VALOUR Park



Have you visited Valour Park, on the highway between Sydney and Canberra? It can be found at 881 Federal Hwy, Watson, ACT, 2602.

Originally named Apex Park when founded in 1961, it was established as a memorial to members of Apex who perished in war. There are 76 Apexians who lost their lives during World War II.

The park later included a memorial to honour 'junior farmers who made the supreme sacrifice in service to their country'.


In 2014 it was renamed Valour Park, and forms a feature of the Remembrance Driveway, a series of parks between Sydney and Canberra designed to honour those who served us and those who gave their all.

Valour Park and the memorial to fallen Apexians forms the southern most memorial park on the Remembrance Driveway.

"Remembrance Driveway will become a living shrine, dedicated to the patriotism, heroism and endurance of all those who kept alight the torch of freedom and justice when, one by one, so many other countries of the world saw it being dimmed." – Remembrance Driveway brochure, 1953

The name of the park comes from the inscription 'for valour' which appears on the imperial Victoria Cross and the Victoria Cross for Australia.

Current plans have been announced to include a new memorial for the "Afghanistan Victoria Cross Memorial" within Valour Park. The new memorial is expected to be ready prior to ANZAC Day 2020.



The Afghanistan Victoria Cross recipients to be commemorated are:

- Trooper Mark G Donaldson VC, 2 September 2008
- Corporal Benjamin Roberts-Smith VC MG,
- 11 June 2010
- Corporal Daniel Alan Keighran VC, 24 August 2010
- Corporal Cameron Stewart Baird VC MG (posthumously), 13 February 2014

Last month the Milton Ulladulla Club brought together families across their community to initiate their local community Dad's Group.

Joining the Club to inspire and equip fathers and father figures to engage with their kids, and bringing better outcomes for our kids and our community, three local schools have joined forces to create a community Dads Group.The Milton Ulladulla Apex Club has initiated the project for the region and are now inviting all dads, mums, grandfathers, grandmothers, aunts, uncles, carers, guardians and father-figures in the Milton Ulladulla area to this informational and inspirational evening launch.

Maple Ridge Goat Dairy foreclosed early May, due to financial pressures of the rising price of feed over the past year, due to the drought conditions. Meghan Graham and their three children.

The money raised will help them through this tough time of paying off debt and general ongoing costs of a young family.

Apex Milton/Ulladulla also used this weekend to launch their new project to help fathers and felt that this fundraiser aligned with their mission (see page 5).

Apex's Jon Louth said the Graham's situation hit close to home. "We've recently set up a Milton Ulladulla Dad's Group to help dads come together to engage more with their kids," Mr Louth said.

"Our local club members are predominantly fathers of young children and teens, so it really hit home that this local family was really in need of a hand up at this tough time. So of course we were more than happy to be involved and we're excited that we've been able to help."

Rosie Cupitt, who has worked with the Maple Ridge Goat's milk for the last four years, said she was devastated to see the dairy close.

"This weekend proved that we live in a very generous community. Farmers can be very proud people, it is in their DNA, they are also very self-reliant and self-sufficient. I believe this gesture of help from our community will make a big impact for the Graham family financially and emotionally."

Cupitt's saw an opportunity to help the family over the Queen's Birthday long weekend.

Gympie Music Muster

Apex Gympie Music Muster is stripping away the stigma around rural mental health this August in support of 2019 charity partner, the Royal Flying Doctor Service, Queensland (RFDS).

With on site and online help from social media activists Ben Brooksby (The Naked Farmer), Mick Gould (Married at First Sight) and Nick 'The Honey Badger' Cummins, the iconic Aussie event is leading #getnaked4Muster and 'Funky Shirt Friday' initiatives to raise awareness and funds for delivery of RFDS state-based mental health programs.

Muster Chairman, Greg Cavanagh said the choice of this year's charity partner was driven by the need for greater mental health resourcing in rural communities.

"Those living in rural areas are just as likely to face mental health challenges as city dwellers, but 1 in 5 times more likely to commit suicide due to lack of access to support services," said Mr Cavanagh.

"Every loss of life or suicide attempt has a ripple effect on family, friends, workplaces, schools and communities and the statistics in Queensland are far too high. "This year's charity partnership is harnessing the collective power of community to drive change; opening up a dialogue and making it easier for people to connect with what's happening in each other's lives. At Muster, there are no strangers, only friends you haven't met yet."

Muster is encouraging festival-goers to support the work of the RFDS by either getting naked, dressing up or meeting their neighbour in and around the Amamoor State Forest festival site this year. Gympie lad, Mick Gould has polished up his boots and his birthday suit to lead the #getnaked4Muster photo competition – offering those with the guts to get naked the chance to become Mr / Ms August in the 2020 Naked Farmer Charity Calendar, along with a swag of other prizes.

The not so brave can shirt up for 'Funky Friday' [Muster Friday, Aug 23], wearing their fave op-shop bargain or lairy number gifted by a relative with a sense of humour. The team from social enterprise TradeMutt will be on hand to provide funky work shirt tips, and start conversations from their base at this year's RFDS stall.

In addition, the Nescafe crew will create on site café spaces to give Muster-goers the chance to sit, chat and find out more about their neighbours. "The RFDS is thrilled to be chosen as the Gympie Muster's charity beneficiary in 2019, a year that has seen the resilience of those across rural and remote Queensland truly tested with the devastating floods across north and north west and the prolonged effects of drought in other regions of our vast State impacting both livelihoods and individuals' sense of wellbeing", said RFDS Queensland Section CEO, Meredith Staib.

"While much is made of our life-saving aeromedical services, our ability to provide counselling support and look after the emotional needs of these pastoral communities is of equal importance, so we thank Muster organiser's for shining a light on this important issue".

The Queensland RFDS team will be at the festival offering aircraft simulator tours and raffling off a custom-made and signed Keith Urban guitar and one-of-a-kind Muster t-shirt signed by 2019 festival artists.

Raising in excess of \$15 million for Australian charities since its inception 38 years ago, Gympie Music Muster is an Apex event we can all be proud of.

THEY say Australia's agricultural industry has a strong story to tell.

Combine that with 55 years of history and it's safe to say the Dowerin GWN7 Machinery Field Days could tell you a yarn or two. The event began in 1964 with 20 exhibitors as a way to raise funds to water the town's ovals.

It has grown into WA's largest regional event, uniting a small community and showcasing the best of Australia's agricultural industry, while providing a platform for businesses to sell their products to the 24,000 plus visitors that come through the gates.

The funds raised by the event are invested back into the region and event co-ordinator Kahli Rose said, "\$1.3 million was injected back into the community and surrounds between 2006 and 2016 and we are committed to continuing to invest back into the region". With more than 300 volunteers still at the helm, this year's theme is about them, with capturing their passion, values and community spirit to ensure their contribution and their lives are celebrated.

The fashion area is also getting involved with a commitment to showcasing the story of Field to Fashion and celebrating the evolving fashion movement and traceability among the industry.

"Like food, the consumer is starting to question where their clothes are produced," Ms Rose said. "We want to encourage that, and through our partnership with Eco Fashion Week, be a platform to celebrate the natural fibres produced in the region.

"It's not often you see shearers and international designers celebrated in the same room - this area is about giving them all a voice to share their love for the fibres produced in Australia."

Other highlights will include the Field Days Unity Tree, potato dig, careers corner and pop up dairy.

The field days continue to be a key fundraiser for organisations within a 100 kilometre radius

of Dowerin as every volunteer is paid \$20 an hour to support an organisation of their choice.

The local Apex club run the onsite bar and according to bar manager Paul Millsteed, the club owes a lot to the field days. "The field days allows Apex to raise funds to put directly back into the community and other charities - what we fundraise over the two days would otherwise take us all year," Mr Millsteed said. According to event chairperson Nadine McMorran you cannot put into words what the field days mean to the community or to those involved in the event.

"It's the people- they all have a story and they install values into you," Ms McMorran said. "Knowing they put everything on hold for a week for something they're passionate about portrays values that cannot be taught.

"This event truly brings people together."

Again this year has seen focus on continually growing our Association, with another 85 new members being inducted in this term already. We are working to ensure this will continue for the remainder, not just this year but also for many years to come. So please encourage any younger individuals, you have contact with, about the benefits of Apex in their communities and their personal/professional lives so they too can share in the experiences of Apex.

As you'll already know the 10th March 2019 seen Apex Australia turn 88, so in 2 years we'll be celebrating our 90th Birthday. As this will be a significant celebration (and the last warm up before the big 100th) we are looking to establish a committee to start working towards these celebrations, parties being considered for the organising committee are; Apex Australia, Apex Foundation & Apex 40s. The highly talked about Data Base had a couple of hurdles when we started to test it with our Clubs late last year, however with some hard work the issues were rectified and it is now being rolled out to Clubs. With the National Board closely watching to ensure there are no further issues. The current roll out programme should have all Clubs on this new system by the end of this financial year (if your Club hasn't been contacted please follow up with your Regional Communicator in the first instance then the National Office), which will be a great benefit for Clubs and the Association to be able to move forward with real time information and figures.

The Association Project for 2018/19 (that wrapped up in October 2018), being that Apex Clubs would create awareness and raise funds for the Prostate Cancer Foundation through 'Biggest Ever Bokes Lunches' (BEBL) saw over \$120,000 raised through Apex and its networks. An outstanding achievement for those that got behind this project. With most Apex Clubs looking to continue with these BEBL again this year and additional Clubs looking to have their first BEBL there should be an ongoing stream of funding to the Prostate Cancer Foundation for many years to come. With the Association Project for 2019/20; being to raise awareness and \$40,000 for the Apex Magic Castle in its 40th year and having had supported approx. 40,000 children, it should be achievable.

Also successful to date has been the National Presidents Drought Relief Fund. This fundraiser gained great support than expected, with it reaching just under \$22,500. Over double what I was expecting to raise. A sincere thank you to all sponsors and a special thank you to the Apex Foundation for their generous donation. About Apex 40s

Apex 40 Australia Inc. is not a Service Club, but an organisation formed to foster fellowship among past Apexians and their partners, and to retain the many friendships formed during their Apex years. 

The Smithton Sports Centre was built on community spirit, generosity and the volunteer efforts of the Smithton Apex Club.

In the early 1950s Smithton was a prosperous town boasting several timber mills, a cordial factory, a butter factory and a prominent agricultural industry. Sporting clubs across the region were alive and thriving, with the Circular Head football and cricket associations both hosting large and multiple divisions.

Aside from weekend sport, tailor Michael Blizzard noticed a lack of things for young men in the area to do outside of work. He established the Smithton Boys Club and before long had a strong following in the region, with young men from all over Circular Head meeting once a week to participate in various activities.

The group would engage in a wide range of sports and activities, mostly boxing but also gymnastics and bushwalking.

The club met in abandoned buildings about the town to coordinate and participate in events.

Soon it had attracted over 200 boys from the area, and it became apparent that it would be impossible to sustain such a large group with no space to meet and fraternise in.

As such, a survey was devised to gauge community interest. Michael approached the Apex Club who helped to distribute the survey throughout the region. The response was overwhelmingly positive, including from the Apex Club, who would go on to lend the boys club hundreds of hours of voluntary labour.

And so, the club formed a committee, including as many pillars of the community as possible, knowing their influence would come in handy. It didn't take long for the community to come through with the goods. Farmer Sid Hingston offered to donate trees from his Faheys Lane property for timber.

Committee member Murray Poke was a contractor in Forest at the time and felt privileged to receive the donation, volunteering to fell the trees himself.

The logs were transported from Irishtown to the Circular Head Amalgamated Timber mill behind the high school free of charge by trucker Jack Saville. The foreman of the mill was none other than Jack Wainwright, a member of the committee and a real go-getter in the community.

He rallied the mill workers to volunteer their services on the weekend, and they obliged. Under the watchful eye of Jack Wainwright, the mill treated the entirety of the timber for the project free of charge. Construction began in 1956, as members of the boys club sprung into action to get their gymnasium built. A resourceful bunch, the boys used the timber for the roof first as scaffolding for bricklaying.

With the foundation complete, it was on to the next hurdle: bricks. Apex Club life member Rex Smith worked for a man by the name of Worrall Vertigan who owned a brickstamping business. Worrall had gotten wind of the project and offered to lend his equipment to the club.

The boys were delighted, and paid the favour forward by eventually hiring Worrall to lay the bricks. Having the tools to make the bricks was one thing but having the sand was another. The fellas had come across a serious roadblock and it was beginning to look like bulk funds needed to be raised, and raise them they did.

Suddenly there were barbecues and raffles galore as the community banded together to pull the project across the line. The Apex Club put up gazebos and held Friday night entertainment at the site that now forms the public buildings.

"Community support for the project was phenomenal. Everyone helped out in their own way, everyone supported the fundraisers," says Rex. Enter the Beacom family. The local family owned a quarry at Black River and inspired by the project, offered to cut, grind and cart enough sand to double brick the perimeter of the gymnasium.

They delivered the sand to Vertigan's Brickyard and thus the process of brickstamping commenced. The boys were ecstatic. The enthusiasm of the lads was contagious and they hit the brickyard in droves to pump out the bricks. Hours were donated after work shifts, on lunch breaks and on weekends to get the job done.

The money they had raised could then go to Worrall, who before long had trowel and mortar in hand. Using the homemade wooden scaffolding the boys had knocked up with the timber from Irishtown, Worrall made good use of the bricks.

As the walls grew higher and higher every day and with a plethora of plumbers and sparkies within the club, the group could see just one obstacle ahead: the truss'. Michael pitched the problem to the committee and sure enough Tom Rennison, head of the Togari Land Clearing Scheme, offered to supply the steel and have the truss' welded at his engineering workshop.

Bunny Cuttriss was the man for the job and just like that, the boys had everything they needed. After a few small plumbing and electrical costs were covered, the building was complete.

Fortunately, the gymnasium was large enough to fit a basketball court and squash courts, and now as part of Smithton Wellbeing Indoor Recreation and Leisure centre is the jewel in the crown of sport in Smithton.

Naracoorte


The Naracoorte Apex club once teetered on the verge of being nonexistent, with only five members only a couple of years ago.

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AN ADDRESS TO APEX INTERNATIONAL FIJI CONVENTION MAY 1994

Mr President,

Thank you for your generous introduction and appreciation from my wife Virginia and me for your invitation to be present on such an important Apex International occasion.

Mr International President,

I firstly bring warm greetings from Co-founder Ewen.

May I say this 1994 Apex International Convertion in a beautiful, peaceful, and friendly, historic country could assume great inprotance in the life of Apex. Incidently this day of Saturday May 28 sees another meeting occurring of Regional significance between the Prime Ministers of Fiji and Australia in Western Australia-A Good Omen? Firstly may I pay tribute to the great contribution made to Apex for over 33 years by Apex Fiji.

With many fine community service projects-right at this very day & with many fine leaders today I believe you have a unique opportunity to put in motion some real re thinking about Apex-Just as nations in the region are reshaping their popsitions in a spirit of mutual help-co-operation and progress towards the year 2000.

So my hope today in this atmosphere of Harmony and Goodwill in for a Convention to be filled with progressive thinking, enthusiasm, and positive action.

Your leaders have achieved almost the impossible for 3 years ago at Perth on the Apex 60th Anniversary Convention stated clearly that it was my final Apex appearance!

However, by honouring me with your invitation to open this convention my comments will lead nicely into an address which will have a lot to do with the tradition of Apex and its service and will recognise the importance of the enormous service of so many who were the early designers and planners, builders of the edifice which you have inherited today.

But I must make it abundantly clear that right at the beginning of Apex in the middle years and right.

Now to belong to Apex is a distinct honour it becomes a trust to be an integral part of a great team and a member of a distinguished, highly regarded community organisation which belongs to No one individual or group of individuals! More of that in a moment.

In order that we might gain something from this chat I will invite your questions on any one of its three parts-

- 1) Firstly, let us relate to the past for many happenings may not bo known to you.
- Secondly, I will refer to the present and many good things which are happening/or planned.
- 3) And perhaps the final piece will be the key to my apperance a kind of challenge for I will try and portray the importance of planning now/to ensure an Apex survival to the year 2000 and beyond.

So here we go into phase one way/back in my father's Geelong architect's office with Ewen Langham and myself working side by side searching for a resason to bring together a group of young chaps who might see an opportunity to cooperate in a club designed to help our fellows and assist in community good works.

ROTARY

I must tell you that by growing up with a dedicated Rotarian father their motto ``Service before Self' must have loomed large in my thinking. But an initial introduction for a chat to the then current President of Rotary Geelong could have ended in curtains for a potential Apex. I Shall not forget that Interview on a winters night in 1930 in the learned Rotarian president and Church mans study-who was destined th become a distinguished Archbishop!

So after, Announching to him the suggested brave ideas for a young mens service club he said ``Jack, I don't think it can work!'' End of interview. But much support from Rotarian father! And so we soon (about 25/30) Chaps were away to a flying start please note with an average age of no more than 24-Ewen Langham and I averaged the age of 23!!

The search for a motto badge or today you say a logo-commenced at one drawing board in the office and how appropriate that the triangle appeared with its solid base the foundation the sides became the structure leading to the pinnacle or the peak looking upwards to perfection.

This morning my three parts of this address thus become this triangle with the base being the past the sides become the présent and the peak (if we can get there) will be the year 2000.

I Should add a notable important part of our development of the first six clubs was the preparation of a constitution prepared at my father and mother's home in just a few day's hard labour by an Apex great Stan Jackling and me from which I now quote what I've always believed was and still is our vital No. 1 motto ``To develop by example a more intelligent and aggusive citizenship.

And now perhaps to the most important part of these opening remarks-I refer to the dedication and service of the hundreds and thousands of Australian overseas Apexians who gave us what you have inherited today. I repeat that you have become Trustees of this most notable organisation which belongs to no one in particular no person /no club/ no state/no country/ but not forgetting that the base or foundation for well over a decade was truly Australian and hundreds of Apex greats made it so.

Many of those Apex greats may be known to you by name/and the quite amazing national and community services successfully planned and carried out by men af Apex /averaging in age under 30/has become and unique part of Austraia's history in the 30s, 40s and 50s-today some of their successors are serving the nation of Australia in Federal or state Parliament of Local

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Government, and on hundreds of community commttees.

One of our own western Australian Apexians Len Goldsworthy become one of the most highly decorated Australian naval officers in World War 2. The Australian nations leaders have always been keenly interested in and appreciative of Apex. I can name at least five Prime Minister as well as verious State Premiers.

Right up to now/we are all proud of two recent National Presidents/recently elected to the State Parliament of S.A.I recall on my first visit to U.S.A not long after we formed Apex. I met a Founder of 20/30 in California who was to become one of my closnst friends-later a Senator who told me that 20/30 in California had as a member/one who was to go on to become a U.S President. Richard Nixon. So hopetully today in this very hall we are looking at some who will serve their countries in important office for one thing that Apex must continue to practise is leadership. Apex always was the training ground for leadership, so perhaps this should be reexamined now at every level.

And so the sides of the triangel have built the building of Apex which we see today. But this decade of the 90s is becoming one of the most vital periods for the successful implemention of your present projects and those you can still produce will surely complete the edifice to its peak or pinnacle by year 2000?

I do congratulate Apex International on a number of fine projects. I note that you have designated the great Fred Hollows Foundation as our major objective well done.

You are lacking community projects which is important to your identification with your own local communities where you will make an impact.

Apex community service in national Australia disasters, such as floods and bushfires han been outstanding and never bettered. The rally by Apex financially to major causes in Australia has made an Indelible mark from a grateful nation. In this International Year of the Family I am most impressed with Apex projects in western Australia and South Australia concentrating on problems of youth in fact. I am pleased to be identified personally with some Victorian Apex icluding State President Peter Bailley and several past National office bearers in a project tackling youth employment. Apex, Western Australia is concerned of violence to our young.

While Queensland has been exmining a wider service for youth as I just said Apex currentry involved in Victorial (initially) with three well know Apexians. State VIC president Peter Bailey.

Former National Secretary James Green.

Former National Treasurer Greg Hudswell

In the organisation Known as New committee for Development of Youth employment which in Australia has reached totally unacceptable levels. If not tackled will lead ot tragedy in their lives in family life indeed in our social fabric here there or everywhere-I see this specific service for youth as a necessary Apex cause and now I come to reasons for my 1994 controversial suggestion.

If you as participants in Aex international convention of '94 feel strongly enough about the necessity of reaching a peak or pinnacle of Apex by year 2000 you may have to do something about it now. You hve the opportunity as representatives of Apex International and others here a representatives of apex Australia to Study How.

I am extremely concerned at what I hear that there may be efforts under way to completely rewrite our original constitution by forming various parts and aspects of an Apex organisation that was never interded. I trust this fight will be deferred carried thoush and be won.

I do understand that Apex Australia is very concerned at the diminution of Apex membership. I too am concerned lest Apex allower drifts way form what it was interded to be an organisation of and for young men. with one very

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major plank in its platform or charter (and glad I am to see it in Apex International Charter.) Namely precept and example to develop a more aggressive and serviceable citizenship.

Again and Again, I believe. I have preached over the years at many Apex gatherings not only to follow your charter of citizenship but remembering that this organisation can be and should be the guardian of and for our youth. No other community organisation has this potential.

This would help to assure that you reach that peak or pinnacle by year 2000. But what I thing you must do is to also find a coordinating or consolidating theme and policy for all of Apex by not neglecting essential community service needs. But producing one united excitting theme attractive in itself for as a means to produce new and younger members and I'll add to that in a few moments.

Maybe-just maybe that theme coordinating and consolidating the whole of Apex could be for the young peoples of the nations in the important geographical region.

And as I am reaching my conclusing. I must ask you I has Apex lost its way. Is it in danger by losing its way or becoming a fragmenfed Apex with varying by groups and varying objectives and agendas.

If you are concerned then you must start to day to ensure that Apex can reach its peak and pinnacle by the year 2000.

I put one thouht to you that as representative of Apex international and Apex Australia you form cooperative type of "Study Commission" consisting of (a) Several past Apexians who are now important corporate leaders.

- (b) Several more recent Apexians with a big record as leaders.
- (c) And those recent leaders & those who will be the Apex leaders in few years ahead.

Such a commission taking a year or so of study to examine.

- (a) Whither Apex towards year 2000.
- (b) The lifting of its community, national and international recognition to a peak by year 2000.
- (c) To virtually rebuild membership by attracting and holding those up/betwen 20-30 year.
- (d) Evolving an agenda whereby Apexians will be encouraged to participate in non partisan debate on issues of national and international significance.
- (e) Ensuring the attraction of Apex for a more youthful membership.

If ever proof was needed that Apex may have lost its way and become a rather tired and boring comfortable club-just examine how many exciting/challenging/constructive agenda items to occupy uour attention of debate and new policy on this agenda of today and that of at Apex Aust. national convention in june. There out of some 38 agenda items the majority concern finance or wretched constitutional matters about three or four habe real relevance.

Unbelievably one of these is about milk bottle tops in the fridge!

So let us dedicate this gathering to what I pray may become similar to others to tollow soon to ensure that Apex will recach a peak or pinnacle by year 2000 will hold tight to those objectives that the founders and foundation builders provided.

Perhaps is it too much to hope becoming the custodians for youth providing beyond doubt that the dreams of the founders will be realised and never forsaken.

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APEX INTERNATIONAL - THE LOGO

At the 1994 Apex International Annual General Meeting, Apex International and Apex Australia's Executive Director, Andrew phillips, undertook to supply to all member Associations bromides and artwork for the Apex International logo. All member Associations should have received them by this time.

The artwork incorporated the two (2) options for single colour Apex International logos, as well as the specific details relating to the only acceptable coloured version.

the only acceptable single colour logos are as appears below :

The coloured logo should be prepared as close as is possible to the only acceptable colour logo. Modifications of this are really not acceptable and members should make every effort to confirm to a single logo Association, comprising all Apex member Associations :

Note that the highest point of the logo is to be yellow, as are the words "APEX" and "INTERNATIONAL" and which are all to be printed in the international printing colour PMS 109. The other rays of the sun are red and are to be printed in international printing colour red PMS 032. The bars behind the work "APEX" and "INTERNATIONAL" are to be printed in blue PMS 072.

To instruct printers on how to create the coloured version is achieved by the equilateral triangle being yellow, as are the words "APEX" and "INTERNATIONAL" whilst the red "Sunrays" are overprinted, over the yellow triangle. The blue bars behind the words are to be, similarly, overprinted.

The Apex International Constitution clearly states under Article 5, "Official Emblem" "5.1 the official Emblem of the Association shall be the Apex logo with the word "International" under the base and bounded."

Much has been written about the logo by the past two Apex International Presidents, and current Apex International Apexia Kutub Uddowllwah, has made it an objective of this of his year, as Apex International President, to ensure that all member Associations adopt the common logo.

Your Co-operation is sought at all levels of Apex to adopt the Apex International logo, so that the International Association of Apex Clubs can be seen to be joined under one identifiable emblem.



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



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
