

Apex Whyalla Christmas Pageant

A total of 40 floats and more than 50 stalls added up to another huge GFG Alliance Whyalla Christmas Pageant and Fair in late November.

The pageant has about 10 new floats this year and 10 more stall-holders to create a fantastic atmosphere at the Ada Ryan Gardens After-Pageant Fair complete with fireworks. There was also a City Plaza Christmas Street Party in Patterson Street after the pageant.

The pageant and fair are organised by the Whyalla Apex Club and Whyalla City Council with generous sponsorship from steelmaker GFG Alliance.

Damien Trenwith, of Apex, said the support from the company was much appreciated to fund the pageant and provide free entertainment and activities for children at the fair. "As a community organisation, it is great to provide something free for the children and community to enjoy," he said.

"We are fortunate to again have the company's support to provide all the entertainment and activities for free. "All you need to do is bring a few dollars if you would like something to eat or drink from any one of the 50 stalls we've got, including the Apex food stall.

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"This event is getting bigger and bigger and we have been busy all week finding spots to put all the extra stalls in." Mr Trenwith said an important part of the pageant and fair was the motorcycle toy run which would start at 4.30pm at the library and finish at the pageant.

People are encouraged to bring a toy and put it in the trailer for those kids in our community less fortunate. The toy run gets lots of fluffy toys so they are asking for a few more toys for older kids such as soccer balls, cricket sets and the like.

GFG Alliance spokesman Sean Kelly said the operator of the steelworks and associated mines was proud be involved in the pageant and fair for the second year with executive chairman Sanjeev Gupta and his family to again take part.

"Sanjeev and his family really enjoyed last year's event and were impressed with organisation," Mr Kelly said. "He mentioned several times what a good job Apex and council had done in organising it.

Mr Trenwith said there were plenty of spots available along the pageant route, but advised people to come out a bit early to get a good position.

Apex Tamar Christmas Parade (Santa is on page 1!)

For about the last 40 years, a dedicate group of local Launceston volunteers has been launching the city's Christmas spirit.

Every year, on the last Saturday in November, thousands line the street in a bid to see Santa at the annual Launceston Christmas Parade. From February, the team of six get started on the planning for the event.

Tamar Apex took over the parade about four decades ago, and haven't stopped since. Parade coordinator Cheryl Gabites said the club that hosted the parade before them folded. "One of our now life members brought it to our club and asked if we would be interested in doing it for that one time and we said 'yes'," she said. "Now, we've been doing it ever since."

"All the members have all got little kids, except me, and it's a big and hard thing to pull off. But we get it done," she said

"On the day we do have a lot of other volunteers that come and help us too, which is really good. But the people organising the event is just us basically."

The volunteers take a short break between one parade and the next.

"It's full steam ahead from February. We get started on the planning, the charity, the sponsors, permits and grants and that sort of stuff," Ms Gabites said. "One of the first things we do is get a theme. The from September we really start bringing it together."

The parade has seen plenty of changes over the years, including to the route.

"The roue has changed a few times during that time. We had it going from the bottom of George

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Street and through the Avenue at one stage," she said.

"But I think they changed that because it was clashing a lot with the car parks."

Now with the route – and so many people wanting to be involved – the parade has formerly come to a stand-still. But, this year that issue was addressed.

While the route may sometimes change, one thing doesn't and that is the joy the parade brings to the children – young and old.

"We find the Christmas Parade is the thing that gets everyone going and in to town and motivated to do their Christmas Shopping," Ms Gabites said.

"It starts the Christmas cheer for the kids too. They see Santa and they're all excited and they know that he's on his way."

The community service club said organising the parade is all about putting something back in to the community.

The parade is now something families look forward to, and gives memories that last a life time.

"I can remember looking at it when I was a wee, wee little thing. So it's been going for a while now, and we look forward to it being bigger and better," Ms Gabites said.

Entry is free, as is tradition, and families were encouraged to bring a picnic blanket and set up near the rotunda to enjoy live music from local duo Long Time Coming from about 5pm.

"You can get as much out of it as you want," Apex member Matthew Verri said. "If you just want to sit down on a picnic blanket and listen to music, we're happy with that. If you want to jump on a ride and eat a dagwood dog and try all afternoon to win a ham, we're also



happy with that. We just want to provide a good afternoon for the community." Once again, Santa will make his entrance in mystery mode of transport at 6.30pm, carrying free bags of lollies for local children. He's visited the carnival by canoe, fire engine and even sky diving in past years, but still has a surprise up his sleeve.

"I've been in the club for 10 years now and this is certainly a new one for me," Patrick said.

"Last year he turned up on a mobility scooter, but he's feeling a bit younger this year!" Matthew said. The ever popular fireworks were back from 8.30pm

We will have our next meeting on the first Monday in February- if you are interested in attending please contact the club.




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Apex Milton Ulladulla
