
"It's a gold coin donation to get in, which goes to our club and goes back to the community." Stuart Elliott received the Club Service Achievement Award on November 28.

# Apex Age Limit Update

In 2020, the Apex National Board for the first time in the history of the association invited members over the age of 45 to consider applying for the National Board. The National Board understands that this may have created some confusion and concern regarding the management of our Association as well as potentially impacting on your own club rules. I understand that there is a bit of confusion regarding the current age limit for your clubs and the association.

#### **Apex Structure**

Prior to explaining how and why the change occurred, it is important to provide a summary of the Apex Structure.

The Apex Australia family consists of:

1. The company - Apex Australia Pty Ltd (being an incorporated entity)

2. Various Clubs being associations registered throughout the various states

### Background

As part of the changes to Apex when the states were removed there was significant discussion in relation to the age limit and at that time legal advice was received which stated that Apex Australia could limit admission to the National Board to the age of 45. This advice may have actually been correct at that point in time.

Several small but significant changes to how National Board has been operating over the past 5 – 6 years have meant that in early 2020 the Apex National Board sought additional legal advice regarding the 45 year age limit for the Apex Australia National Board. The Apex National Board was lucky to obtain the services of Sydney Barrister David Eardley who reviewed the legislation and activities of Apex Australia Pty Ltd and confirmed that the age limit in relation to Apex Australia Pty Ltd is likely to be considered age discrimination and therefore potentially illegal. Importantly this advice did not impact on the clubs which are still able to determine their own age limit (provided such limit is 45 years or older).

### Legal Advice

The legal advice is a bit 'dry' but essentially due to how Apex Australia has operated over the past 5 years (the granting of monetary grants as well as potentially having employees) the Apex National Board is not an exempt body pursuant to the Age Discrimination Act 2004.

Given the legal advice the Apex National Board considered it appropriate to allow for any Apex Member of any club to apply for the roles on National Board, providing they have met any of the other criteria.

The end result is that any member of the association (being a member of active club) is entitled to apply for a role on National Board or the National President. Importantly this does not allow life members, associates or senior actives to be appointed to the Apex National Board – only Apexians who are classed as active members.

#### Into the Future

There is no hiding from it, there is a conflict between the law and our own constitution. The current National Board view is that Apex and how we conduct ourselves should be in accordance with our own aims – put simply – Apex should aspire to be the height of citizenship. For the current national board this means that due to legal advice in addition to wanting to proactive on the issue of discrimination the current National Board allowed for the nomination of Apex members who were over the age of 45.

For whatever reason – there were no nominations for anyone over the age of 45. What is a new National Board going to do into the future is not known, for the moment the conflict between our rules and the legal advice remains.

This would be a great topic for debate at the next National Convention – any takers ?

### Nominate for Regional Communicator of National Board

Finally, it should be noted that our current National Board members and National President are 45 years or under (many are currently 45).

Should you or our club feel that members of the National Board should be under the age of 45 then the solution is simple – become and Regional communicator or nominate yourself or encourage someone to nominate to nominate for a role on the National Board.

# Legal & Compliance Update

Changes to rules regarding the use of Proxy votes at AGM (and conventions)

For those of you who zoomed into the AGM in 2020 you may have noticed that there was a bit of discussion regarding changes that National Board made to the Proxy voting system.

One of the issues of concern for the Apex National Board is the low attendance at our AGM and conventions. To hold an AGM we require at least 50% of club attendance including through the use of proxy's being held by the Regional Communicators. Over the years this has caused problems for the National Board who have in the past had to scramble to get last minute proxy forms submitted to ensure that the AGM can proceed. The concern by the National Board was especially high given the additional layer of difficulty caused by the COVID virus and travel restrictions.

To combat these concerns the National Board voted to add a rule into the manual modifying the proxy rules to ensure that our AGM could continue. These rules operate as a 'fail safe' in the event a club does attend or appoint a proxy at which time there is an automatic proxy appointed to the chairperson.

It is important to understand that this rule does not prevent a club from either attending or nominating their own proxy for the AGM. The rule changes essentially operate as an opt-out arrangement such that if a club sends a delegate to the club or appoints their own proxy then this will apply. The backup proxy rule only 'kick-in' if a club either does not send their own nominee or a club does not provide a proxy.

These changed rules do not breach a provision of the Corporation Act or our Constitution as first and foremost we are not impacting on a club's ability to nominate their own delegate or proxy.

### Finley

The highly anticipated Finley Rodeo that traditionally opens Finley's yearly events on the first weekend of January, has been postponed.

The event drew in more than 900 spectators last year which caused

event organisers Finley Apex Club, to rethink the date due to ongoing COVID-19 restrictions.

The Club will instead hold it on Easter Sunday, April 4.

According to NSW public health orders, non-ticketed events with no seating areas can have up to 500 people, however, ticketed events with seating can have up to 25 per cent of their capacity.

Finley Apex president Andrew Stephan said the grounds have limited seating and only having 25 per cent would severely impact on crowd capacity.

He said the postponement was a straightforward decision with still a lot of preparation work to go.

"We are still eager to hold the rodeo this year," Mr Stephan said.

"We've put a lot of effort into changing the set up of the grounds and we think it will encourage larger crowds and a better atmosphere."



Mr Stephan said Easter weekend will be a big few days for the competitors with the Deniliquin Rodeo scheduled for Saturday evening.

"We've previously held our event with Wangaratta Rodeo the same weekend so the competitors on tour are used to quick turn arounds."

### Jerilderie

Jerilderie Working Dog Auction organisers say the annual event will proceed as "as usual" with the date now confirmed for February 27, 2021.

Jerilderie Apex Club runs the event, with a successful history in recent years and top prices fetching more than \$20,000.

The 2020 dog auction was a big success with the event taking place prior to the COVID-19 outbreak.

Fifty-nine dogs were offered for sale with 54 selling for an overall sale average of \$7080,



almost \$1000 more than 2019. Of these 27 fully trained dogs sold for an average of \$8737.

Jerilderie Apex president Nick Gray said he foresees no interruption to next year's auction.

"We have confirmed the date and we expect to run business as usual; we don't get more than 500 people at our outdoors events and we also run nation wide with Auctions Plus," Mr Gray said.

"Having that alternative online avenue should help those who are unable to make the sale or are still being cautious about the Coronavirus."

Mr Gray is expecting another cash splash from buyers in 2021.

He said the sheep and wool markets are recovering which is often reflected in buyers' intentions.

"We've had a fantastic season on the east coast so that should be a big boost to our dog auction too."

The catalogue is in its planning phase and is expected to be released in January.

All proceeds go back to Jerilderie Apex Club to be distributed into the local community.

Matt says his career as a professional cricketer has opened up many opportunities for him to make a difference.

"When family and friends are gathered around the barbie and enjoying a game of backyard cricket, I see the love and delight in each face, and remember the lesson my father taught me, that when you look after other people, you're also taking care of yourself."

# **Apex Foundation**

Apex was formed during the Great Depression and no one reading my report in 2020 could imagine how catastrophic these times were, with the suffering experienced by so many far and wide.

It is with mixed emotions that I write this report conveying to our members, supporters and partners an overview of the Apex Foundation activities over the past 12 months. After taking on the Chairman's role a year ago, one could have never foreseen the huge bushfires that were about to encompass many parts of Australia, and the pandemic that would completely change the world, and the considerable impact that these events have had on us all, and the Foundation. This report is a bit long-winded, but

I wanted to paint a picture of how our Directors have been to the fore, and to express my sincere gratitude for their unwavering support.

As Chairman, I wanted to further engage with Apex Clubs and to do our utmost to support Apex Clubs around Australia. It is very important to always remember our roots.

Thus our Mission:

Improving the lives of children and families, and helping Apex Clubs build better communities.



The bushfires that ravaged Australia over the summer of 2019/20 were some of worst fires that the country has experienced. The Apex Foundation teamed up with Apex Australia to instigate a Bushfire Appeal. The Foundation agreed to match dollar for dollar up to \$25,000. The end result was that in excess of \$57,000 was raised, and these funds were utilised by Apex Clubs in Bairnsdale, Kadina, Traralgon, Beaufort, Gawler, South Wagga Wagga, and on the Darling Downs in their efforts to help those impacted. Our Company Secretary, Mike, also worked tirelessly in recovery work throughout NSW for four months, helping out the Office of Emergency Management. The bushfires, along with other natural disasters have also had a considerable impact on our insurance premiums, resulting in an increase of over \$10,000 this year.

The Apex Underprivileged Children's Trust was very much impacted:

celebrations and the NSW government donating \$20,000, plus the signing of a new 15-year lease, the lows started with the Chalet very close to being lost due to bushfires; which resulted in cancelled Apex work parties. Then the arrival of Covid-19 led to this facility being closed for the remainder of this calendar year. Hopefully, 2021 will see those smiling happy faces back at the magical place, and our Director, Jamie, resting a bit easier!

**The Shack** – The bushfires all but eliminated visitors over the Christmas holiday period, and Covid-19 dictated that the units were locked down for four months. The hands-on actions of Brian to have the units reopened was huge. During this upheaval, Kristine Vincent passed away in March after a long illness. Kris made an enormous contribution during the establishment of the SHACK, and for the following 20-plus years. Both Kris and husband Ray worked tirelessly in its management. The Foundation and all the underprivileged children and their families who have utilised this fantastic venue will be forever indebted to Kristine Vincent.


**Copper Coast Retreats**- The four holiday units at Wallaroo in South Australia were closed from March to June due to Covid-19. Bookings have now reopened through Cancer Council SA. The funding of these units comes from the iconic annual October Postie Bike Ride in the Flinders Ranges. The 2019 ride was most successful with \$180,000 being raised, taking the total past \$1,100,000. The Sawleys and all Mid North Apex Clubs did an incredible job, and our thanks go to all those involved there.

**The Apex Foundation Community Fund** was previously known as the General Grants Fund and then the Necessitous Circumstances Trust. We have widened its appeal and have named it more appropriately The Apex Foundation Community Fund. We have already distributed more than \$4,900 to Apex Clubs this year to help them in their local communities. We are always looking for innovative projects through which we can help raise the profile of the Fund, and to support Apex Clubs with their local projects.

Share market downturn has impacted our financial position, which resulted in the Board deciding to critically reduce the grants made, and trim our costs. Besides the Community Fund, arants are made for medical research and charitable causes, along with those supporting under privileged children via our three Civilian Widows Trusts. The Foundation made the third and final \$25,000 grant to the Juvenile Diabetes Research Fund. The Board has made a decision to consider future medical research grants which will engage the involvement of Apex Clubs. Over the past 12 months, the Queensland Civilian Widows Trust has made grants totalling \$51,000. Of these, \$21,000 were instigated through local Apex Clubs. Likewise in WA, grants totalled \$16,000, of which \$9,000 involved Apex Clubs. The NSW Civilian Widows Trust saw two of our subcommittee members, Lizette McCallum (ill health) and Geoffrey Atherden, resign. On behalf of the Board, I would like to convey to Lizette and Geoffrey our appreciation for the huge contribution they have both made over many, many years.

After excellent returns in recent years, the 2019/20 financial year was very difficult with very low interest rates and a Covid-19 induced share market correction. However, while the share market was down 12% for the year, our portfolio was down less than 5%. The return reflected the diversification and quality of our investments, and we appreciate how the Investment Chair, Lindsay and Brian, have addressed this, along with the Investment Team at Shaw and Partners, very ably led by James Gerrish. Not only did James host our last AGM, but he and his work colleague, Harry, participated in the Postie Bike Ride, and raised \$30,000 and they have raised another \$20,000 in the current year.

Stephen Bigarelli who is our Finance Director, advises that our distributions from Trusts have

gone from a positive \$661,000 in the 2019 year to a negative \$426,000 in 2020. Our overall trust value has declined from \$9,446.000 to \$8,812,000 in 2020, a reduction of 6.7%. We have been able to access the Federal Government's Job Keepers programme and other stimulus packages.

There are so many to thank for their huge contributions: Mike and Brian for the work they did with re-writing all the by-laws; Lindsay with the three newsletters; Lindsay and Jamie with the work completed with membership and the new marketing brochure; Michael Godfrey (particularly with the bushfire piece) and Bethany Paterson with their contribution on an Association perspective; and it was great to have people on our Board such as John and Graham, who were always giving when I was looking for some advice.

We have been very fortunate to have our Executive Officer, Clement Fernandez. His work ethic, honesty, adaptability is second to none. Clement readily accepted all the obstacles borne by Covid-19. Thanks Clement for your loyalty and commitment to myself and the Board. Board Meetings have been conducted utilising the online Zoom facility this year. We also had three extraordinary meetings at the height of Covid-19, making decisions about the well-being of the Foundation, our investments, and the closure/reopening of our facilities. As my report goes to press, we have four nominations for two Directors' positions, thus the need to have an election, which is a very healthy position to be in. If you have the necessary skills/business acumen to add value to our Board, together with the time and dedication, I would love to hear from you.

Finally, I need to say a huge thank you to our Company Secretary, Michael Fitze. He has been a tower of strength to myself. He does so much that goes unnoticed. Thank you Mike. Thanks.


