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# CLUB News

### Echuca-Moama

The Echuca-Moama Apex Gift was held again in early March and it was bigger and better than its 2018 edition.

The new and improved Gift built on the success of the inaugural event, where Echuca, Lockington Bamawm United, Echuca United, Moama, Tongala and Kyabram football and netball clubs competed over 100m sprints for local bragging rights and a cash prize. This time around the Echuca-Moama Apex Club signed on an additional club, Leitchville Gunbower, and is aiming for 10 to 12 in total.

And with a total of \$5000 in prizes up for grabs for winning runners and their clubs, why wouldn't clubs join in? Each club pays an entry fee of \$250 to enter eight runners, split between four categories: under-18 boys, under-18 girls, senior men and senior women.

The winner of each final gains \$1250 — which is split around \$300 for themselves and the remainder going to their club. Echuca-Moama Apex co-ordinator Ben Hearn said March 1 was a night to remember.

"For us it's all about keeping the event close to the Echuca-Moama community and keeping it as a local event," he said. "We found last year that a lot of the runners, even though they represented Kyabram, were based in Echuca-Moama.

"They all have those local connections, so that's something we'd really like to keep going. The clubs that are a bit out of the local community, but have those connections to here." Hearn said he hoped the joining

of more clubs was on the horizon, and that Apex had been in talks with a handful.

"We'd love to have, you know, more than 12 clubs involved next year. "There's definitely still time to get involved. We'd love to hear from those clubs and any others that might want to join in.

In all, volunteer Lorraine Amor said small acts of kindness can make all the difference. "I just like to see them happy, and they really enjoy that day," she said. 

## Gympie Music Muster Fast Facts



## **Albany - Apex Drive**

"On January 5 this year a former resident of Albany, WA, turned 100.

He is John Moyle and now lives with his daughter in New South Wales.

According to old friend and Apex historian David Bird, who has written the extraordinary history of Apex Drive, John was the inaugural president of Albany Apex and in October 1953 suggested to his 40 members that the existing road up to Mt Clarence (little better than a track) should be reworked and done by Apex members, guided by the senior roads engineer and surveyor.

If then became apparent to Ross Steels that the strait of the new drive would make an ideal Avenue of Honour to replace Middleton Road. None who have gazed on the current Field of Light under the swampy mahogany gums recommended by Kings Park would argue. The relocation from Port Said of the original and desecrated memorial to the Desert Mounted Corps of World War I became the focal point on Mt Clarence.


The recent National

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#### Retirement

Notable Nationals senator John "Wacka" Williams rates life membership of the Inverell Apex Club and being elected to parliament as two of his three major honours during his 64 years.

In a speech to the Senate in 2012 he stated: "I was privileged to join Apex many years ago, when it was a young men's services club for men aged 18 to 40. Apex started in 1931, during the Great Depression, by three men in Geelong: Langham Proud, Ewan Laird and the late Sir John Buchan. It is a wonderful organisation that grew right around Australia, especially in rural and regional Australia, where Apex was really endorsed and the clubs were many—growing fast, with high membership. In Inverell we had two Apex clubs. The Inverell Apex Club was formed many years ago, shortly after 1931, and the Sapphire City Apex Club was formed in the 1970s.

There seems to be a culture developing in Australia where the attitude is that, if we do not have it, the government has got to give it to us. That is over all three tiers of government local, state and federal. It is a culture I have seen develop over several years, or for even longer. Years ago, if we did not have it then our community pulled together to deliver what we wanted. Of course, our service clubs were a major part of that. I look back on Apex and what we did in the early days of our association for things like microsurgery and kids' cancer research. In the early 1960s, Apex even lobbied the Australian government to abolish the White Australia policy. You might want to join a Rotary club, a Lions club—Lions International is a magnificent organisation—or an Apex club. But I underline Apex because it is an Australian-made organisation. It was made here in Australia, as I said, back in 1931 by three men in Geelong. We need to build numbers in the Apex clubs

to keep the Apex association alive so it can deliver for communities as it has done for many years. I was fortunate to be district governor on two occasions, in 1991 and 1994. In 1991 we went to Perth for our national convention and in 1994 we went to Burnie in Tasmania. If you want to help your community, if you want to build better communities and make friends and if you want to go to bed at night saying, 'I can sleep with a peaceful mind because I have helped someone today'—and that is how it is - join a service organisation. Through these organisations the community benefits and the people benefit, and those who join clubs, do the work and get involved are also great beneficiaries. That is my message: join a service club, help yourself and help your country."

Senator Williams retired from the Senate earlier this year. His final words: "And Mr President, that's stumps. Good luck everyone and keep well."

# Australia Day - Apex's role in it

It so happens that this year, 2019, the date of January 26 – Australia Day – fell on a Saturday. In typical laid back Aussie fashion, the national public holiday has been shifted to the following Monday (January 28) to make it a long weekend. Heaven forbid we miss out on a public holiday during the week!

This is a throwback to the old nation-wide convention of always holding the Australia Day public holiday on the Monday following January 26, unless the date coincided with that weekday. This was the national practice until 1994 when it was agreed by all states and territories that the public holiday should occur on the official Australia Day date, irrespective of the day of the week it occurred – except on weekends!

That statement must be qualified – the Northern Territory preceded the whole nation a full decade when the NT Government declared January 26 would be the fixed date for the Australia Day holiday from 1984 onwards. Now long forgotten and overlooked, why did the NT lead the way on this issue? For that answer, it's necessary to go back to January 26, 1976, which happened that year to be on a Monday. It was thus one of those infrequent occasions when the Australia Day holiday occurred on the official date. This coincidence seems to have been the trigger for a campaign begun by the Apex Club of Central Australia to promote the historical significance of this public holiday. By year's end, this Apex Club (it was the second in the Centre, the first was the Apex Club of Alice Springs started in 1959) embarked on a local public awareness campaign to raise the profile of Australia Day. The president, Keith Hyde – a senior agronomist based at AZRI – was the public spokesman on behalf of the club. In early January 1977 the campaign was launched with the release of promotional materials, film shows,

and an essay competition for school-aged children with prizes divided between primary and secondary class levels.

There ended up being three winners of the essay competition, with two secondary students awarded equal first prize – all the winners were girls, and two were sisters! Following the success of the local campaign, the Apex Club of Central Australia proceeded to take their project to a much higher level.

The club prepared a motion for promoting Australia Day, including suggestions that "Apex should ensure that the Prime Minister's address on Australia Day achieves national significance. "The national press, radio and TV media should be coordinated to recognise Australia Day. A handbook should be published, and large companies should be involved in the promotions.

"On the club level, pioneers could be invited to speak at dinner meetings." (Centralian Advocate, 14/4/77) This motion was progressively accepted in Apex district and zone conventions, and finally gained approval at the Apex national convention at Southport, Tasmania, in early April 1977. It was reported: "This means that all Apex Clubs in Australia will now carry out special promotions through mass media and other means for the national day each year. The activity will fall under the citizenship portfolio of the association." (Advocate, 14/4/77).

In 1978 celebrations for Australia Day in Alice Springs were ramped up. The two Apex clubs cooperated with the aid of the Alice Springs Folk Society to hold a free concert in front of the Commonwealth Government Centre (now the Alice Springs Police Station) during Monday evening, January 30. A crowd of several hundred attended the event and it was considered a great success.

The Folk Society gave a rousing perfor-

mance, notably Dave Evans, Bob Barford, Scott Balfour, and CSIRO scientist Barney Foran, who also entertained with renditions of poetry.

The same format was presented the next year with an Australiana-themed folk music and poetry concert at the Commonwealth Centre on Monday, January 29, 1979.

The public was reminded: "And if Apexians, who are helping to organise the folk festival, have their way it could be the last time Australia Day festivities are held on a special Monday public holiday.

"Spokesman Dave Gillatt said this week his club had started a nation-wide initiative by Apex to have Australia Day celebrated on January 26, the official anniversary of the day Captain Phillip founded the country as a British colony in 1788. The drive has been adopted as one of Apex's national citizenship service projects." (Centralian Advocate, 25/1/79.)

An Advocate "staff reporter" questioned the



concert's success this time around: "Do Australians – particularly the Alice Springs variety – care about Australia? Local patriots asked the perennial question after a conspicuously quiet Australia Day holiday on Monday."

The review noted the Apex Club of Central Australia – Folk Club concert attracted "a good crowd of 500 people. But at least nine tenths of the participation was by the highly talented and enthusiastic members of the Folk Club.

"We were told what it has meant to be an Australian since Captain Phillip founded his country's giant prison farm almost 200 years ago. But the feeling with which we were left was one of nostalgia for something lost rather than inspiration for the future.

"The grand spirit of the outback was lost in the second half of the show as singers reminded us of the modern dilemmas facing "Poor fellow, my country".

"We laughed at the public service, saw how the land and seas had been scarred by mindless progress, and mourned the passing of the Aboriginal way of life.

"By the time we got round to the national anthem 'Advance Australia Fair,' there wasn't much to celebrate." (Advocate, 1/2/79).

"The general apathy about the subject has moved Central Australian Apex man Dave Gillatt to once again push the idea of holding the actual holiday on January 26. In this way, say Dave and his supporters, Australia Day would be special, like Anzac Day – not just another opportunity for an extended booze-up in natural surroundings." (Advocate, 1/2/79).

Though local enthusiasm seemed to have dimmed, yet there was movement afoot – for one thing, the dominant Folk Society performers (Evans, Barford, Balfour and Foran) founded their new band "Bloodwood" (pictured) which became a fixture of the Alice Springs music scene throughout the 1980s.

But it was on the Federal scene that a major step forward occurred, when during 1979 the Fraser Government established a National Australia Day Committee in Canberra to oversee future nation-wide celebrations of the national day, later to become the National Australia Day Council.

It wasn't until Apex had resolved from April 1977 onwards to push for greater recognition of Australia's national day – from an initiative begun in Alice Springs – that this objective gained real impetus.

Each state and territory established its own Australia Day councils, with many Australia Day committees established in towns and cities.

In 1981 there was more publicity; and in this year the date of January 26 fell on a Monday. Once again a free outdoor concert was scheduled for outside of the Commonwealth Centre in Parsons Street but was hastily relocated indoors at the Alice Springs High School (now Centralian Middle School) when wet weather threatened.

This time the concert program featured a much wider range of performances reflecting the ethnic diversity of the town. It was also the time when the slogan "One nation, one future" first came into use.

By this time responsibility for functions was taken by the Alice Springs Australia Day Committee, and the two Apex clubs in the town were part of numerous sponsors for the events.

However, the Apex Club of Central Australia wasn't completely dealt out of the equation, for in 1982 this group coordinated the inaugural Centralian of the Year award with the Australia Day Council. The first winner was Mrs Joan Higgins, the director of the Alice Springs Youth Centre.

In Alice Springs in 1983 the first protest occurred, when a number of Aboriginal people and supporters gathered on the town council lawns and hoisted the Aboriginal flag in defiance of a council ruling.

It was also the day that the NT Government made an announcement: "Chief Minister Paul Everingham said no matter what the rest of Australia may decide, Territorians will next year have the Australia Day holiday on January 26. "Let's hope it won't be too long before the rest of Australia gets into line," he said. "In his Australia Day message, Mr Everingham said many people saw the day as just another long weekend and if that's all there was to it, 'we might as well spend the day doing something about productivity at work'

And so it was that in 1984 the Northern Territory became the first jurisdiction in the country to secure the Australia Day public holiday on the date of January 26, irrespective of the day of the week it occurred. The rest of Australia "got into line" a full decade later.

But there's more to this than meets the eye. Paul Everingham was once an active member of the Apex Club of Alice Springs (the original club in town) and its president in 1971-72.

It was in 1972 that the Apex Club of Central Australia first began. It was Everingham who suggested Alice Springs should host the National Apex Convention which occurred in 1974, bringing 1200 interstate visitors to town (population then just over 13,000).

Even in the early 1980s when Australia fell into recession, the Territory continued to steam ahead and there was an abundance of optimism. This situation still applied in January 1983 when Everingham declared the NT would lead the nation by affixing the Australia Day public holiday to January 26.

On January 26, 1984, the Northern Territory became the first jurisdiction in Australia to observe the Australia Day public holiday on a Thursday and thereafter on every other day of the week in succeeding years – but by then the days of good fortune that had been smiling in the early days of self-government was drawing to an end.

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## **Insurance News**

Your Club's Certificate of Currency is available online

You'll also find forms you can complete to update your club assets, an important presentation from the recent National Convention (if you weren't there you really should watch it, plus contact details for our broker, Maninder Sandhu at Aon. If you have any questions at all about your coverage, contact Maninder. Here's a brief run through from him on event liability.

#### **Liability & Events**

Public and Products Liability insurance protects an organization for personal injury or property damage claims from a third party. Personal injury or Property Damage can occur in many ways, for example lack of maintenance of premises, provision of group activities, community events, the selling or donation of products, food handling or lack of attention to the people in the Insured's care can pose risk of injury or damage occurring. In the event that the organisation is deemed liable for injury or damage, the General Public and Products Liability policy is designed to pay compensation to the third party.

#### Few key points to follow

The insurance policy is not designed to protect other organisations or service providers working in partnership with Apex. Those organisations and service providers must carry their own insurance. Apex is required to collect and file respective insurance proof from the other organisations and service providers.

Each event with more than 500 people attending requires submission of event plans, risk management plans, confirmation of third party service providers insurance and event details at least four weeks prior to event date. In the absence of which the event remains uninsured as per terms and conditions of insurance policy. Where your club has undertaken this process in the past, a simple review is only required next year. In order to obtain approval please submit required information with your insurers care of maninder.sandhu@aon.com

Any servicing of alcohol without a license is a breach of insurance policy conditions.

Please do not undertake road closures. Road closures should only be conducted by appropriate authorities.

Policy Exclusion:

Hazardous Activities

This policy does not cover the legal liability of the Insured to pay damages or compensation to any third party, or legal costs associated with any claim, in respect of an injury sustained by a third party where the insured is responsible for the organisation of and/or participation in bungee jumping, parascending, hang-gliding, parachuting, base jumping, white water rafting, motor races, rallies and like events, except where agreed by insurers in writing.

Fire Works

Your insurer require a certificate of insurance from the Fireworks/Pyrotechnic operator noting specific event and period of event and noting Apex club as Principal on the policy. In the absence of preapproval insurance policy excludes any liabilities resulting from fire works and pyrotechnic. Jumping/Bouncy Castles:

If Apex is supplying any bouncy castle, it must:

- Be supervised by responsible employees/volunteers at all times when in use;
- Be restricted to use by appropriate age groups (eg. Infants to 2, 2-5, 6-12 and over 12 years must not be mixed)

**Trampolines** 

it must be supervised by responsible employees/volunteers at all times

- Be fitted with safety side netting to prevent falls from the trampoline;
- Not be used by more than one person at a time.

## A Memory of Montreal

by GORDON MURRAY.

Of the many impressions gained abroad as your representative to the World Council, there are two in particular that I feel should be conveyed to all Apexians.

To me, they were proof, if proof were needed that a closer relationship between the common peoples of the world is essential to international peace and goodwill. Such contacts, whether by letter, over a cup of tea, coffee, or if you like it, with your foot on a bar rail, and in an atmosphere of friendly informality achieve much more than with the usual frigid diplomatic formalities. Secondly, that a continuance of the attitude. "My country right or wrong" can only lead to further world choas.

To me, this was convincingly demonstrated at the actual meeting of the Council. Let me give you the picture. Around that table sat eight young men, representing four nations.

America is a country which in wealth and material resources make it the World's No. 1 power . . . . a land of plenty and prosperity . . . . only just learning that there are other Worlds beyond the Pacific and Atlantic oceans, and whose knowledge of those Worlds is often based on reports of a biased and sensational press.

Canada is a country, financially and geographically closer to America than to England. You will recall it was originally settled by the French and today the French still predominate the population, particularly on the eastern coast.

From Australia came yours truly, from a country which, with its youth, energy and the influence of Hollywood is probably closer in living habits to America than to England. But a country that freely gives to England a family loyalty. Sitting, it seemed at first, apart from the others was an Englishman, Leslie Crew. He well knew that America could not understand why his country is in the position it is today. A few hours ago he had sat down to a meal, on his plate was more meat than his whole family received in a week at home. As an Englishman he felt the Americans would try and sell him something, and on behalf of Round Table was prepared to withdraw from the Council. Leslie was behind the "eight-ball" and knew it. That made him even more of an Englishman.

Now to date the description of this meeting could well sound like many others, from U.N.O. down. But there was a difference, a vast difference. Each representative was prepared to try and understand the other persons point of view. This meeting began with goodwill as its keynote.

You have already heard something of the outcome of this meeting. Kin., 20-30 International and Active International have adopted, as a major service scheme an "Aid to Europe" campaign. But more important than that, four Americans have gone back to their Clubs, with a new respect and new understanding of England, and to enthusiastically convey this thought to 10,000 club members. An Englishman, too went home, with a new understanding and respect for America.

After the meeting, the American boys purchased for Leslie the loudest tie that could be found in Montreal.

Leslie the loudest tie that could be found in Montreal. That night, at the Convention dance, a little self conscious, he wore that tie, and wore it proudly. To me, that little incident seemed to have a far deeper significance than mere Convention frivolity, it represented a down-to-earth beginning of a successful future for the

World Council.

## Organisation and Management

The management of Apex, 20-30 and Active International Clubs, is by a Board of Directors. Kin Clubs, too, have a board comprised of President, Past President, Vice-President, Registrar, Historian, Secretary-Treasurer and 3 Directors. Round Table Club Council comprises 6-8 members.

Apex Clubs, as you know, are then combined into Districts, each with a District Governor and then into Zones, with Zone President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer.

20-30 International Clubs are grouped into Sub-Districts, then 11 Districts, and finally 6 Trustee Areas. East Sub-District has its Governor. Districts each have a Board of Governors, consisting of District Governor and Sub-District Governors. The Trustee Areas (an amalgamtion of districts) have a trustee, elected at National Convention by the Districts Active International is divided into 6 districts, each with a Governor, who is elected at District Convention. In large districts, there is also a Lieut.-Governor. Then follows a Board of Governors, comprising 6 District Governors and immediate Past-President, who select President, 2 Vice-Presidents, and Secretary (who has no vote).

Kin has 8 Districts, each with Governor, Immediate Past Governor, Deputy Governor (elected), Dep. Governor (appointed), District Sec. Treasurer and Historlan appointed by Governor. Districts are governed by National Executive.

Round Table is divided into 18 areas, with two representatives from each Club. National Council comprises one or two delegates from each area. Council has administrative powers only.

Top governing body of Apex, of course, is National Council, comprising Secretary-Treasurer, Zone Presidents and two others. In 20-30 International it is the International Council made up of President, Past President, Vice President; six Trustees, and Secretary-Treasurer, who is elected by this Council. The secretary is also magazine editor at a salary of £1200.

Active International governing body varies to the 20-30 in that there are committees to control programmes, attendance, awards, expansion, membership,

etc. Chairman of a committee is appointed by President and board of governors.

Kin of Canada has its National Council made up of National Executive and 8 District Governors. Round Table top body is the Executive Committee, which includes a President, Vice President, Secretary-Treasurer, and four members of National Council.

## General Notes

In all organisations (except Apex) every club has one or more delegates at National Convention. Both Kin and R.T. use Classification System in selecting members. In R.T. a club under 40 members can have two members of each classification, 40-60 members three of each classification, and above 60 four of each classification.

20-30 allows a Proxy vote at all conferences and Conventions. Kin allows Proxy votes at National Convention.

At Kin National Convention each club has five votes for the first 25 members in the club and another vote for each additional 25 or major part thereof. (Designed to create larger clubs and a greater interest in convention decisions through greater voting power).

Kin National President comes from West of continent one year; East the next.

In 20-30 the club President and Secretary hold office office for six months, only though the Secretary usually serves for two terms.

20-30 has two educational meetings each year prior to new club officers taking over their duties. The meetings present a programme of ideas for Presidents, Secretaries and Directors.

Kin adopts an annual National slogan. At the moment it is "The Nation's Greatest Need" (reference is to their cancer campaign).

# 1948 World COUNCIL NIDDIN NYF

Report by LANGDON PARSONS 1948-49 President

It was my privilege to travel 25,000 miles to a meeting of the World Council of Young Men's Service Clubs, as a representative of Apex. The venue was Hastings, England, and the date was the 24th to the 30th May inclusive.

"Buzz" Nelson (President of the WCYMSC), Gordon Hare (Melbourne Apexian) and I were met in London on Sunday, 23rd May, by Les Crew (Nat-lonal President of Round Table Associstion of Great Britain and Ireland), who had come up to London especially to drive us to Hastings where we arrived at 6 o'clock that evening. There we were met by the Conference Officers and quite a number of Round Tablers, whose every wish was that we should feel completely at home and should want for nothing. Everything possible was done for our comfort and enjoyment throughout the week we spent at Hast-ings, and I cannot praise too highly the wonderful hospitality and friendliness which was always in evidence.

COUNCIL MEETING.

On Monday, 24th May, seven "young men" representing four service organisations met in conference at 10 a.m., at the third annual meeting of the World Council of YMSC. Those present were the World Council President, M. A. "Buzz" Nelson, representing 20-30 International; Charles A. "Doc" Benson, representing Active International; F. Leslie Crew (World Council Vice-President), Oliver Pincock, and G. Ben Woolfenden, all three representing RTBI: and Gordon Hare and J. Langdon Parsons, representing the Associ-ation of Apex Clubs. Also present were Mark Marchesi (Founder RTBI). Rod-ney Lillecrap (Past President of RTBI) and Jack Beldry (Hastings Table Chairman and Conference Committee Chairman).

Jack Baldry welcomed all delegates and assured them that the Hastings Table was at their service at all times.

The President, in welcoming the delegates, expressed regret that the Assoctation of Kinsmen Clubs was not able

to be represented, at the same time thanking Mr. Baldry for his remarks.

Greetings were received from Jack Greetings were received from Jack Ramsey (President of the Association of Kinsmen Clubs), John Northey (Secretary of the Association of Apex Clubs), Duncan Campbell (World Council Secretary), Mr. Visted (President of Norway Round Table Association), The Mayor of Hastings, and Harvey Greenway (Official Kin Delegate to WCYMSC).

Owing to the late circulation of the minutes of last year's meeting they were taken as read.

It was reported that some of Kin's Executives were disappointed with the achievements of the WCYMSC, as well as feeling that the 10 cents per members' subscription was too high. As a consequence, there was likely to be a move made at Kin's National Convenfor them to withdraw from the World Council.

Les Crew commented on the cordial relations existing between RTBI He reported on their wonderful Food-For-Britain effort, as well as letters from Kin's President stressing their desire for closer liaison.

A lengthy discussion took place and it was agreed that the World Council had not kept member organisations as fully aware of its achievements and ideals as should have been done. The question of expense was also considered and the matter was then deferred for later on in the meeting.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.
President "Buzz" Nelson, in presenting his annual report, stated that the last year had shown "the reaping of

some grain planted in previous years and yet we have so much fertile field yet to develop." He then reported on the World Council's three major objectives, namely, (1) International Correspondence, (2) International Goodwill Week, and (3) Aid-for-Europe.

It was pointed out that the Club-to-Club correspondence scheme will shortly be under way between all Member Organisations, with the exception of Kin. "Buzz" mentioned that this scheme should be given wider publicity and encouragment by the various official publications.

International Goodwill Week adopted by each of our members and this received a good reception. He recommended that this worth-while undertaking be again adopted.

Regarding Aid-for-Europe, it was pointed out that each organisation was doing excellent work in this sphere, the outstanding effort to date, being Kin's Food-For-Britain scheme.

It was pointed out that Round Table has expanded very well on the continent of Europe, and that whereas two years ago we represented 12,000 Young Men, to-day the World Council represents approximately 25,000.
In conclusion "Buzz" stated that, ours

was a youthful organisation which would of course make mistakes from time to time, he never-the-less felt that we had a bright future in attaining our goal of e true and nermanent peace. The Vice-President, Leslie Crew, also reported on the Goodwill Week and was con-gratulated on the fine job which he had done as Chairman of that Committee.

#### WORLD COUNCIL REPORT

#### MEMBER ORGANISATIONS.

The President then called on the Delegates representing Member Organ-isations to give a concise report of their activities during the year. From these reports it found that:-

Active International has 60 clubs

with 1853 members.

RTBI has 130 clubs, with 4727 members.

20-30 International has 245 clubs.

with 7176 members.

Apex has 50 clubs, with approximately 1600 members.

Kin of Canada has over 7,000 mem-

bers. The Round Table Delegates pointed

out that the Continental Round Table

Associations were growing rapidly, and supplied the following details:— Denmark, 24 Tables; Netherlands, 11 Tables; Sweden, 7 Tables; Norway, 1 Table; Finland, 1 Table; Belgium, 1 Table; Round Tables in Asia, 4 Tables.

EXTENSION. Discussion took place on this aspect, and it was pointed out that there may be other service organisations existing in various parts of the World of which we had no knowledge at all. It was resolved therefore that a committee to make enquiries throughout the World on this matter should be formed.

RTBI advised that they were making strenuous efforts to establish Round Table in South Africa, and it was recorded that "Round Table is making strenuous efforts to become established in South Africa, and it is recommended to organisations of the World Council that they confer direct with Round Table or through the World Council, and that Apex is still attempting to become established in New Zealand, and that other organisations should co-operate in the same way.'

Both 20-30 International and Active International advised that neither of them do now have a paid field organiser whose job is to establish new clubs.

#### NEW WORLD COUNCIL OFFICERS.

The following appointment of new World Council Officers for 1948-1949 were agreed unanimously:-

President: J. Langdon Parson (Apex) Vice-President; G. Ben Woolfenden (Round Table).

Secretary-Treasurer: Gordon Murray (Apex), subject to his acceptance. If refused, the position to be filled by the World Council President).

FINANCE. After payment of all accounts, the surplus of cash held was FINANCE. shown to be \$127.50, to which should be added 1947 per capita fees amount-ing to \$1913.80 cents, showing a bal-ance of \$2041.30 cents.

Crew pointed out that the SC was not a large spender of WCYMSC money, the expenses being small in relation to the total memberships. total expenditure for 1947 amounted to only \$412.42 cents. He stated that

all members in each organisation should know this as without the support of the individual members, the WCYMSC could achieve nothing. For this reason he felt that a kind of Inter-Relations Committee should be formed.

Retiring President "Buzz" Nelson in handing over the chair to incoming President Langdon Parsons, stated:— "I want you to know that I have certainly enjoyed being President of your organisation, as one of my particular hobbies has been the World Council, so I have generally tried to give it most of my attention. I think that we can go a long way if we will continue to sit in meetings like this that are friendly with our desire to get together and to state our problems, and to work them out intelligently. I hope that the future officers, and I am sure that we have made some good selections, carry always the thought of friendly co-operation and a sincere desire to attain the goals that the council has."

President Langdon, in occupying the chair, expressed his firm conviction in the future of the World Council, and said that he felt that he could not let the occasion pass "Without recording our sincere thanks to "Buzz" Nelson for the many years of exceptionally fine service he has put into the WCYMSC.

The unanimous thanks of every dele-gate to "Buzz" Nelson for his work on the Council was carried by acclamation.

#### COMMITTEES.

By Laws Committee. It was resolved that Doc Benson be responsible, with his Association, for putting into order the By Laws drafted at the last annual meeting, and despatching to the secretary at the earliest possible date.

Budget Committee. Leslie Crew and Gordon Hare.

Information Committee, "Buzz" Nelson, (Chairman) and Gordon Murray.

International Goodwill Week Committee. Doc Benson (Chairman), with a member from each other member organisation.

Aid for Europe Committee. Woolfenden (Chairman) with a member from each other member organisation.

International Correspondence Committee. Oliver Pincock (Chairman), with a member from each other member organisation.

Budget Committee. Leslie Crew and Gordon Hare, subsequently the Budget Committee submitted a budget with recommendations for the year 1948-1949, and considerable discussion took place as to whether any money should be paid out towards travelling expenses to delegates to the Hastings Conference, was ultimately resolved that

Nelson dissented. Buzz"

The Finance Committee presented a statement of monies held by Member Associations in the WCYMSC, together with recommendations as to where these various amounts should be paid or held, and these were adopted unanimously.

It was subsequently moved that "All Member Organisations of the World Council be billed for the per capita tax of 10 cents per member as at 1st Jan-uary, 1948, the reason for this was that it is anticipated that at least 25 per cent, of each delegate's travelling expenses to Australia in 1949 will be able to be refunded from World Council funds.

Finance Committee for the new financial Year. Gordon Hare

The Treasurer was instructed to pay the necessary expenses as shown in the last year's financial statement.

The Council agreed to forego the bonding of their treasurer for the forthcoming term.

A long discussion took place on the desirability of holding meetings of the WCYMSC every other year instead of each year, and after many points had been put forward it was resolved that a committee be appointed to investigate the suggestion that bi-annual meetings should be considered and that the committee report at the next annual meeting to be held in Australia.

It was resolved that the committee for investigating the suggestion of bi-annual meetings be composed of the Presidents of the respective organis-ations under the Chairmanship of the present President of the World Council.

It was resolved that the next meeting of the World Council be held on the 12th, 13th, and 14th April, 1949, at Geelong, Victoria.

It was resolved that an International expansion committee be formed under the chairmanship of Gordon Hare with power to add if he desires, to endeavour to find out if other Young Men's Service Clubs exist in other parts of the World, with a view to assisting them as well as possibly learning from them.

It was agreed that a certificate be presented by the World Council to the retiring President and Secretary.

It was agreed that each member organisation be requested to contribute

space in each issue of their magazine to the activities of World Council. It was agreed that Doc Benson try

to make an appointment to see Jack Ramsey of Kin at his July meeting.

was agreed that Gordon Hare It should endeavour to attend the meeting of the Montreal Kin Club during his Canadian visit, obtain information, as previously agreed, from Duncan Camp-bell, and also try to see Ed. Freeland, Kin National Vice-President.
