Widows Trust made a grant of \$7,200 to cover one term of ABA therapy and contribute to improving Pedro's quality of life.

#### THE APEX NECESSITOUS CIRCUMSTANCES TRUST

The Necessitous Circumstances Trust (NCT) was established in 2011. The funds available for distribution were derived from donations, annual membership subscriptions plus net income from Foundation fundraising projects in local and regional communities throughout Australia.

The Apex Foundation has made many grants totalling \$350,000 from its General Trust and Apex Necessitous Circumstances Trust over the years.

The purpose of the NCT fund is to carry on the role of making grants to people in need. It is a public fund for the relief of persons in Australia in necessitous circumstances.

This fund can make grants to individuals or groups who meet the grant guidelines and the

Foundation Board encourages Apex Clubs to utilise these funds to assist individuals or groups in their local community.

### Apex Necessitous Circumstances Trust grants guidelines for Apex Clubs are listed below.

- 1. Grants from the Necessitous Circumstances Trust to people in difficult financial circumstances to assist in meeting expenses associated with disabilities etc.
- 2. The assistance can be to fund the medical treatment involved or the associated expenses for the family. e.g. travel and accommodation etc.
- 3. That the grant application needs to show that it will assist an individual or

group who need financial relief.

- 4. Grant funds are not available for overseas projects.
- 5. The term "disadvantaged" can apply to a person or group who is disadvantaged by financial, physical, intellectual and mental disabilities.
- 6. An application form needs to be completed.
- 7. The maximum grant will be up to \$3000

from the Foundation.

- 8. If Apex Clubs are applying for a grant it is expected that the club will match the grant \$ for \$ or provide labour/in kind contribution to the same value or greater.
- 9. Each application will be assessed by the Director responsible for the Trust and presented to the Board for assessment and approval.

Even if it is only in our newsletters, it allows us all to be vocal advocates of the great work Apex has achieved in the past, what we are currently achieving, and will continue to do into the future.

I had the privilege of attending the 2017 National Finals of the Apex Australia Teenage Fashion Awards (AATFA) in Mandurah Western Australia. This event has been going for over 25 years and I was left in awe at the professionalism of the participants, and the quality of the garments on show.



I give full credit to the organising committee and all involved for hosting one of the few remaining National Apex events.

This year's National Service Project, the Biggest Ever Blokes Lunch is still generating interest with more clubs coming on board to host, or planning to host a lunch. The first Lunch I attended was hosted by the South Wagga Apex Club and they raised \$30,000 for Prostate Cancer. With Apex, anything is possible! Clubs are also raising money for the cause in other ways, such as Blacktown Apex Club's collectable model cars. The whole of Region 2 is behind the BEBL at this year's Gympie Muster. John Williamson stars as the main attraction at what should be a great lunch and a cracker of a weekend in the Amamoor State Forest.

Last month I was privileged to attend the Philippine National Convention hosted by the Los Banos Club. I had the opportunity to meet with Global Chair and Secretary, Edward Mai & TT Singam, Immediate Past National President (IPNP) of Malaysia David Pan, and IPNP of India, Eshwar Elango. The Philippine Apexian's have had a strong year under the guidance of National President Rommel Caranto. There has been a resurgence with the rechartering of three clubs and more on the cards in the very near future.

The 8-10th of June saw a very successful regional catch up and executive training weekend in Region 3 held at the Apex Camp Greenup. The training was facilitated by some well versed members of the Toowoomba Apex Club and by all accounts it was well received and greatly appreciated. Members from Brisbane Valley and Inverell also took the opportunity get involved in last year's National Service Project to replace the Apex Park sign in Texas. This small project has given the Inverell club a fresh head of steam and enthusiasm, with them ordering a further 10 signs from Supply House to install in dormant Apex towns in Northern NSW.

Attending the catch up were two proud past members from the Apex Club of Millmerran, and I gave them a sign I had in my possession for installation in their town park. Leon Schaumberg who works on the Shire, will arrange for a suitable pole to be planted and the sign affixed upon it. On my travels home I scoped out Inglewood Park and but for the want of suitable tools, I would have installed another sign there. (Next year's task) This brings the total tally of signs purchased from Supply House to 47, and as yet no clubs or individuals have applied for reimbursement for this from the



allocated project fund of \$5,000. There is still plenty of opportunity out there for clubs and individuals to show some love to 850 plus parks, and I hope this continues. I ask again that your own club seek opportunities to carry on the momentum of this project.

I leave the Apex Australia National Board in Neal Molineaux's very capable hands. He and his Board will continue to build upon the solid foundation, common direction and track record of what previous boards have set in place over the past several years.

My fulfilling this role would not have been possible without the encouragement from the Apex Family in Chinchilla and the support of my daughter Jemima, and Partner (and Apexian) Bec Kuhn.

#### 2018 National Project -The Biggest Ever Blokes' Lunch

The Biggest Ever Blokes' Lunch initiative is the 2017/18 Apex Association Project, approved at the 2017 APEX National Conference to raise awareness of prostate cancer and raise funds for prostate cancer research.

This year we're very proud to annouce the Apex Gympie Music Muster will be hosting a Biggest Every Blokes Lunch on Friday August 24, right in the heart of the Music Muster. What's more, the Prostate Cancer Foundation are the primary charity partner for the Muster.

The BEBL started in Shepparton in 2009 after one bloke, the late Chris McPherson AM and Past Apex Club President, found out he had incurable prostate cancer. Prostate cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer in Australian men and Chris wanted to persuade other blokes to take responsibility for their health and get checked. Lunches are now held each year across 3 states and with Apex Australia's help we want to see these events have an even bigger impact on this insidious cancer.

#### Bundbaberg President Shannon Joye has put his hand up (and that's not all) to help raise funds for the BEBL and the Prostate Foundation.

"Yes, it's actually happening!! For the length of the Gympie Music Muster this year I will be getting around in a mankini and tutu (different colour from those pictured) until I can raise enough money to put clothes back on. The muster usually gets down to about 2-3 degrees at nighttime so the quicker I can raise the money they quicker I can save my dignity (and avoid shrinkage) and also help support this worth cause. \$1000 per piece of clothing, aiming for a total of \$5000 with all funds raised going to the Prostate Cancer Foundation. There will also



be waxing involved with the privilege of the first strip going to the highest donator. Prostate Cancer is the biggest killer my males in this country and the more awareness and knowledge we have about it, the better chance we have of beating it!"

Apexian of the Year, Young Apexian of the Year (Under 25) and Best First Year Apexian receive a cash award of \$1,000 to apply towards an Apex event or cause they wish to support.

#### 2017 Best First Year Apexian

Apex Chinchilla Service Director, incoming president Lachlan Monk and current holder of the national Best First Year Apexian Award made a donation on behalf of his club to to Drought Angels, which will go towards buying stock-feed for drought affected farmers. Lachlan, who runs cattle in Chinchilla part-time, has seen first hand the difficulties faced by farming families.

"I was given the opportunity to donate \$1000 to a group or charity and I chose to give it to the Drought Angels," he said. "I know \$1000 is quite little in the big scheme of things but if it can help one or two families buy a little bit of time then it'll be a great thing."



"I've seen close family and friends go through severe drought and it can be extremely tough, not just financially but also mentally. "I read this quote and I thought it was quite relevant, 'The moment you're ready to quit, is usually the moment right before a miracle happens'."

NP Moses Abraham said the contributions made by Mr Monk to the club were greatly appreciated by the community.

"He's all about giving back to the community, he's also taken on the position of president of the local Apex club to keep giving back to the community."

Drought Angels director Jenny Gailey said the funds would help those in Cooladdi, south west of Charleville.

"We have been every fortunate to receive a cheque from Apex for \$1000 which is going towards some farmers stock-feed provisions out in Cooladdi," she said.

"It's one of our farmers who is in dire need of stock-feed. Ms Gailey said the support from Apex was "very heart-warming". "I think it's all about coming together as one as a community."

#### 2017 Apexian of the Year

Tyson Campbell, very worthy winner of the 2017 Apexian of the Year, reports on his award:

This is the first year at a new venue, the Alice Springs Turf Club.

The Cup had eight contenders, with Nuggett owned by Chris Hill from Uluru winning the trophy and the \$5000 prize money.

The event is run by volunteers, 40 all up, 15 from Apex and the Rotary Club of Alice Springs helping out, in an exchange for assistance with their major annual event, the Henley of Todd in August.

The first Camel Race in Alice Springs was run in 1970 in the dry Todd River Bed as a bet between two mates, Noel Fullerton and Keith Mooney-Smith. Apex has run the event since 2012.

"The first ride we raised money for Bradley's Place and then the ride sort of started to evolve – a lot of people wanted to come."

More recently the initiative has supported

the establishment of the Apex Copper Coast Retreats. Free respite holiday accommodation for South Australian families experiencing the stress and demands which come with a cancer diagnosis.

Starting off as a novelty fundraiser to ride the most inappropriate bike through the state's toughest terrain, the Postie Bike Ride is now one of the biggest of it's kind – raising over \$800,000 since it began.

Greg is too modest to take any credit for the way the race has expanded over the years, but said he was grateful and overwhelmed by those who thought to nominate him.

"To be honest I thought it was a scam letter at first and I said to my wife 'I've got this letter I think it might be a scam'. She was in on it, so she kind of said 'Hang on I think you better fill it out and send it back'," Kipo joked.
