

From President Tom Magnire

Of all the National Conventions that have been held I feel that the one just concluded at Perth can, with confidence, be classed the most memorable. Many things add up to make it such. You all remember how a handful of Westralians at Launceston persuaded the Convention that Perth was the logical place for its next meeting. You recall how the travelling fund came into being and the hostile reception it received from many clubs. It is to the great credit of Apex that the spirit of our organisation prevailed and the convention commenced with practically all the money in hand. Then we find that approximately seventy members approximately seventy members travelled at least four thousand miles each to be in Perth for this annual get together—truly a phen-omenal performance. Perhaps these achievements may be sufficient in themselves to attach such a label but they were insignificant, really, compared with the convention these boys in the West organised.

Only those who were fortunate enough to make the trip can really appreciate what work and organisation was put into the job and what hospitality was handed out. It has never been excelled and is not likely to be for a long time. We sincerely say to Perth "Thanks for a grand job."

Did the Convention achieve anything for Apex? I think it did.

You will see in the minutes which are published with this issue of "The Apexian" full details of the discussions and the decisions made on the agenda items. Many of them are very important and I trust all clubs will deal promptly with all of those matters which call for action. There is one matter however, which I feel calls for some comment and discussion by me and that is the unanimous decision to proceed on an immediate and all-out policy of ex-pansion. The fact that a national committee has been set up to supervise this project indicates the importance the Convention attaches to it.

Our membership is not yet 2000 strong. What has been achieved by that relatively small portion of our population is certainly something of which to be proud. However, it is patent that if we want to progress to such an extent that we will become a force to be reckoned with, we must greatly increase our strength. Vital as this is, how-ever, we must not let our enthusiasm overshadow our judgment. A policy of expansion "at all costs" will not only fail to achieve the desired objective but will, I believe, put us back behind scratch. The springing into being of mushroom clubs throughout the land, I am convinced, can only result in the worst setback Apex has experienced. If the exist-ing clubs were a little more Apex minded and a little less parochial in

their outlook they would be on the look out for new Apex centres without any urging from National Con-

vention or anyone else. Experience in the past has taught us that the policy of "hastening slowly" in respect to the formation of new clubs has paid handsome dividends. That policy was designed to impress upon the Club sponsoring another that it was essential for that sponsoring club to be certain that the proposed town had not only the desirable cross section of the community available for membership but that it could maintain and retain an Apex Club. The capacity of the community in the town to maintain a flow of young men into the Club is to my mind the most important factor to be considered.

Whilst I am in complete agree-ment with the drive for expansion I feel I cannot too strenuously point out that unless it is properly and carefully handled it can only lead to disaster. I have no doubt that Rill Yates, who is in charge of the committee, realises to the full what is involved and the need for care but he has to be guided to a great extent by the nearby clubs and it is to those that I address these word; of warning. A club badly formed eventually becomes a burden on Apex. It is for that reason it is necessary to proceed with care.

CONVENTION DISCUSSIONS COVER WIDE FIELD

ANTI-T.B. CAMPAIGN AND LOCAL APEX EXPANSION HIGHLIGHTS

OF 1948 PROGRAMME

Apex stocktaking for 1947 was completed and plans for 1948 activities formulated at the Perth National Convention. The range of matters discussed, the large attendance of delegates and visitors from other States indicates that our Association has emerged from the war years as a vital force in the community and is ready to launch out, slowly and surely into more vigorous activities in the future. Highlights of Convention discussions are summarised in this article.

After the presentation of the various reports, Convention considered the choice of the National Convention city for 1949. As World Council Meeting would probably be held there at the same time, it was appropriate that Geelong, home of Apex was selected.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEMES.

The Anti-T.B. campaign was undertaken for a period of three years. That time has not yet elapsed, and the Apex job not yet completed. True it is that the goal is in sight but our efforts must not cease until the necessary measures become an accomplished fact, when Govern-

mental talk and proposals become ACTION. Adelaide has done a grand job as the club responsible for organising our efforts during the past year.

Among the many good ideas to be passed on to the incoming National Anti-T.B. Committee were suggestions for an annual nation-wide Health week and the establishment of sanatoria for children. Convention also decided that Apex should press for eventual complusory X-ray tests.

APEX ACTION.

Gordon Murray (Geelong) was again entrusted with Apex Action and ideas put forward for future consideration include some with "Citizenship" as the essential bases.

A resolution of particular merit was the appointment by each club of a member to maintain contact with Apex Action Committee and direct that action within his own club.

To head the International Liaison Committee, Langdon Parsons was again appointed.

APEX EXPANSION.

Gordon Denney and his team have done a good job investigating possible expansion of Apex to New Zealand. Here it appears that activities of the N.Z. Junior Chamber of Commerce closely parallel Apex.

A special committee with Bill Yates as Chairman is being set up to superintend our expansion within Australia and this Committee has important work to do in the future. The success of Apex expansion within Australia depends mainly on the support given this Committe by every Apexian.

FINANCE.

What is a bone of contention among some Apexians is the subject of contributions called on by National Convention in addition to per capita fees. It was moved that none should be imposed unless they have been submitted to all Clubs and agreed upon by a majority of Clubs. The motion was lost and it is up to all Apexians to accept this decision by their elected representatives at National Council.

GENERAL.

A local service scheme for consideration by clubs is to work for the ultimate Government control of the pre-school Kindergarten organisation

Another idea for consideration is the appointment of more delegates to Zone Conventions. Clubs are to place their thoughts before Zone Conventions and later, Zone opinions will go before National Council.

A job for National Council to sort out is the possible re-zoning of the whole of the Association.

Apex Action was instructed to circularise clubs on the availability of 16 m.m. films with the view to establishing a joint film library.

At the conclusion of the Convention, bouquets (verbal) were handed Perth for the outstanding job done as hosts. It was a well merited tribute.

The Colac Lifesaving Club (class of 1872) put on a demonstration (?!!) at a Perth Convention outing. While a patient (?) was madly clutching at a bottle, going down for the third time, and otherwise giving signs of being in distress, the team formed fours, tripped over their feet, got in each other's road, nearly lost their pants and then headed for a mermaid. AN AFTER CONVENTION MESSAGE FROM JOHN NORTHEY

Apex will forever remember the 1948 National Convention. It will go down on record as one of the most successful Conventions ever held, and will long be remembered as a very pleasant weekend.

The Association is indeed grateful to the Perth and West Australian Clubs. The organisation of the functions covering the Easter period was very sound, and no details were neglected; visitors were made feel right at home, and for those who visited W.A. for a short period only, details of the programme enabled them to see much of the Perth district.

Approximately 68 Apexians travelled from the Eastern States, and the total "man mileage" travelled was 121,605. The two Toowoomba fellows travelled the greatest distance, 5666 miles. The Association "Whopper Gavel" was awarded Wellington Club—of which there were 7 members present.

We had heard much of the hospitality of W.A. Our anticipations were completely excelled. I personally feel that we have nothing to worry about in the future, if we have chaps of the type of those in Perth, Bunbury, and Narrogin Clubs, within the Association.

The business of the Convention was prolonged, but to my mind not particularly outstanding. I may be wrong. National President Tom Maguire handled the meetings in an efficient manner to the satisfaction of all concerned. National Council Meetings covered much ground, and many plans for the future were formulated.

Reports and Convention Minutes are being published by "The Apexian" and I do not propose to expand on them now, save to mention that Zone and Association Reports indicate a year of progress.

During the balance of the Association Year, Clubs will be hearing from me frequently. I have many plans for the future, which with your co-operation, as

individual Apexians, will lead I hope to further development of our organisation.

I urge you all to give your best for Apex, no matter what your position within your Club, District or Zone. Some of you have been elected to positions of responsibility. I urge you to attend to your duties diligently, and to discharge your obligations worthily.

In conclusion, I would stress the need for expansion. Apex must grow, in numbers and in strength. We have a membership of 1600, not a great number, you will admit. With our present strength we have exercised an influence within the community as a whole. Two thousand members could exercise a greater influence; and remember that our Ideals are well worth developing.

WOLLONGONG CLUB'S ANTI-T.B. CAMPAIGN.

Radio Address by President John Thompson

As part of its contribution to the Association of Apex Clubs' Anti-T.B. Campaign the Wollongong Club has organised a local scheme for the mass X-ray of school children. Through the generous co-operation of the Wollongong District Hospital, the local medical practitioners and the Departments of Public Health and Education this mass X-ray of school children will be carried out free of cost. The scheme covers all school children of the age of fourteen years or over attending both public and denominational in Wollongong.

Dr. John Hughes the Deputy Director of the Tuberculosis Division of the Department of Public Health has delivered lectures to students and their parents. Local newspapers are right behind the Club and have given all possible publicity. Posters, window displays and theatre slides have also been issued. In order to publicise the scheme and give a lead to citizens of the District, the Club has been X-rayed. In officially opening the campaign over radio 2WL on the 4th February, Club President John Thompson gave the following address:—

"Good evening listeners.

ARE YOU INTERESTED IN THE HEALTH AND WELFARE OF YOUR CHILDREN?

Obviously that's a foolish question as every parent is keenly interested in the health of their children and for that reason what I have to say to you to-night is of very real importance to you.

First of all a few facts about the Campaign.

Through the generous co-operation of the Wollongong District Hospital, the local medical practitioners and and the Departments of Health and Education the Apex Club is proud to announce that it has been able to orangise a FREE X-ray of school children. All school children attending schools either public or denominational in the Wollongong District who are of the age of fourteen years or over are eligible to participate in the scheme. The only condition imposed is that you as a parent should consent to the X-ray being made. On behalf of the Apex Club I earnestly seek your co-operation in this regard.

And now a few facts about Tuberculosis.

The menace of the dread disease of tuberculosis needs no introduction to you but I would like to bring the following points to your attention.

Tuberculosis can be cured.

The Nation could be rid of this disease in a period of twenty-five years although it is the greatest killer of modern times.

However early treatment is Imperative.

The earlier the treatment commences the greater the possibility of complete recovery.

This is a disease of young people.

Most diseases are the heritage of age but tuberculosis finds very fertile fields amongst the youth of the Nation. Authorities say that the special danger period is between the ages of fourteen and twenty years.

Tuberculosis, particularly in its early stages is practically without symptoms.

And the victim rarely suspects that he has contracted the disease. Are you sure that you or your child are not infected?

Lastly, Tuberculosis can be seen but not heard and the only way of being sure is by being X-rayed.

These are the points I wish to impress upon you:—

1. Tuberculosis can be cured.

 Early treatment is essential.

Youth is very susceptible.
 Early diagnosis means early

cure.

Tuberculosis can be seen and not heard and X-ray is essential.

The Association of Apex Clubs of Australia, of which the Wollongong Apex Club is a member, has pledged itself to combat tuberculosis. The Club decided to X-ray all the school children within the susceptible age group. And bear this in mind, this being done completely

At school your child will be told all about tuberculosis and will be handed a form of consent to give to you. All that I ask is that you agree to allow your child to be X-rayed and sign and return the form of consent which will be forwarded to you. Your child will be X-rayed at the Wollongong District Hospital in school hours and will be under the supervision of a school teacher whilst the X-ray is being done. In this way the Apex Club hopes to educate the young people in the dangers of the disease and to impress upon them the need for regular X-ray examination particularly during the danger period. Should the X-ray examination suggest the existence of the disease you will be advised to consult your family doctor for further diagnosis. For this purpose you will be asked to nominate your own doctor at the time of submitting your child for X-ray. Results of all X-ray will be advised and all communications will be strictly confidential between parents and the Hospital authorities.

This campaign has been launched with the knowledge and approval of the N.S.W. Dept. of Public Health.

The Club is determined to establish a chest clinic in Wollongong and steps have been taken to enlist the support of all charitable and philanthropic organisations in the City of Greater Wollongong.



TOM MAGUIRE RESPONDS.

President Herb., My Lord Mayor, Ladies, Visitors and fellow Apexians—

First of all let me thank you President Herb, for your kind words of welcome. For most of us, this is our first visit to Western Australia and your fair city of Perth and I feel safe in saying that we have not been disappointed.

Assembled here today are delegates from all states of the Commonwealth. They have travelled very long distances, not only to assist in our deliberations, but also to honour the three Apex Clubs in Western Australia. For many years the members from here, at great personal expense, have regularly attended the conventions in other part of Australia and it is a fine tribute to them that such a large number of members have gathered here today.

This, Sir, is our fourteenth Annual National Convention. Our aim as you no doubt know is to develop intelligent and aggressive citizens. We believe that this goal can be obtained by the practice of service and fellowship and by inculcating into the young citizens of today these ideals. With this end in view, we have divided our service work into two groups, namely National and Local. club has continually on hand, service works of a civic, charitable or patriotic nature which are peculiar to their own locality and in addition are expected to take an active part in all progressive movements in their town or city. In addition the Apex Association as a whole undertakes service work of a national character in which all clubs are duty bound to take part. It may be of interest to remind you that our first National Service Scheme was one that was very near to home for Western Australians. The scheme consisted of the financing and equipping the Flying Doctor Services in the Northern Territory and North West Australia with Pedal wireless sets. This scheme involved very considerable expenditure and was carried out over a period of three years. It resulted in the much needed wireless sets being handed over to that great serice. We have further assisted the outback in rendering aid to the Bush Nursing Association and other similar organisations in each state.

Our current scheme is one which is the baby of the Perth Club, Two years ago the Perth boys convinced our National Convention that the eradication of T.B. was one of the big problems of Australia and that it was our duty as aggressive citizens to do something about it. Convention there and then decided to conduct a three years campaign with this end in view. Perth Club undertook to handle the initial stages of the campaign and they did much valuable research and spade work in the first year. Apex and the Apex Clubs and particularly Adelaide Club have done tremendous work in this drive and whilst we do not for one minute say we have been responsible for the bringing into being of the rederal Government's plan to eradicate this curse, we believe the part we played in it was very material. It looks, therefore, that at long last something is being done which might bring results. Apart from this national outlook, many clubs have succeeded in having free mass X-rays conducted in their towns and have so pestered their state authorities that results are forthcoming from those quarters also.

We are honoured. Sir, to have you present with us. It not only indicates your lively interest in Apex but also your interest in the Perth Club of which I am sure they are justly proud.

I thank you on behalf of Apex for your attendance here today and if you would be kind enough to officially open our convention we would indeed regard it as a great honour.

YOU WEAR

It's simplicity itself, this badge you wear. Though simple, it is sufficient to engineer a feeling of pride in its wearer and a feeling of respect and admiration in those that see it.

It has become symbolic of a willingness to shoulder a place of responsibility in a community. It represents honesty of relationship and sincerity of purpose at a time when moral disintegration is accepted as a necessary corollary to wartime living.


Though triangular in shape it stands four-square behind high resolve and practicable, demonstrable service to one's fellows.

It's outline is not unlike that of a pine tree and, upon consideration, many aspects of similarity between a pine tree and an Apex Club can be seen. It is evergreen. That means that it never falls from its continued state of awareness of tasks to be done. Its boughs grow closely together and are strong against winds of disregard and wrong intent. Its growth is careful, each bough maintaining symmetry, those members which have not proved their usefulness being superseded by the new growth.

Most noteworthy of all qualities is the landmark it provides. By the position it holds, undaunted by flimsy partisanship, it serves as a reminder that ideals, capable of proof by example, are still worthwhile.

As the badge you wear walks down the street it carries a proud banner which says just as strongly as if a thousand badges walked together,

Perth Carols By Candlelight Help Anti T. B. Fund

Perth's 1947 Carols by Candlelight was an outstanding success and seems assured of public support as a regular Christmas Eve function conducted by Apex. Over £100 was cleared and paid to the Anti T.B. Association of Western Australia.

Favoured with a perfect, warm and windless night, Carols were presented in the magnificent setting of the Supreme Court Gardens. The backdrop for the stage was a unique setting of natural palms, some 40-50 feet high, and on stage, Red Cross and St. John Ambulance personnel stood with colourful uniforms and blazing torches flickering on the black and white dresses and uniforms of the choristers, some 100 in number. A brilliantly lit star cast radiance over the whole stage, and created an unforgettable spectacle, as did the thousands of candles highlighting the faces of the 4,000 to 5,000 who took part in the festival.

The first section of the programme started at 8.30 p.m. and was presented with the grounds fully flood-lit. Light entertainment and music from the Perth Highland Band kent the big crowd pleasantly occupied until 9.45 when the lights were blacked out, and a torchlight procession of 60 Red Cross bearers started to thread its way through the crowd. As they mounted the dais a

colourful pianoforte presentation of "Silent Night" was rendered in candlelight to herald in the third Carols festival in Perth.

Perth's Lord Mayor was introduced by President and Organiser Elliott, and spoke fittingly of the spiritual enjoyment provided by Carols, and of Apex work in fighting Tuberculosis.

Climax of the Festival was the Nativity Scene, presented by the Perth Repertory Club.

Every Club member carried out a big job in Carols, and when the show ended at midnight with Auld Lang Syne, the chaps were able to go home knowing they'd put on a good show, which the public wants every Christmas—and too—had given further active support to our National Service Scheme.

Further Thoughts by Apexian Ken (Wagga)

How can we have more goodwill towards each other unless we have harmony in the home, and unless we have the homes, where does the harmony start?

A decent home is a primary social need and must claim first attention. A good home with all the necessary amenities for the full and healthy life of every citizen should be Apex's objective first and Australia's also. Provision of the above would automatically solve the populate or perish problem

ish problem.

Wagga suggests each community, led by Apex should form a "Homes for all" Committee with full and representative membership. Build up local support and then tackle political representatives.

FACTORS FOR CONSIDERATION Decentralisation.

Back to Land policy. Encourage local production of building materials, improve country facilities, reduce fares and freight. Creation of small block settlements mostly self supporting.

Local Co-operation.

Of all sectors of community.

The Home.

Improved facilities for Mothers, Maternity Ambulances and Convalescent homes. Improved consulting clinics for disabilities of young children. Better and more home deliveries. Improved travelling facilities for Mothers and children.

Provision of creches at places of entertainment. More playing areas, preferably small areas close to residential sections.

Taxation.

Revision and reduction of present excessive taxation which kills initiative and private enterprise, also honest ambition. Increase allowance for wife and children to a figure closer to real cost.

Individual.

Personal example to be set by Apexians and State and National leaders. Fighting of selfishness, dishonesty, black marketing, immorality and laziness. A return to Christian prinicples.

Apex has the chance. What do you think?

JUNIOR APEX

Former Perth Apexian makes an important suggestion.

It has been the belief of a few that Apex could readily take over the care of Youth by the introduction of Junior Apex, a body which would be open to the youth from the age of 14. The conduct of this junior body would be under supervision tending to accentuate the ideals of decency, aiding the lads to organise their own outings, functions, activities in the world of sport. Attention could be given to the direction of their thoughts along the paths of cooperation with every organisation dedicated to aiding the welfare of the Commonwealth of Australia or the welfare of our fellow man. Neither sectarian religion nor party politics should find a place in the teachings of Junior Apex, but strenuous efforts should be made to cause a lad to think for himself instead of accepting the party-political beliefs of his parents. If one learns to drive a car from a person ill-suited to teach, he usually inherits that tutor's bad habits on the road. Similarly, a lad usually learns his politics from a parent's dissertations, and your often the blind secontary. and very often the blind acceptance of political beliefs follows without the lad having had the common-sense to think for himself. It is not suggested that Apex become a combatant in the political arena, but it is suggested that the clubs should do their duty in training the youth of the nation to think before they utilise the vote given to them. More important still, the boy of today could be kept off the streets during the whole time when the majority of them come to trouble of some kind because of association with other lads without proper direction and supervision. It could be the duty and ideal of Apexians to foster hobbies and sports of all kinds, organise visits to places or industries of interest, to generally act as big brothers to these boys and sow the seeds of confidence and respect.

It is suggested that the boy should be compulsorily retired at the age of 21 years, in much the same manner at present Apexians are retired from active membership of the present organisation. It is thought that upon being dismissed from Junior Apex, he would materially miss the fellowship of boys and men with whom he has associated for the most of his most impressionable life. The loss of those associations would inevitably direct him towards membership of Apex in the form we know it today. There, with his early training in the junior branch, it is felt that he would be a much more virile Apexian than the general member of today. He would already have the principles ingrained in his heart and it seems unlikely that he would need the urging necessary to incite the average Apexian to activity of any type.

It is felt that Apex does not enjoy the position it rightly deserves and it is possible that the training thus given to the lad, let us call it an apprenticeship, would ultimately fit him for a much more virile and useful life than he would otherwise be capable of living.

Concerning the retiring age of 40, it is felt that the usual type of Apexian realise that he has joined an order which is going to dispense with his services at an age when he has made his place in the world and has the time and incentive to devote his efforts to something useful in life. It seems to me that in realising this fact, the Apexian then decided to give his time and effort to other pursuits which will remain as an interest to him for the remainder of his life, or until he tires of his interest. It is felt that the thoughtful man rather resents being dispensed with at the time of his life when he is acutely conscious of the passing years and consequently dispenses with Apex before it finally dispenses with him. Hence the reason for the turnover in membership.

Under the scheme which I have suggested, at the age of 40 the members could be retired from Apex, to be readily absorbed in Senior Apex, there to function in the capacity of an assistant to any club efforts, to act as guide and friend to the members of Junior Apex, to assist the boys with their schemes and to guide their thoughts along the paths they should follow.

WANTED - MORE RADICALS

From a talk by John D. Kendall, Fine Arts Dept., Muskingum College, Concord, Ohio.

(Reprinted from The Activian)

An article in which we may read "Australia" for "America".

We need more radicals . . .

Radicals. I can see the awful mental images chasing in and out of your minds. But before these get too active — let me explain what I don't mean by radicals. I don't mean:

Those who plot with fire and dynamite—the wild and woolly who would change our sweet and lovely civilization into a shamble. The unmoral wretch who would outrage defenceless womanhood. The party line Communist, or the nihilistic Fascist. Not even the guy who wears a flashy red Windsor tie and goes barefoot.

At the worst when I mentioned radicals, I imagined you were thinking of an undisciplined, dangerous political crackpot—a shifty, wild-eyed, cantankerous delinquent heading straight for a criminal record. At best, I am afraid you envisioned a hazy harmless, head - in - the - clouds, idealistic dreamer—a do-gooder and a starry-eyed parlor pink.

What do I mean by radical, then? I mean just what that good solid American, Noah Webster, meant: someone or someoriginal, fundamental, reaching to the centre or ultimate source; affecting the vital principles. He adds: in politics, one who advocates radical changes in laws and methods of government with the least delay. When I say we need more radicals, I mean people who combine these characteristics. In other words: people who ask fundamental and severe questions about major issues. People who find causes and work hard for them. People who get excited about injustices wherever they occur, and who want to find out what's really behind them. We need that kind of people, people who THINK!

Why should I be asking for more radicals? Why even that stern-jawed-arch conservative, Winston Churchill, once said something to this effect: If a person isn't a radical at the age of 18, he's stagnating. He added, (probably in self defence), but if he isn't a conservative by the time he's sixty, he's crazy. All right, so conservatism is something we grow into. But what could be more horrible than conservatism 40 years too soon?

YOUTH AND NEW IDEAS

If you're conservative already, what kind of politically hardened arteries will you have 10, 20 or 50 years from now? Youth is the time for radicalism at its best . . . for questioning for new ideas — for causes. For skepticism on the one hand, and idealism on the other.

But, you say, youth is disillusioned, uncertain. What we need most is conviction, faith, unshakeable certainty. Sure! but to be solid and lasting, these must come through questioning, mental turmoil and disciplined thinking. What good is faith or conviction if it is a handme-down? It takes time to build up a solid and sure conviction. And it implies at some stage of the game a radical outlook!

So far, then, I have made a plea for more radicals. I have started a belief that the natural time for radicalism is in youth. And I have expressed a fear that the lack of radical thinking in youth may result in premature and unsound conservatism.

REASONS

Why am I worried about these things right now in particular? For several reasons:

First of all, if I wanted to be sarcastic—and I do—I could say that we may live, politically speaking in rather an antiseptic community. where simple pure Republicanism or Democracy, as the case may be, cleanses our thoughts of any dangerous germs. This means that the radical, the questioner, has to work harder to get a word in edgewise, and that he's got a minority complex when he does.

Second—there seems to be a feeling all too often that even the discussion of issues, especially political issues, is in itself too disturbing, too tied up with radicalism for true

Christians or true citizens to have anything to do with. Personally, I can't agree that Christ's way of dealing with social and political problems was not to give explicit answers, but to look for fundamentals, throw light on the issues, and then turn the problem back to human minds for solution. This is essentially a radical method. I believe that the true radical can be a Christian, and that the true Christian should certainly be a radical.

The way it is now, if Thomas Jefferson were to return to life, and read the Declaration of Independence, in some communities he would be taken in for subversive activities. You see, the Declaration of Independence has that little clause in it about having the right to change their government if they don't like it. That's definitely subversise!

WHAT IS THE WORLD'S REAL MENACE?

Is this craze over un-American activities merely a passing fad, or is it something permanent? In either case, it has become a very real danger to radicals, to intelligent people and to conservatives alike, and along with this, a disrupting influence in our national thinking.

Let me explain: The dominant factor in world politics today is not, I believe, the fear of the U.S.A. by Russia, but the reverse. It is the fear of Russia which grips the United States—the U.S.A., with its control of half the land and all the oceans in the world, plus the atom bomb. This fear of Russia is being intensified by so-called diplomats on both sides, to such an extent that it sometimes becomes almost an obsession. How can we negotiate successfully in this kind of atmosphere?

Then, there are many, I believe, who, would like to use the Communist scare to obscure the really important thing, which is this: the real disaster for the world would be a major depression in the United States. That is the biggest danger of all. If that comes to pass, such issues as the aid to Greece bill would become utterly insignificant and minor factors. A major depression would be a world calamity. What are the issues involved now in our country? We all know what they are, really; the lack of housing, the high cost of living, the moves to cut down

income tax, the anti-labor legislation which may come if strikes become widespread, the problems of public ownership, peacetime conscription—a military economy based on armament . . . these are the things which must be faced, discussed and solved. They are vastly more important than the Communist bugaboo.

The tragedy of our own day is that America, the potential leader of the world has abandoned, in fear, its objective of building democracy, and has substituted for a negative slogan: stop Communism! Why can't we realize that we haven't the time nor the security to promote witch hunts and other petty irritations? We must not delay in attacking the real problems. There is a terrible urgency.

To summarise: we need radical thinkers. Youth is the time for this. There must be a discussion of controversial issues, and what is behind them.

It hurts to watch the fumbling and uncertainty of those confused men making the world's decision, and we can't help remembering what T. E. Lawrence said after the first world war:—

"When we achieved and the new world dawned, the old men came out again and took from us our victory and remade it in the likeness of the former world they knew. Youth could win, but had not learned to keep, and was pitiably weak against age. We stammered that we had worked for a new heaven and a new earth, and they thanked us kindly and made their own peace."

MINUTES OF MEETING

"Held at Prince of Wales, Wednesday, the 2nd October, '35 at 7.15 p.m.

Business: Reading of correspondence for formation of Apex in Bunbury. Sanction for formation granted by telephone to Colin."

Thus it all began. A movement destined in a few years so to grow and to leave its mark in civic life.

Much has happened since that first meeting at the "Prince" just twelve years ago—attended by a mere handful of fellows. No time was lost in seeking service jobs and in adding to the membership, which, by the time the Charter dinner was held on 22nd February, 1936, had grown to 25.

Within little more than a year Apex Bunbury had been responsible for the establishment of an Infant Health Centre, for taking as a ward the young lad who had lost his legs in an accident. This lad remained a ward of Apex for ten years, being seen through his education, his early employment and apprenticeship in the footwear trade.

In other ways the Club began to make its presence felt. Apex Hill took shape — a garden on a high vantage point in the town— various new equipment appeared in the town Hospital wards—the National Convention of Apex adopted Bunbury's suggestion that the Flying Doctor Scheme become the Apex National job for several years—young faces appeared at the Municipal Council table—Apexian faces—and a host of smaller jobs proceeded as Apex Bunbury grew in stature.

In all this work, one name stood out, Colin Campbell, founder of Apex in Perth, Bunbury and Narrogin who for his service was conferred with a Life Governorship by the 1946 National Convention.

Much more could be said and written of jobs tackled—of the Soap Box Derby to which the whole town turned out, of the ten weeks Appeal which raised two and a half thousand pounds for Patriotic Causes. Then, when enthusiasm was at its highest came war and Bunbury membership fell from fifty to nine almost overnight. Those remaining nine were so busy with associated war activities, that even one night a month for a dinner was difficult for all to manage. Club Service jobs as such, fell to nil, but all were resolved that the Club must be kept alive, and to this end, Ian Anderson gave inspiration. His outstanding job was recognised by the Bunbury Club and the No. 4 Zone, when later he was elected a Life Member of Bunbury Club.

And today—what of today?

Most of the boys came back. A few have paid the Supreme Sacrifice. To them our thanks are due. It is not without remembrance of them that Apex Bunbury today, with many a new face, is again building itself into the life of the community.

Today, Apex again flourishes at Bunbury. A Free Kindergarten will eventuate as soon as a building permit is granted. Many children will be the happier this year for toy making efforts through the winter. Membership waxes. It was a Bunbury member who, in 1945, urged Apex to hold future National Conventions in the remote corners of Australia as well as in the centre of the Apex swim. Bunbury we are glad to meet you

The Association of Apex Clubs ANNUAL REPORT

PRESENTED TO THE FOURTEENTH NATIONAL CONVENTION, HELD AT PERTH (W.A.), EASTER, 1948.

ANNUAL REPORT OF NATIONAL SECRETARY-TREASURER, JOHN NORTHEY.

It is with no small amount of pride and pleasure that I present this, my first report as your National Secretary-Treasurer. Pride, because this year has been one of noteworthy progress, with much achieved, and pleasure because your National Council, at Easter, 1947, saw fit to appoint me to this honoured position.

THE 1947 NATIONAL CONVENTION was held at Launceston (Tasmania), which Club acted as host Club of Zone 3. The members of the Launceston Club deserve the highest praise for the manner in which they organised the Convention. Fellowship and Social arrangements were of a high standard, and business was efficiently dealt with by Past National President Bill Tresise and National President Tom Maguire.

TOM MAGUIRE, of the Wollongong (N.S.W.) Club, as indicated above, was elected National President for the term 1947-1949. During his first year in office, Tom has acquitted himself well, and has given much time to the affairs of the Association.

LIFE GOVERNORS were unanimously elected as follows:—Stan Jackling (Albury, N.S.W.); John Sykes (Wollongong, N.S.W.); Bill Tresise (Lismore, N.S.W.), The congratulations of all Apexians are extended to these fellows.

Pre-Convention Committees met under the chairmanship of Ralph Hoare, Bill Yates, Lindsay Cust, and Bill Simpson. The Committees spent considerable time discussing affairs of major importance, and their findings considerably reduced the difficulties which faced the business meetings of the Convention.

business meetings of the Convention.

The Convention marked a definite stage in the development of the Association, in that many matters which had been under discussion for some considerable

time were finished.

ROY FIDGE. The year under review has seen the retirement from office of Roy Fidge, Geelong Club. Roy, a Life Governor of the Association, had for many years occupied the position of National Secretary-Treasurer. During those years, Roy has applied himself diligently to the organisation and development of the Apex movement. His work will forever remain as a permanent record of the sacrifice which a keen Apexian is prepared to make to further the Ideals which we aim to achieve. We know that at times this sacrifice has been great.

The Association is pleased to place on record a small expression of appreciation, though words cannot adequately express the debt which we owe this staunch

INTERNATIONAL LIAISON COMMITTEE.
Langdon Parsons has been Chairman of this Committee in succession to Geoff Drury. The Committee comprised the following:—Keith Cambrell, Bob Hastwell, Ross Paterson, and Gus Dodd.

The Committee has been active throughout the year, and correspondence has been maintained with the overseas organisations with which Apex is affiliated, as a Charter member of the World Council of Young Men's Service Clubs. Many Clubs are in direct contact with Clubs overseas. The Association would place on record an expression of appreciation to Langdon Parsons for the work he has successfully undertaken during the past four or five years, furthering the cause of Fellowship with youth of other lands. This work has not been limited to the period of Chairmanship of the International Liaison Committee.

APEX ACTION COMMITTEE. The Apex Action Committee has functioned under the direction of the following:—Gordon Murray (Chairman), Horrie Hambling, Gordon Orchard, Bill Holt. All are members of the Geelong Club.

The work of the Committee was interrupted somewhat by the absence overseas of Chairman Gordon Murray, who represented Apex at the 1947 meeting of the World Council.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME. The year has seen the continuation of the National Service Scheme adopted by the 1946 Convention at Goulburn, namely, "Anti-T.B." The 1947-48 Committee, which continued the work put under way by the Perth Committee, comprised the following:—Don Williams (Chairman), Jim Cotchett, Harry Williams, Gordon Duffield, all of the Adelaide Club.

This Committee will be recording in detail at Convention, and future activity and action will be deter-

mined.

Unfortunately the Committee's activities have been somewhat hampered by a lack of co-operation on the part of some Clubs.

"THE APEXIAN." After a period of trouble, following upon the tragic death of Editor John Larkey, the 1947 Convention appointed the following Committee of Management to handle the affairs of the Association:—Roy Griffiths (Editor), Vautin Andrews (Asst. Editor), Col Bowen (Business Manager), Bruce Wemyss (Asst. Business Manager).

A comprehensive report appears elsewhere, therefore I will limit my comments to an expression of appreciation. The copies which are now being published are of a high standard, and worthy of our organisation.

NEW ZEALAND EXPANSION COMMITTEE. The following members of the Goulburn Club were appointed at Launceston to form this Committee:—Gordon Denney (Chairman), Reg Slater, Frank Pritchard.

Investigations were undertaken regarding the proposed expansion to New Zealand, and the findings of the Committee are fully reported elsewhere in this report. Future activity will be determined by Convention

WAR DEPENDANTS' FUND.—This fund is being administered by the following:—Alan David (Chairman), Jack French (Secretary), Geo. Harvey, Jack Hine, members of Geelong Club. The monies held have been invested as instructed by the 1947 Convention and are available upon request and consideration by the Committee. It is important that all Clubs keep in contact with dependants of their members who paid the supreme sacrifice during the recent war.

DELEGATE, WORLD COUNCIL MEETING. Gordon Murray (Geelong) was selected to represent Apex at the 1947 meeting of the World Council of Young Men's Service Clubs, held at Montreal, Canada. Whilst overseas Gordon proved to be a worthy ambassador for Apex, in addition to proving himself an active and persuasive Delegate, at the actual Council Meeting. He visited many Clubs of 20/30, Active International, and Kinsmen. Following upon his return to Australia, Gordon, at his own expense, visited numerous Clubs, telling the story of the World Council Meeting. Reports have appeared in "The Apexian," and visitors to Perth for this Convention will have a further opportunity of hearing Gordon speak.

Langdon Parsons has already been selected to represent Apex at the 1949 meeting of the World Council, which will take place at Hastings, England, during the month of May.

NEW CLUBS. The growth of the Association has not been spectacular throughout the year. Two Clubs have been chartered, namely, Burnie (Tasmania) Club No. 51, and Temora (N.S.W.) Club No. 52. My records indicate that at the present time approximately fifteen centres are under investigation. National Council feels that quite often Clubs take this matter of investigation too lightly—that too many centres are not thoroughly investigated, and opportunities of forming thus lost.

Zone 5 has formed a "Queensland Expansion Committee," under the chairmanship of Bill Yates of Toowoomba Club, and a similar procedure is recommended to other Zones. The Committee referred to has already investigated several centres, and one Club at least, at Bundaberg, is meeting regularly.

FINANCE. Financial statements appear elsewhere in this Report. I will leave detailed comment to our financial experts. Expenditure for the year has been heavy, with many commitments, principally the reprint of the revised Constitution, and the printing of the Dinner Record Books. The expenditure has been justified however, and with particular regard to the latter item, the comments received from many sources indicate the value of the Record Book.

Auditors have been Geo. Harvey of Geelong, and following the transfer of the Association Records to Inverell, Bill Yates of Toowoomba. Thanks are extended to these Apexians. George Harvey has been the Association Auditor for many years, and appreciation is expressed for the services he has rendered.

I am personally not satisfied with the manner in which some Clubs attend to their financial obligations, and I propose to bring this matter before National Council for consideration. Old accounts are many, and have been in existence for over twelve months in some cases.

The Balance Sheet shows a deficit of £401/8/9. This consists of Per Capita payments which have not yet been made, but were due for payment on 30th November last

GENERAL. Successful Zone Conventions, and District Conventions have been held throughout the Association, and the volume of business handled has been large.

The Association extends appreciation to the Zone, District, and Club officials who have attended diligently to the duties relative to their positions. To others, National Council would suggest that they give of their best, realising that they have been elected to fulfil a position of honour.

Association business has been conducted by mail, and contact has been maintained with Clubs by the same method. I would suggest that greater attention to Association matters would result in an improvement in general efficiency. From time to time Association business is outlined in General Circulars, which often, I fear, do not come before meetings of Club Boards of Directors.

A circulation of bundles of Dinner Notices has continued throughout the Association, and has resulted in improvement in the general standard of notices.

I personally have had a difficult time adjusting myself to the position which I now occupy, familiarising myself with all the aspects of the office, and duties related thereto. The transfer of the Association Records from Geelong to Inverell was accomplished smoothly, largely due to the careful planning of Roy Fidge. Early records of the Association remain in Geelong, in the custody of Roy Fidge, their transfer would have caused considerable difficulty. They are available for reference whenever required.

In conclusion, I would urge all Clubs to justify their existence by an active furtherance of the Ideals of the Association; I would urge them to value the Association itself, for without it, they cannot function successfully. Only as a united organisation can we exert an influence in our respective communities, and our country as a whole.

REPORT OF NATIONAL PRESIDENT, TOM MAGUIRE.

Fellow Apexians,

You have before you such detailed and comprehensive reports from your National Secretary-Treasurer, John Northey, and your Zone Presidents that I will content myself by making a few general observations of the year's activities as I see them.

We commenced the year with a complete new set of Association Officials. We had the difficult task of transferring headquarters from Geelong to Inverell, and on top of all, the "over-forties" left us in July. Whether Apex came through that difficult period satisfactorily is not a question to be decided, but if it didn't, it is not the fault of Roy Fidge or John Northey, both of whom worked untiringly to complete the change over without loss of efficiency.

The achievements of the year were undoubtedly the work of the Adelaide Club in its Anti-T.B. Campaign, the gains made by Gordon Murray in the international field at Montreal, and the efforts made by all Zones to form new Clubs.

The eradication of Tuberculosis in Australia was adopted at the Goulburn Convention in 1946, as a three year National Service Scheme. During the first year much progress was made by the Perth Club in getting the campaign lined up, but it received little co-operation from Clubs. During the current year, the task of bringing the campaign to completion was entrusted to the Adelaide Club. How those boys handled the position you all know. It is a long time since such drive and enthusiasm has been shown in Apex, and we are all happy to know that largely through their efforts, the campaign has been advanced considerably. We all hope to see them bring it to a successful conclusion this coming year.

As you all know, Gordon Murray of Geelong Club, represented you at the World Council Meeting in Montreal. Some Clubs have already had the good fortune to hear Gordon speak since his return. Gordon did a grand job over the other side, and our sincere thanks go out to him.

Although only two Clubs, Burnie and Temora, received their Charter during the year, I am very happy to learn that several other centres are under investigation. From information received to date, it would appear that at least three of these should be granted Charter in the next few months. This move to expand

is indeed a very healthy sign, but I would like to remind those Clubs sponsoring a new Club that their duties in this respect are not to be taken lightly. Whilst expansion is desired it is not to be accomplished at all costs. Great care must be taken to see that the area can maintain and retain a Club.

On the debit side, we still have the same lack of co-operation amongst some Clubs, and individuals, that has been apparent over a period of years. If the defaulters could only realise what extra work it places on your officials, and how it retards the work of the Association, less would be seen of it. Let us try to make this year different for once.

I have had the extreme pleasure of visiting several Clubs during the year. I was particularly struck by the preponderance of youth that exists in many Clubs, and the way these "young 'uns" have grasped the torch thrown to them by the "old 'uns." It was indeed the most encouraging sign I have seen in Apex for some time.

In conclusion, let me repeat once more the thanks of the Association to our past Secretary-Treasurer, Roy Fidge, for the sterling and unselfish work which he put into Apex over a very long period. I can't let the opportunity pass without also recording our thanks to John Northey for a job well done, and to all other Association officials and committees for their untiring work during the year.

APEX ACTION REPORT. Chairman: GORDON MURRAY.

I feel that I have not achieved a great deal during my term in office as Chairman of the Apex Action Committee, but I seek some forgiveness through the fact that two months after assuming office I had the good fortune to be elected as your Delegate to the meeting of the World Council in Montreal.

In July, a circular (on the basis of the fine report prepared by Vern Green of the Hobart Club) was published in "The Apexian" urging all Clubs and members to play an active part in fostering a campaign to aim at drawing the attention of the public to Australia's declining birth-rate. It is pleasing to report that many Clubs have given some thought to this matter, and at a later date, we hope to press the campaign. I say "at a later date," because National Council has decided to let the matter rest for the moment for it was felt to be cutting across the work of the Anti-T.B. Committee. It is doubtful whether attacking politicians on two subjects at the same time is sound policy, and certainly, most Clubs can give more time to the T.B. problem if not faced with another National campaign.

The Apex Action Committee has backed the Anti-T.B. Committee in its work, and we urge you to throw your weight into the task as it enters upon its third year.

Is yours a Club that has a guilty conscience when it looks at the organisation some other Clubs have achieved? And, can you honestly say that you have acted upon and answered all the circulars you have had from the Adelaide Committee?

Our duty, as a Committee, is to develop in Apex the aggressive spirit of citizenship, and with that in mind, we have written a letter of welcome to new members drawing their attention to that article of the Constitution which the Apex Action Committee works upon.

The travelling I did on my return from America brought me into contact with fellows from more than twenty of our Clubs. In most of those Clubs the object of serviceable and aggressive citizenship was strong; but I feel that there are a few of us who could co-operate more readily with those who are working on the overall Apex policy. Do give them your help in the coming

Apex year.

This I must say in conclusion. Horrie Hambling, assisted by Gordon Orchard and Bill Holt kept the Apex Action Committee going whilst I was away, and for sometime after I returned. I am very grateful to them.

REPORT OF INTERNATIONAL LIAISON COMMMITTEE

Chairman: LANGDON PARSONS

After two years as Chairman of the International Liaison Committee, Geoff Drury found that he could not accept re-nomination, and at the National Convention held at Launceston, 1947, I was elected the new I.L.C. Chairman. The personnel of the Committee to assist was left in my hands, and shortly afterwards, the selection of Ross Paterson, and Gus Dodd of Glenelg Club, and Keith Cambrell and Bob Hastwell of the Adelaide Club was announced.

The new Committee, on receipt of the I.L.C. files, found that I.L.C. work generally has been at a comparative standstill for some months awaiting direction from the World Council, as well as Chairman Geoff having had to concentrate on business matters largely to the exclusion of Apex work.

As information regarding overseas in Apex Clubs was out of date, all Clubs were circularised asking for details about what contacts they had with Round Table, and what further correspondence they would be prepared to start with other member organisations of the World Council of Young Men's Service Clubs.

Unfortunately, the replies were disappointingly slow from the majority of Clubs, and many valuable weeks were lost as a consequence. It was necessary to send out a further circular, this time addressed to the Club President, but even then some Clubs failed to reply.

However, after a majority had eventually supplied the information desired, a survey showed that Apex Clubs generally were desirous of continuing correspondence with Round Table, as well as wanting to open Club to Club contacts with kindred organisations overseas.

Your I.L.C. felt that the correspondence scheme between Apex and Round Table should be consolidated before attempting enlargements elsewhere, so several letters were sent to the Round Table Association before any acknowledgement was received. It was not until 6th October, 1947, that we received two long awaited and most welcome letters from the new Round Table National President, Leslie Crew, and also the new International Relations Director, Oliver Pincock, both of which assured us most definitely that Round Table were very interested in the correspondence scheme.

Subsequently, Round Tables were circularised by the I.R. Director, Oliver, to find out those keen to correspond, and towards the end of October, the first letter from the Round Table to an Apex Club under this new scheme was received. Since then, letters to Apex Clubs have been received from twenty-six Round Tables, in some cases it being necessary to allot a different Apex Club from that selected because of duplication by Round Tables.

It must be borne in mind, that sixteen Apex Clubs have been in regular touch with Round Tables for well over a year, and most of these have sent food or clothing parcels which have been gratefully received.

Summarised this means that forty-nine Round Tables are in correspondence with Apex at the present time.

When it was seen that the scheme with Round Tables was definitely on the move, we wrote to the three kindred organisations in North America, intimating our desire to begin Club to Club correspondence with them, at the same time, listing those Apex Clubs which were interested. Unfortunately, no progress in this direction can be reported to date. However, it is hoped that the near future will see a start made.

Several letters to the President or I.L.C. Chairman of the Association of Kinsmen Clubs, Active International, Twenty-Thirty International, Round Table Association of Great Britain and Ireland, as well as the Round Table Association of Europe, have been forwarded during the year, together with several copies of each issue of "The Apexian." Copies of the new Apex

Constitution and also handbooks on Australia have recently been sent also. A five hundred word article on Apex was prepared for publication abroad, during the year.

Unfortunately, very few copies of Official Publications from overseas have arrived.

On the occasion of the National Convention of each organisation, cabled greetings from Apex were sent, and these were in each case, enthusiastically received. Emanating from the 1946 Annual Meeting of the World Council, it was recommended that all Clubs of Member Organisations should hold an International Goodwill Meeting during May, 1947, and many Apex Clubs held special functions, at which Certificates of Membership of the World Council were presented. It is intended to hold a similar function during 1948, at the same time, hoping to spread the idea beyond Apex.

The Annual Meeting of the World Council was held in Montreal in August, 1947, and Gordon Murray (Apex Action Chairman), was selected to represent us. Largely due to his efforts, the meeting recommended that each member organisation adopt an "aid for Europe" Scheme, and this has been done in at least two instances.

At the World Council Meeting in Montreal, it was agreed that the 1949 Meeting of the World Council would be held in Australia.

Gordon also attended the National Convention of Kin, as well as delivering twenty-nine addresses to forty-nine Clubs in Canada and U.S.A. He was interviewed by over twenty newspapers, whilst away, and also broadcast for the Australian Information Bureau over 106 radio stations.

On returning to Australia, he travelled considerable distances to address many Apex Clubs on his trip. It is obvious from reports received from overseas, that he was an excellent ambassador for both Apex and Australia.

As will be seen from the foregoing report, much preliminary work has been necessary, and as a consequence, progress has been slow to date. We sincerely believe however, that the next twelve months will see substantial consolidation of our overseas correspondence scheme, provided ALL Apex Clubs give prompt attention to any requests which the I.L.C. may make, together with anticipated co-operation from our friends overseas.

"THE APEXIAN."

Report of Editor ROY GRIFFITHS.

"The Apexian," in its new format, and at its new price of 1/6 has been operated without drawing upon accumulated funds. The price rise has been due to increased costs of printing, paper, block-making, and to the added news coverage and features provided in the publication itself.

The magazine style adopted is considered most appropriate for the character of our Association and its activities. A reduction of 3d. per copy would mean one of three alternatives:—

- (a) Using up £90 of the accumulated funds during the coming year.
- (b) Eliminating practically all pictorial features.
- (c) Reduction in size of around twelve pages per issue.

The margin on cost is 1.43 pence per copy.

The Board views with concern the non-compliance of some Clubs with Article 12, Section 5 (P.8) of the Constitution, and Article 9, Section 6 of the By-Laws (P. 24).

The uncertainty of paper supplies, plus the fact that it is impossible to forecast the amount of space economically available for advertising in each issue until all news items are to hand, has meant that the Board has refrained from any large scale activity in this matter. However, approaches are now being made to a limited number of National advertisers.

The Board expresses sincere thanks to those who have regularly forwarded Club notes and other material for publication. It is encouraging to note that contributions are growing in number but the 100 per cent. representation of Clubs is still a long way off.

TRUSTEES' REPORT, WAR DEPENDENTS' FUND. Chairman: A. R. DAVID.

There have been no payments on account of dependents during the year, and it will be noted that the Fund has increased from £1051/12/6 to £1059/19/10—a nett amount of £8/7/4.

In accordance with the direction of the last National Convention, the funds, (excepting an odd balance) have been invested in Commonwealth Bonds.

Regular meetings of Trustees have been held during the year, and have been well attended.

Circulars asking for confirmation of data relative to dependents and requesting particulars of additional dependents were forwarded to Clubs in June, 1947. The response was not satisfactory, as only 26 out of 45 Clubs replied.

It was then necessary to send out up to three circulars to some Clubs before a reply was received. At the date of this report (31/1/48) the following Clubs have NOT replied.—

WAGGA WAGGA BATHURST NEWCASTLE

At this date no direct requests have been made for assistance, but an examination of the answers to questionnaires revealed that approx. eleven Clubs have cases where assistance may be required at a future date. The particulars appear to be approx twelve wives of deceased Apexians, and fourteen children.

The Trustees are in agreement with recommendations submitted by the last National Convention, and have endeavoured to carry out the duties and responsibilities which they were requested to undertake.

However, we feel a sense of disappointment at the non-co-operation of certain Clubs in the matter of

returning questionnaires when asked.

The future success of the Fund depends upon Club Presidents personally undertaking to see that the Trustees are advised of cases meriting assistance.

NATIONAL ANTI-T.B. SCHEME.

Report of Adelaide Club, 22nd March, 1948.

In taking over this National Service Scheme, we adopted the four points of our petition to our State Government, which was as follows:—

(a) The appointment of Federal and State Directors of Tuberculosis.

(b) Adequate means by X-Ray facilities for locating the disease.

(c) Adequate Hospital accommodation for cases so located.

(d) More financial assistance for the dependents of T.B. sufferers.

It was realised that this scheme was too big for Apex alone, so that our policy was extended to cover all charitable, civic, and Church organisations in the Commonwealth.

The Policy was to sell the headquarters of any of these organisations, and for them to request their Branches to do the following:—

- (a) Write to their Federal Member of Parliament, to attend one of their meetings, and give them a talk on what the Government was doing to eradicate T.B.
- (b) After the Meeting their Branch to carry a resolution urging the Government to further their efforts.
- (c) Send copies of these resolutions to State and Federal members as well the State and Federal Ministers of Health.

It was also intended that country Apex Clubs sell this policy to any local charitable organisations which did not have headquarters in a Capital city.

We requested each Club to appoint from amongst its Board Members, a fulltime Director of T.B. to carry out our instructions. A number of Clubs did so, but not all Clubs. We also requested each capital city to form a State Committee, with the object of selling the State headquarters of these Civic organisations, etc., on our Policy. Unfortunately State Committees have not been formed in Brisbane, Hobart, nor Sydney. State Committees have been formed in Melbourne, Adelaide, and Perth.

We circularised all Clubs with 17 Circulars, and adopted the principal of answering any questions which they had raised in our circulars.

This gave all Clubs in Australia an opportunity to read what each other Club was doing.

A considerable amount of work has been done by different Clubs, where-as in others we have had no support what-so-ever.

One of the first things we asked all Clubs to do was to write to Dr. Wunderley, on his appointment, and congratulate him. All Clubs did not do this. Another thing we asked all Clubs to do was to invite their Federal Member of Parliament to address them. Not all Clubs carried out this request.

Some of the Clubs put in an amazing amount of work, particularly those visited by Mobile X-Ray Units. This applied in country Apex Clubs, but has also applied to the City of Adelaide, where a mobile Unit is at present visiting Port Pirie, and that State Director of Apex Anti-T.B. has given a terrific amount of information to Port Pirie, the reports passed on to us by both Launceston and Goulburn.

We submitted extracts to "The Apexian," for each issue, but we were sorry that space could not be found in the last "Apexian" for the report from this committee on our National Service Scheme. The cost of this National Service Scheme to the Association was only £17/18'-, which account has been forwarded to the National Scheme Treasurer.

We are hopeful of evolving a Scheme whereby all Apexians could be educated for the need to eradicate T.B. from Australia. We are quite confident that the matter in the circulars was not passed on to all members. Until Apexians become T.B. conscious the objects of the National Service Scheme, will be retarded.

We were delighted to read in recent newspaper editions that Dr. Wunderley's recommendation, to the Federal Government, contained the four points of our policy. These are:—

Each State to have a Director of T.B. More X-Ray facilities, etc. More Hospital accommodation. Increased Financial Assistance to sufferers.

In the near future a Conference is being held by the Federal and State Ministers of Health to consider these recommendations.

With regard to the future position, we can see no reason for abandoning this Scheme, until such time as Apex is satisfied that the job is being satisfactorily tackled by the Federal and State Governments.

The Association should write to Dr. Wunderley immediately, congratulating him on his work, and offer all the assistance that Apex can give. In addition we should write from the Association to each State and Federal Minister of Health on similar lines.

If other organisations have been approached to invite their Federal member of Parliament to address them, this can be continued.

In the course of these mass X-Rays, there is no reason why Apex cannot get right behind the authorities in this work,

In the interests of the National Service Scheme, it should be handled by another club for the next twelve months to enable our club, in conjunction with Glenelg, to further the efforts of this campaign in South Australia.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT, ZONE 1, LANGDON PARSONS.

I have pleasure in reporting on the activities of Zone 1 for the past twelve monhts.

Membership.—Membership steadily rose during the year, by about 15 per cent., but there was a falling off in membership in most Clubs at the end of their fiscal year with the retirement of members over 40, many of whom had remained in Apex longer than usual because of the war years. However, Clubs have in most cases made up the lee-way, and are slowly but surely increasing their membership again.

At the start of the year we saw the Chartering of Glenelg, the first suburban Club in the Association. This move has proved most successful, and should be followed up by all capital city Clubs, as the establishment of suburban Clubs is a logical avenue of Apex expansion.

The Melbourne Club is still considering Footscray, whilst Bendigo has been granted leave to investigate St. Arnaud. Efforts are still being made to re-establish the Warrnambool Club. Several Clubs are hopeful of starting new Clubs, but as yet there is nothing concrete to report.

Finance.—Some Clubs have been slow to meet their commitments, but it is recalled that it has been a somewhat difficult year in this direction.

Zone Convention.—The 1947 Zone 1 Convention was held at Bairnsdale on October 11th and 12th. This Convention was attended by 93 Apexians, 14 of the 16 Clubs in the Zone being represented. A goodly amount of work was done, whilst the trip to Lakes Entrance on the Sunday rounded off an excellent weekend.

At the last National Convention, it was decided to split Zone 1 into four districts, and this took effect as from the Zone Convention at Bairnsdale.

The following Zone Board of Control was elected:—Langdon Parsons (Glenelg), President; Alan Boyes (Colac), Vice-President; Gordon Duffield (Adelaide), Secretary-Treasurer; Bill Paterson (Melbourne), Past President; Ron Williams (Geelong), Governor District 1; Ron Shepherd (Horsham), Governor District 2; Bill Norton (Swan Hill), Governor District 3; Harry Williams (Adelaide), Governor District 4.

It was decided that the 1948 Zone Convention be held in Adelaide.

National and Civic Service Work.—Most Clubs are well to the fore in service projects, realising that Apex justifies its existence by "intelligent, aggressive, and serviceable citizenship." When service work fails to be of prime importance to Apex, then—and only then—will Apex be no longer required in the community. Unfortunately in some Clubs, as always, the Zone feels that much more service work could be undertaken.

The National Service Scheme will presumably be the subject of a separate report, but in this Zone it is reported that again, with some Clubs, the response has been good, whilst other Clubs have failed to realise their responsibilities in the Association's National Service Scheme. These are not necessarily Clubs which may be referred to as "weak" Clubs, (as some Clubs are bound to be in these post-war times) but are Clubs which in other ways are not Association-conscious or Association minded.

The response of the Clubs to the National Service Scheme, as well as the International Correspondence Scheme, will be carefully watched in the coming year.

Association Affairs.—Except for a few individual Apexians and Clubs, the majority of members fully appreciate how essential is the Association to the very existence of Apex. Do away with the Association, and Clubs would soon cease to exist as service clubs. At times we shout the words "over-governed," "top heavy," etc., but if Club members fully realised how much work was put in by Zone officials, who continually have to appeal for co-operation and action from many Clubs, they would sing quite a different song.

On behalf of Zone 1 I wish to express our congratulations to Tom Maguire on his election as National President. Tom, following Bill Tresise, has a big job ahead of him, but I feel sure he can count on Zone 1 Clubs helping on all occasions.

The Launceston National Convention saw a complete change in Association Officials. This is probably the first time in the history of Apex. It was at this Convention that Roy Fidge, National Secretary-Treasurer since 1935, retired. The July, 1947 issue of "The Apexian" paid tribute to Roy for the many years of unselfish service given to the Association. Zone 1 cannot say more more to Roy than "Thanks sincerely Roy, for all you have done; we all hope you will be with us for many years to come."

Zone 1 welcomes John Northey as our new National Secretary-Treasurer. John has already shown that his appointment was a wise one, as the change over was carried out very smoothly and almost unnoticed. "The best of luck to you, John."

All Zone members are proud of the leading part being played in Association affairs by many of their members. "The Apexian" is being run most efficiently by Editor Roy Griffiths and his three other members. The I.L. Committee (Langdon Parsons, Chairman); Apex Action Committee (Gordon Murray, Chairman); National Service (Anti-T.B.) Committee (Headed by Don Will-iams as Chairman) are all being handled by Zone 1 members. The War Dependants' Fund Trustees are also Zone 1 members.

Gordon Murray was chosen to represent Apex at the annual meeting of the World Council of Young Men's Service Clubs held at Montreal last year. All reports speak very highly of the excellent impression made

abroad by Gordon, whom we congratulate.

This report would be incomplete without paying tribute to Bill Paterson and Lindsay Cust for the excellent jobs they did as Zone President and Zone Secretary-Treasurer respectively during 1946-47. During their term of office they visited all but three Clubs of the Zone, some of the weaker ones being visited on several occasions.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT ZONE 2, BARNEY GREENWAY.

Membership.—The active membership of the Zone now stands at 494. This shows a slight decrease on the figures in the last Zone Report, and this no doubt is due mainly to a number of members retiring upon reaching the forty mark. The figure does not include Temora Club, as they have not yet received their Charter.

Expansion.—Temora Club have a membership of twenty, and we are looking forward to a solid Club in this town, once they become "fully fledged" Apexians. The new Clubs of the Zone, Bega and Bowral are proving themselves and the service work done by both has been particularly good. District 1 are looking for further opportunities for expansion and Wagga Club are next turning to Griffith. In District 2, Wellington are endeavouring to get a Club going at Mudgee—Bathurst are working on Cowra—Orange Club is lending a hand on both these moves. Nowra is the present centre of interest in District 3, and Wollongong are trying to establish a Club in this town. We are looking forward to further moves in the Zone, and hope that we shall have more to report at the next Zone Convention.

National Service Scheme.—Clubs in this Zone have almost without exception done a lot of work towards the Association's T.B. effort. Particularly I would mention the Benalla Club, for its organisation of the Health Week at Benalla, and the mass X-Ray, Newcastle for its arranging of mass X-Ray of school children. Goulburn and Albury for the organisation of their towns for the visit of the mobile clinic. Many speakers have been invited to attend Dinners of Clubs in the Zone to give information regarding T.B.

Service Generally.—In the Zone President's Report to the Newcastle Convention, October, 1947, a full list of work done by Clubs was given, and this showed that all Clubs had been most active in this sphere, and many notable charities had been assisted, and Apex Clubs are showing their worth to the community. Apexians individually are connected with many local committees and playing their part in civic affairs.

Fellowship.—Much has been done towards fellowship in the Zone by Inter-Club visits—among these being the Bega "Get-together" Weekend on January 26th, when a number of Clubs in District 3 were represented, the visits between Albury Club and Wagga in December last, and particularly the visits between the District 2 Clubs—who keep in close touch with each other—also Bowral, Goulburn, Wollongong-who visit each other for any special functions—congratulations to these Clubs for the splendid contribution they are making to fellow-

District Conventions.—District 1 Convention was held at Wangaratta—District 2 at Orange, and District 3 at Wollongong. All were well attended and much discussion took place. Too much importance cannot be attached to the holding of these District Conventions they give every Apexian an opportunity of voicing his opinions and Clubs of preparing matter for the Zone

Conventions.

Zone 2 Board of Control.—The Board of Control for the present year is as follows:—President, Barney Greenway (Wagga); Immediate Past President, Geoff Dolphin (Benalla); Vice-President, Harry Ling (Wel-lington); Secretary-Treasurer, Ken Duff (Wagga) Governor District 1, Ron Wilkins (Albury); Governor District 2, Reg Baillie (Bathurst); Governor District 3, Ted Sykes (Wollongong).

Those of us who were for Those of us who were fortunate enough to hear him speak of his experiences were more than convinced that he did a splendid job for the Association. Upon his return to Australia he addressed a number of meetings in this Zone, and everyone present

appreciated the opportunity of hearing him.

Appreciation.—My thanks to Geoff Dolphin for assistance in compiling this report. Also, his helpful advice to me when handing over the job—also to members of the Zone Board of Control for promptness in attending to business of the Zone—and in particular to Vice-President Harry Ling. May the year ahead be one of expansion, not only in this Zone but in the whole Association.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT ZONE 3, CLIFF IKIN.

National Convention.—The year just completed has been one of outstanding interest for all Apexians of this Zone inasmuch as the National Convention was held at Launceston last April and for the first time in the history of Apex in Tasmania, we were able to see first hand just what makes Apex tick. The Launceston Club is to be congratulated for their organisation and 100 per cent. fellowship.

Club.—1947 also saw the Burnie Club Burnie chartered, after many months of work by the sponsors, the Launceston Club. Both the Launceston and Hobart Clubs were represented at the Charter Night Dinner held on August 16th. The "baby Club" is doing a grand job and in many respects showing the way to the older Clubs.

Zone Convention.—September, 1947, brought the Zone Convention, and this was held at Launceston, both Hobart and Burnie Clubs being well represented and many matters of interest to Apexians were discussed.

Inter-Club Visits.—Unfortunately none of these were held during the year but what with the National and Zone Conventions, and the Burnie Charter Night, members of the three Clubs were afforded good opportunities of getting to know Apexians throughout the Zone. It is hoped that 1948 will see fellowship weekends reinstated.

Zone Board Visits.—These have been maintained right throughout the year, both the Zone President and Vice-President making between them regular visits to all Clubs.

National Service Scheme.—Anti-T.B. has been receiving the attention of all Clubs, each Club having a T.B. Director and whilst the work has not been outstanding it must be stated that Tasmania is well ahead of most States. There is a static X-Ray unit in Hobart, and one in the process of eventuating in Launceston. The State Government has a mobile X-Ray unit which visits all parts of the Island with the result that many thousands have been X-Rayed. The Launceston Club are represented on the Sanatorium Committee, organised publicity, etc., when the mobile unit visited the city, adopted the Sanatorium as part of their scheme. The Hobart Club torium as part of their scheme. sponsored the erection of an Anti-T.B. stand at the Florence Nightingale Exhibition, were the means of getting a Provisional Tasmanian Anti-T.B. Committee formed but which unfortunately, has not functioned as yet. Burnie Club being new, have little to report on this item yet, but all Clubs have been addressed on T.B., and they are always on the lookout for furthering the campaign against T.B. A number of suggestions have been made to the Government, but owing to the lack of pounds these were more or less discarded.

Membership.—Club membership has been maintained and whilst a certain amount of cleaning up has been done with regard to luke-warm Apexians and casual attenders the membership of each Club remains steady. Particular attention is being paid to the gaining of members from the younger age groups, which augurs well for the future of Apex in Zone 3.

Provisional Membership.—Both Hobart and Launceston Clubs have now adopted this method of obtaining members, but Burnie are refraining from doing so, mainly because the Club contends that the size of the town is against it. inasmuch that everybody knows each other, which precludes them admitting a member provisionally, and then possibly black-balling him when a vote is taken at some later date. Briefly, the principles of provisional membership are:—

- The name of a prospective member is submitted to the Board.
- 2. If considered satisfactory, he is admitted as a provisional member.
- 3. At the expiration of a period of time, (it varies between two and three months), during which the provisional member enjoys full activities of the Club, his name is submitted to a vote of the Club, in accordance with the Constitution.

There are further aspects, but the above is sufficient explanation for this report.

Both Launceston and Hobart Clubs have found this manner of admission particularly satisfactory.

Club Attendances.—Throughout the year Club attendance has kept at a reasonably good level, but it is felt that there is room for improvement. One Club has far too many non-apologies, and this will have to be corrected in accordance with the Constitution. Directors meetings are well attended.

Service — Launceston.—Organising and promoting "Apple Case Cup," and actively assisting at combined fair, proceeds from both events for War Memorial Association. Construction of lockers for Boys' Home.

Bottle Salvage Drive. House to house canvass for Boy Scouts' Association. Active participation in Florence Nightingale Ball, and Exhibition. Donation of games, books, and papers and construction of tables for Homes for Invalids. Active manpower for Eskleigh Home.

Hobart.—Assistance for Florence Nightingale Exhibition. Food for Britain (two house-to-house campaigns of Hobart and suburbs with excellent results). Save the Children Fund (eighty bales of clothing collected). Children's Party to raise funds for Kindergarten Union. Manpower for Miss Tasmania Quest Ball. Christmas Party for Crippled Children. Weekly showing of films to crippled children.

Burnie.—Main service scheme is a children's swim ming pool, at a cost of £2,500—contributing functions, golf gymkhana, Apple Case Cup, boxing and wrestling tournament, cordial and ice cream stall, Food for Britain parcels).

General.—All Clubs have been addressed by a number of outside speakers, on a variety of subjects, and it is particularly pleasing to note the various committees upon which Apex is represented throughout the Zone. Internal Club fellowship has been particularly good, and a number of Apexian and Henpexian functions have been enjoyed.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT ZONE 4, JACK SQUIRES.

The Zone Presidency was taken over from Jack Bennett as from the Zone Convention in October, 1947. Ralph Hoare is continuing in the position of Zone Sec.-Treasurer. In the last year, Jack Bennett and Ralph have brought Zone affairs to a very satisfactory basis. and Zone Board of Control has really functioned. Finance, correspondence and records, are now in a most satisfactory condition. This work is deserving of special mention, as it involves some 2,000 miles of Zone travel, done without cost to the Zone, and a lot of really hard work.

Finance.—Per Capita and Perth Convention Fund payments have been forwarded from all Zone 4 Clubs. Individual Club finance in each case is satisfactory, all Clubs in recent months conducting functions that have helped in meeting the increased expenses.

To assist Clubs last year, and again this year, the Zone has only taken 2/- from Per Capitas. Zone Officials travelling at their own expense have permitted this. Annual Subscriptions are—Perth 35/-, Bunbury £1, and Narrogin £1.

Membership.—Maintained, Perth obtaining a good intake of young new members, to replace the many over-forties going out this year. Narrogin has consolidated with 18 sound Apexians. Perth membership is 55, Bunbury 43, and Narrogin 18.

Service.—National Scheme, Anti-T.B. Clubs have fulfilled the requests of the central committee. Bunbury has continued with X-Ray chest screening. Perth raised over £100 from "Carols by Candlelight" for the T.B. Association. It is considered that Anti-T.B. work in W.A. is in advance of other States. It is also considered that the Anti-T.B. effort by Adelaide central committee is superb. At the National Convention, an effort should be made to bring Club efforts into greater uniformity.

Club Service.—Narrogin provided a Christmas treat for all children in the district. Pauric Lane, Narrogin's President and Club nominee, was narrowly defeated in the Municipal election. Bunbury supported a "Miss Apex" in the Silver Chain Miss Australia Contest, procuring and raffling a new motor car and refrigerator which raised many hundreds of pounds. Bunbury also constructed a large quantity of toys for Sister Kate's Home for Quarter Castes. Perth also assisted Sister Kate's Home several times during the year. Perth Club's "Carols by Candlelight" was a splendid success, Herb Elliott deserving great credit for a magnificent job in which the Club excelled itself. John Darling,

Perth Service Director, successfully ran a large number of smaller service efforts, assisting orphanages, etc. Perth Club organised a British Flood Relief Drive, with worth-while results. All Clubs have done many small service jobs in their respective communities.

Fellowship.—Is of a high order in all Clubs and the Zone itself. Lance Chessell of Perth did a fine job with many successful functions. Bunbury and Narrogin are both noted for their fellowship. Perth Club has visited Narrogin twice, and Bunbury three times. Bunbury has visited Narrogin once, and Narrogin visited Bunbury once. All visits meant travelling over one hundred miles each way. A Zone "Get Together" resulted in twenty Apexians having a grand beach camp over the Australia Day weekend at Ron Palmer's Naval Base Hideout. Very successful Ladies' nights were held by each Club in December.

International Correspondence.—Has at last got under way in Zone 4, and it is hoped the effective exchange of letters will become well established this year.

Clubs—Perth.—Proceeding splendidly; meetings of high standard. A luncheon and dinner meeting is held each month, and informal luncheon gatherings are held. The monthly Board Meeting is most effective, and two younger members are invited on each occasion. The youthfulness of new members has considerably reduced the average age of the Club.

Bunbury.—Monthly Dinner Meeting, with high attendance percentages. Service work is good, and fellowship strong.

Narrogin.—Six months ago this Club appeared likely to lose its Charter, but Jack Bennett, before relinquishing Zone Presidency, had the satisfaction of seeing it firmly re-established. Ray Hall deserves particular credit for realising with other members, the true value of Apex, which resulted in the reduction to the present 18 effective members, and a virtual re-birth. As indicated elsewhere, fine service work has been done. The understanding of Apex is now quite good, and enthusiasm really exists. Like so many other Clubs, the difficulties of obtaining a suitable meeting place and the expense of Apex have been a great worry. Narrogin has achieved note for the hospitality extended visitors and Perth Apexians and Henpexians will long remember the Narrogin Ladies' Night.

New Clubs.—It is expected that Perth's present investigation of Fremantle, Cottesloe, Nedlands suburbs, will soon result in a new Club for Zone 4. Bunbury are proceeding with investigations at Collie. Kalgoorlie could undoubtedly carry a Club, but its distance of 350 miles is too great a hurdle at present.

National Convention.—At Launceston, Perth Club obtained the "Whopper Gavel," but has since had it purloined by Bunbury. Perth Club has Convention arrangements, 1948, well advanced.

Zone Officials Visits.—Mention has been made of the great mileage covered by Jack Bennett and Ralph Hoare last year. Since the change of officials in October, Zone Persident and Past President have twice visited Narrogin. On the last occasion, the use of an aeroplane was necessary to make this possible. Secretary Ralph also attended. Bunbury is being visited this month by President, Past President and Secretary-Treasurer. A Zone Board of Control Meeting was held on January 17th, which fully discussed Zone matters. Talks on the "Ideals," "becoming Association-minded" and "Club minimum requirements" have been given the Clubs.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT ZONE 5, ERIC BYFIELD.

I have pleasure in submitting the following report covering the activities of this Zone to the year ended January, 1948.

My term of office, though comparatively that to date, has been a most happy one due to a fine team of Zone Board members, plus the co-operation from member Clubs.

Membership has remained at a steady level during the year, and although many new members have been admitted, quite a few have reached the retiring age, with consequent loss to Clubs.

Now that the majority of chaps have returned to civilian life, it is likely that the rapid building up of membership will be possible. It therefore behoves all Apexians to encourage the right type of young man to join our Association and so fill the places of the older chaps who represent quite a large percentage of Apex at the present time.

This Zone has a definite objective in hand, to increase the number of Clubs and already much has been achieved in this direction. Coff's Harbour has held its inaugural Dinner Meeting, and hopes to be chartered shortly. Leave to investigate has been received by Moree Club relative to Narrabri.

Bill Yates, Queensland Expansion Committee Chairman reports good work in Bundaberg, where a Club is now meeting. Progress also at Maryborough and Townsville. Lismore Club is working on Murwillumbah.

We of this Zone are very keen to expand Apex, believing it to be the means of lifting us from the rut into which we appear to have drifted since the years of war.

Zone Convention.—The 1947 Zone Convention was held at Grafton on October 4th and 5th, and proved most successful. There was an excellent attendance, and Moree Club were awarded the Zone "Whopper Gavel." Quite an amount of business was dealt with and although one or two items created some spirited debating, the Convention concluded in a round of excellent fellowship and entertainment, capably arranged by the host Club, Grafton.

Service.—The National Service Scheme unfortunately has not received the measure of support desired, due mainly to the belief held by the majority that little of a concrete nature can be achieved at the moment. This fact was more or less confirmed by Dr. Wunderley himself, in correspondence with some Clubs of the Zone. It has therefore, been most difficult to arouse enthusiasm in the majority of Clubs, which is most regrettable in view of the splendid work being done by Don Williams and his Committee.

Individually, most Clubs are carrying out local service schemes with marked success, conspicuous amongst which are:—

Grafton: Compilation of District Guide Book.

Lismore: Play "Black Limelight" for the Kindergarten Fund, and the making and repairing of toys for distribution amongst 350 needy children of the district.

Armidale: Organising and financing the sending of children from the inland for coastal holiday.

Brisbane: Sponsored "Miss Apex" in the Miss Queensland Competition and raised £505/6/2. Assisting the Spring Hill Creche and Kindergarten.

Glen Innes: Town Planning and Civic Service. Assisting local charities.

Toowoomba: Assistance to Legacy. Wood drive for needy families. Christmas toy drive.

Inverell: Food for Britain. Over 800 parcels collected

Appreciation.—I could not let this opportunity pass without extending the Zone's deepest appreciation to Roy Fidge for the years he has given to Apex.—Perhaps the now famous words of Churchill of "So much being owed by so many—to one person" would express in some way what a "tower of strength" Roy has been to our Association We trust you are enjoying a well earned rest, Roy.

Congratulations.—To John Northey on his appointment to the responsible position of National Secretary-Treasurer. We are proud that John is in Zone 5, and feel sure his experience and ability will enable him to become a worthy successor to Roy Fidge.

We extend our congratulations to Gordon Murray on his very able representation of Apex at the World Council Meeting. I would like to place on record the feeling existing in this Zone that more Clubs should have the opportunity of hearing personally from our representative after his return from overseas. It is suggested that the facilities and opportunity should be

provided for the representative to visit Clubs, in order to convey first hand to Apexians what has been achieved from these visits overseas.

By this method, I feel sure members would gain a better appreciation of the value that is obtained from the money they are asked to contribute to finance these trips.

Our thanks and appreciation go to Gordon Allen of the Brisbane Club for his contribution to Apex over the past year. Gordon has found it necessary to resign from active participation in Zone affairs owing to personal reasons. We trust, Gordon, you will yet be able to make available your experience and guidance to the Brisbane Club.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the past Zone Officials for their work in bringing the Zone to its present high level, and trust the present Board will carry on to a similar success.

Jack Bennett was nominated and duly elected.

TIME FOR SPEAKING

It was decided that the mover of a motion be allowed 4 minutes, two minutes be allowed for other speakers, and two minutes for the mover to reply. Moved Gordon Duffield, seconded Alan Boyes.

MINUTES OF LAST NATIONAL CONVENTION

Minutes of the last National Convention held at Launceston were taken as read. Moved Gordon Duffield, seconded Leo Callanan.

NATIONAL PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This was taken as read. Moved Ralph Hoare, seconded Mac Lamb.

REPORT, SECRETARY-TREASURER.

It was resolved that the Report of the National Secretary-Treasurer be taken as read.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial statements were adopted on the motion lac Lamb. John Northey explained that the sum of Mac Lamb. of £401 showing as deficiency, consisted of Per Capita Fees for the year ended 31st January, 1948, not paid. Since the report was compiled, the position had almost been rectified.

Frank Prichard raised the point as to how many clubs had not paid their contributions to the Perth Fund. It was moved by Paul Jones and seconded by Vautin Andrews that the names of these Clubs should be dis-Carried.

John Northey stated that the Clubs concerned were as follows:-

Paul Jones on behalf of Zone 3, withdrew their nomination of Wagga Club.

Ross Feil nominated Toowoomba. Seconded Col Billard. Vautin Andrews nominated Geelong as National Convention City, venue of World Council Meeting. Seconded Gordon Duffield.

Discussion ensued as to the merits of these two cities. In view of the fact that 1948 Convention was being held in Perth it was desirable that 1949 Convention should be held in a more central position, especially as Geelong was the home of the movement, and World Council Meeting would probably be held in that city in 1949.

Ross Feil withdrew nomination of Toowoomba.

Moved Vautin Andrews that 1949 Convention should be held in Geelong. Seconded Rod McLennan. Carried.

In view of selection of Geelong, Convention was advised that Geelong would also be the venue of the 1949 World Council Meeting, by virtue of National Council decision.

CONVENTION GREETINGS.

At this stage John Northey read congratulatory telegrams received from 20-30 of U.S.A., Apex Clubs

and individual Apexians.

Herb Elliott moved and Ralph Hoare seconded that as soon as possible National Council send cables to organisations overseas advising that Geelong has been selected as next World Council Meeting place and extending greetings to them. Carried.

APPOINTMENT OF ASSOCIATION LIFE GOVERNORS.

No applications received.

APEX ACTION REPORT

This matter was deferred until Sunday for further consideration of Pre-Convention Committee recommendations. (On motion of Mac Lamb and Herb Elliott).

INTERNATIONAL LIAISON.

This matter was also deferred until Sunday. Motion of Lindsay Cust and Gordon Duffield. Carried.

"THE APEXIAN"

(a) The Report and Financial Statements were presented by Col Bowen. Moved by Vautin Andrews and seconded Merv. Campbell that these be adopted. Carried.

(b) General Recommendations. Discussion ensued Ross Feil suggested that space should be devoted to more important matters and ignore minor social matters. Mac Lamb maintained if full account of business matters appeared in "Apexian" members would have better appreciation of agenda items. Ralph Hoare was in accord with Mac Lamb's remarks. Tom Maguire stated that thanks were due to all members responsible for production of "The Apexian."

It was moved by Royce Neville and seconded by Paul Jones that zones investigate possibility of sponsoring contract advertising in "The Apexian" by national advertisers located within zones and report results to Rusiness Manager of "The Apexian" Medicar withdrawn

Business Manager of "The Apexian." Motion withdrawn. Col Bowen explained that necessary economies did

not allow such advertising.

Moved Herb Elliott and seconded Ralph Hoare that all clubs be called upon to order at least one copy for each member of club, as required by the Constitution. Carried.

SERVICES LIAISON.

(a) Report of Committee and Statements regarding present position of the Fund were read.

Moved by Mac Lamb and seconded by Merv. Campbell that these be adopted. Carried.

(b) Future policy with respect to this fund.

Herb Elliott moved that consideration be given by the services liaison committee to the allocation of this Fund to help in the after treatment of tubercular exservicemen. Discussion ensued, and in view of previous decisions it was decided that nothing could be done at the present time. Motion withdrawn.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEMES.

(a) Report of the Association Anti-T.B. Committee, appointed by the 1947 National Convention at Launceston was read.

Ralph Hoare moved and Frank Prichard seconded the adoption of the Report and wished to record thanks to the Adelaide Club for the excellent work they had done. Carried.

Bill Tresise added his praise of the outstanding effort by the Adelaide Club.

(b) Future activity with regard to this scheme. Gordon Duffield moved National Service Scheme be carried on for another twelve months with consideration to new avenues in the scheme.

Motion withdrawn in view of the fact that the scheme was originally undertaken for three years, and such motion was therefore unnecessaray.

The Pre-Convention Committee recommended that the following be passed on to incoming National T.B. Committee for consideration and action if thought necessary:—

- 1. That an Annual nation-wide Health Week be held.
 - 2. That the publicity campaign be continued. 3. Sanatoria for children be an objective.
 - Sanatoria for children be an objective.
 Support be given Christmas seal appeals.
- 5. That an effort be made to select in future a National Service scheme which will enlist the full support of all clubs.

The Pre-Convention Committee recommended that the Association support the principle of eventual compulsory diagnosis and treatment for T.B.

Moved Gordon Duffield and seconded Leo Callanan that these recommendations be passed on to the incoming Anti-T.B. Committee. Carried.

Mac Lamb moved an amendment—in effect let clubs carry on with Anti-T.B. campaign if they so desired but if enthusiasm lagging to sponsor an alternative scheme. Col Billard seconded amendment. Being unconstitutional, the amendment lapsed.

Gordon Duffield moved that the Association of Apex Clubs be in favour of the principle of eventual compulsory X-Ray or other tests for the diagnosis and treatment of Tuberculosis. Seconded Vautin Andrews. Carried.

The word "compulsory" caused a great deal of discussion but it was finally decided that the inclusion of the word "eventual" modified compulsion.

(c) Following upon Pre-Convention Committee consideration of future National Service Scheme.

Gordon Duffield moved that the following Service Schemes be forwarded to Apex Action for consideration as Service Schemes for Clubs:—

1. Care of Spastic Children.

2. Extension of the Far West Scheme in N.S.W.

3. Food for Britain.

4. Citizenship. Apex should sponsor a prize to be given to the winner of Essay Competition written by Schoolboys on Citizenship.

Seconded Lindsay Cust. Carried.

Further, Gordon Duffield recommended that Apex assist with the absorption of immigrants into the Australian way of life. Seconded Vautin Andrews.

Tom Miller spoke in favour of this proposal and suggested writing letters and mixing with them. Carried.

Gordon Duffield suggested that another club may conduct the National Service Scheme during the next twelve months, Adelaide Club desires to concentrate fully on further efforts in South Australia.

Vautin Andrews moved appointment of a Club to conduct the Anti-T.B. Scheme be left to National Council, Col Billard seconded. Carried,

It was resolved that:-

Clubs be asked to nominate suggestions for future National Service Schemes to Zone Conventions, and that the Constitution be strictly adhered to with regard to future schemes.

APEX ACTION.

- (a) Gordon Murray's Report was adopted on the motion of Mac Lamb and Merv. Campbell.
- (b) Vautin Andrews nominated Gordon Murray as Chairman Apex Action Committee for 1948-49 with power to select own committee. This nomination was seconded by Lindsay Cust.

Ralph Hoare nominated Herb Elliott. Herb Elliott withdrew. Gordon was appointed and received congratulations.

(c) Discussion of future Apex Action policy and activity.

A Committee consisting of the following Apexians was appointed to discuss matter and submit report later to Convention:-

Andrews, Sides, Morrison, Driscoll, Elliott.

Lindsay Cust asked "Are we associated with Communism?" Tom Maguire answered, "Definitely No."

It was moved by Mac Lamb and seconded by Len Mathews that Apex Action Committee advocate to Clubs that they strive to increase membership by obtaining it from a greater cross section of the community and by encouraging entry of a greater number of members close to the minimum age of 18 years. Carried.

It was also moved by Mac Lamb and seconded by Merv. Campbell that each Club appoint one member to maintain contact with Apex Action Committee and direct action within the Club. Carried.

INTERNATIONAL LIAISON.

(a) Report of Chairman, Langdon Parsons was read. It was moved by Tom Miller and seconded by Alan Boyes that this be adopted.

John Northey suggested that a word of praise was due to Langdon Parsons for the good work carried out.

(b) Appointment of Chairman and Committee for the year 1948-49.

Ralph Hoare nominated Herb Elliott which nomination was seconded by Chas. Drynan (delegate substitution for Herb Elliott).

Vautin Andrews nominated Langdon Parsons for re-appointment. Seconded Gordon Duffield.

Ralph Hoare said he thought it advisable that Elliott's nomination be withdrawn.

Langdon Parsons was elected.

(c) It was moved by Frank Prichard and seconded by Mac Lamb that Gordon Murray's Report of World Council of Young Men's Service Clubs Conference at Carried. Montreal, Canada, be adopted.

(d) Direction for Delegate to the 1948 meeting of

the World Council, at Hastings, England, May, 1948.

Jack Squires mentioned that out of the last meeting there was the institution of the Food for Britain Scheme from Canada and America. Our delegate should investigate whether something more can come out of International relationship.

(e) Appointment of Delegates for Geelong Meeting of the World Council.

It was moved by Vautin Andrews and seconded by Mac Lamb that the National President be one of the delegates and that the other delegate be elected by National Council. Carried

The National President informed Convention that Gordon Hare had been appointed a Delegate to the 1948 World Council, Hastings, England, without expenses. Gordon was at present en route England.

EXPANSION OF APEX.

Frank Prichard, on behalf of Gordon Denney, Chairman, presented report of Committee investigating expansion to New Zealand.

It would appear from this report that very little can be done in regard to expansion of Apex in New Zealand, as the activities of the Junior Chamber of Commerce would appear to run along parallel lines. It was decided to maintain the committee pending further developments.

Alan Boyes moved and Frank Prichard seconded that a National Committee be set up to superintend expansion within Australia and that Committees be formed for such purpose in each Zone. Carried.

Nominations were called and Col Billard nominated Bill Yates. Seconded Mac Lamb.

Ralph Hoare nominated Herb Elliott. Seconded Tcd Sykes. Vote taken—Bill Yates appointed Chairman.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Zone 3.—"That,in view of the prior payment of each year's subscription to "The Apexian" as directed by the Constitution (P. 24, Section 6) "The Apexian" might well be distributed direct from the "The Apexian" office, instead of being despatched in bulk to Clubs for distribution.

Gordon Murray spoke on the matter, pointing out the difficulties which would face "The Apexian" manage-ment were such a scheme adopted. There was no further discussion, and it was therefore decided that the present method of distribution remain unaltered

Zone 3.-Model By-laws, Art. 5, Sec. 2, P. 44 "That the Board of Directors shall consist of a minimum of eight members, and a maximum of twelve members, to be elected in the manner prescribed by the By-laws" (Note: It is assumed that the portion of this Section referring to executive shall remain unchanged).

Paul Jones recommended that this be adopted. Seconded Royce Neville. After long discussion and voting, the National President declared Motion lost.

Zone 5 .- "That apart from the normal Per Capita Fees, no additional levies or contributions be called for by National Convention or by National Council, unless the proposed levies or contributions have been submitted to all Clubs previously, and agreed upon by a majority of Clubs.'

Merv. Campbell recommended that this be adopted. Seconded Vautin Andrews.

After discussion and voting, the National President declared Motion lost.

Zone 1.—"That any future levies or increase in Per Capita fees decided upon by a National Convention be referred to all chartered Clubs for voting by a threequarters majority of those Clubs to be a three-quarters majority of the Directors of each Club."

Alan Boyes recommended that this be adopted. Seconded Mac Lamb. After voting, National President declared the motion lost.

Zone 3.—Model By-Laws, Art. 3, Sec. 2, P. 43. "That the word 'trade' be added to this section, which would then read—'engaged in any worthy recognised profession, trade, or business, shall be eligible for active membership." membership'." After discussion, this was withdrawn.

Zone 4.—Ralph Hoare moved and Herb Elliott seconded, "That the National President and Zone Presidents should henceforth be selected one year prior to assuming office. Lindsay Cust supported the motion.

Vautin Andrews opposed, mentioning that it would in effect mean that a man had to be prepared to carry on for five years if selected for National Presidency, which was not necessarily possible.

Mac Lamb supported the motion.

The following amendment was moved by Gordon

Duffield and seconded by Alan Boyes:—
"That the words 'National President' should be deleted from the motion, in other words, that the motion should apply to Zone Presidents only."

The Amendment was lost, and the Motion carried, it being understood that the Motion should be discussed by all Zone Conventions, and decisions brought before the 1949 National Convention.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND GENERAL.

Moved Ralph Hoare, seconded Vautin Andrews, "That this National Convention formally adopt the 1947 revised Constitution as the Constitution of the Association of Apex Clubs." Carried.

Geelong Club.—The Geelong Club makes formal application for the allocation of the 1949 World Council Meeting (Easter) to Geelong, feeling that as the foundation Club of the Association, the allocation referred to is merited.

It was pointed out that the matter had been dealt with previously, when Nat. Council decided that in the event of Geelong being selected for the 1949 Nat. Convention, the World Council Meeting be held there also.

Zone 5.—"That Conventions, whether National, Zone, or District, be primarily devoted to the full and detailed discussion of Apex business, so as to prevent the unseemly haste which has so far characterised past Conventions, and that so far as delegates are concerned, social activities take a minor place."

Moved Ross Feil, seconded Herb Elliott. Carried.

Zone. 3.—"That consideration be given to the presentation of a lapel badge in a silver or gold colour to Life Members of a Club."

Moved Paul Jones, seconded Royce Neville, "That Zone Conventions express an opinion on this matter, and forward their views and decisions to the 1949 National Convention." Carried.

Moved Vautin Andrews, seconded Ralph Hoare, "That consideration be given to a change in colour of the present lapel badge for active and life members." Carried.

"That the attention of the Expansion Committee be drawn to the advisability of establishing Clubs in the suburbs of all Capital Cities, and to other cities where the population would warrant the establishment of additional Clubs."

Moved Col Billard, seconded Mac Lamb. Carried

Zone 3.—Moved Paul Jones, seconded Royce Neville, "That the Pre-School Kindergarten Movement, which is supported by many Clubs in the Association, be officially put before all Clubs as suitable for local Service Schemes, with a view to securing ultimate Government control of the Pre-School Kindergarten Organisation." Carried.

Moved Alan Boyes, seconded Rod McLennan, "That at Zone Conventions there should be two Official Delegates from each Club, and that the Club should receive travelling expenses for one Official Delegate only."

Amendment, moved Herb Elliott, seconded Jack Squires, "That Clubs be recommended to give consideration to the appointments of more Delegates to Zone Conventions, having in mind the nominal number of Delegates at present operative in small Zones, such considerations to be brought to Zone Conventions, and then to National Convention." Amendment carried, and adopted as the motion.

Moved Alan Boyes, seconded Ross Feil, "That in view of the lack of efficiency of some Club Officials, revealed by the National Secretary-Treasurer in recent circulars, it is recommended that the National Secretary-Treasurer or Zone Secretary-Treasurer inform the District Governor with details, and ask for immediate action. In the event of the District Governor being unable to rectify the position, he should notify the Zone President, so as to report to the National Council for appropriate action." Carried.

Moved Alan Boyes, second Ross Feil, "That Zones should be divided into more Districts where necessary." Carried.

Alan Boyes moved, Leo Callanan seconded, "That each Club be provided with a copy of John Northey's chart illustrating the set-up of the Association, and Zone and District areas." Carried.

"The Apexian."—Col Bowen asked that any one at Convention who has subject matter for print, should forward it to the Editor, and Vautin Andrews asked

that in the event of any errors being found in the publication, the Editor be advised.

Frank Prichard mentioned that he thought it wise for Clubs to mention dates of meeting, rather than merely day of meeting in the Club Directory, e.g., alternate Thursdays as from 22/4/48.

It was resolved that Zones should forward to "The Apexian a full report of business transacted at Zone Conventions, together with details of matters tabled, whether carried or lost, together with a digest of important discussions.

Moved Lindsay Cuts, seconded Frank Prichard, "That at future National Conventions the responsibility of the Pre-Convention Committee Chairmen be to convey to Convention the merits and demerits of subject matter, and to prepare a concisely worded motion conveying the majority decision of the Committee members." Carried.

Moved Lindsay Cust, seconded Herb Elliott, "That this Annual Convention reaffirms its deep loyalty to the King and Empire, that it also deplores un-Australian and un-British activities, and that it pledges wholehearted support to the preservation of democracy throughout the world."

Moved Frank Prichard, seconded Col Billard, "That National Council consider the re-zoning of the whole of the Association." Carried.

Alan Boyes raised the matter of the awarding and holding of the Association's whopper Gavel. He asked that National Council formulate a set of rules covering the gavel.

Gordon Duffield mentioned the difficulties being experienced in obtaining suitable films for showing by Clubs in children's homes and similar institutions.

Moved Lindsay Cust, seconded Gordon Duffield, "That Apex Action circularise Clubs in an endeavour to find out who has films available for 16m.m. Talkie Projectors, with the object of forming a library of films." Carried.

The matter of individual Club representation at National Conventions was discussed, it being suggested that consideration be given to a scheme whereby each Club be represented by a delegate; Clubs are asked to consider this matter, and to bring their views forward to Zone Conventions.

Harry Ling spoke on behalf of Wellington Apexians, expressing appreciation to Perth Club for the hospitality extended, and announcing the intention of the Wellington Club to present Perth Club with a new gavel for use on future occasions. Jack Squires expressed thanks on behalf of Perth Clubs. Herb Elliott thanked all who helped to make Convention such a success.

Mac Lamb moved a hearty vote of thanks and appreciation to the Perth Club for the able manner in which they had organised and carried out the Convention arrangements, the motion being duly seconded and carried.

Herb Elliot moved, Vautin Andrews seconded, sincere thanks and congratulations to National President Tom Maguire for the able and impartial manner in which he had conducted the whole of the Convention proceedings. Acclamation.

Paul Jones moved, Mac Lamb seconded, a vote of thanks to John Northey for the great work he is doing. Acclamation. John Northey replied.

Vautin Andrews invited all present to Geelong for the 1949 National Convention.

Bill Tresise thanked the Perth Ladies' Committee for the excellent work they had done. Acclamation.

Leo Callanan expressed thanks to the stenographer.

Convention closed at 11 a.m.

Planning The 14th National Convention

A Digest of the Report to National Council by Bill Powell.

- 1. Planning the Fourteenth National Convention began that day in Launceston, ideas as they evolved being thrown to club members for criticism and suggestions.
- 2. Perth Club appointed a committee of six in May, 1947. The members of this committee were chosen on the following grounds:—(a) had previously attended a National Convention; (b) reliability; (c) organising ability.
- 3. Committee met monthly and considered all possibilities so a broad plan had been decided upon six months beforehand.
- 4. The new Club President appointed a chairman, not already on the committee. Later, a treasurer was appointed.

5. Estimating there would be about 70 visitors from the Eastern States plus 50 or so from our own Zone, hotel accommodation was secured for 150 about six months beforehand. (We overbooked, as it is easier to cancel than to secure additional accommodation)

to cancel than to secure additional accommodation).
6. The Government Tourist Bureau provided all stationery and envelopes free. Every one of the 1,500 members received an individual invitation to National Convention. Bundles of invitations together with sufficient leaflets and brochures on W.A. were sent to each club Secretary, with a covering letter asking for his co-operation in distributing them to members.

7. In December a circular was sent to members of National Council, Club Secretaries, Starters and Possible Starters giving further information. It was felt that it was essential to maintain personal contact with the Starters and possible Starters.

8. A panic letter was sent in January in order to force the chaps to make up their minds. Enclosed was a form to fill in and return, and this form had one deficiency, it should also have asked if the sender was an official delegate.

9. Our last letter was sent three weeks before the Convention, giving further details and indicating to the recipient when and how we were expecting him. It also asked for the Convention Subscription of £3, as it was hoped to prevent the fiasco of about 70 chaps trying to pay their dues at the one time. All members of this Zone who were attending the Convention had paid their dues a fortnight or so before the show began.

10. Sub-Committees: A small sub-committee was appointed to handle each separate function, and in order to have direct liaison one member of the general committee was appointed as chairman of each sub-committee.

11. The sub-committees met separately and reported back through their chairman to the General Committee.

12. **Budget**. The Chairman, two joint-secretaries and the treasurer constituted an Executive and Finance Committee to prepare a budget.

Committee to prepare a budget.

13. A full statement of the job of each subcommittee and the exact amounts allotted for the several items of their budgets was given to each chairman with instructions that the money allotted could not be altered without reference to the Finance Committee, although modifications within the budget were permissable.

14. The Executive Committee also correlated all the times and indicated to the sub-committees that they must adhere to those set down.

15. Reception Committee was appointed from those who had attended one or more National Conventions so

that they would know personally most of the visitors.

16. Telegrams were sent to individuals, or to the senior Apexian of a group arriving together extending welcome greetings and advising them of our intention to meet them.

17. Those who were met at the Airport were allowed to proceed to the city by Airways transport, and from the City terminal they were taken in members'

cars to their hotels. A vase of flowers with a personal note of welcome awaited each Henpexian in her room.

18. Those arriving by train were difficult to find, and it is suggested that a large Apex sign held above the heads of the crowd together with a note on the last circular letter to visitors telling them of of the arrangement would have solved this problem.

19. Farewells. It was considered essential to

farewell each visitor as well as welcome him.

20. Convention Dinner was for Apexians only as the keynote was fellowship—there were no visitors from kindred organisations.

21. A Ladies' Sub-Committee was formed to help, and took complete charge of the Henpexians' Dinner and gave help and advice when asked.

gave help and advice when asked.

22. The Ladies' Committee circularised all Henpexians of the Host Club asking for their support, and also wrote individual letters to visiting Henpexians.

23. Reasonable local publicity was obtained in the local newspapers and over the radio. Broadcasts included:—(a) build-up news and talks prior to the Convention; (b) interviews with National President, etc.; (c) Official opening of Convention.

24. The Chairman of the General Committee was left free of working programme details during the Convention. (It would also be advisable for the secretary

to be so relieved).

25. Besides sub-committees to handle each of the social functions, the following were the other sub-committees:—Reception, Souvenir Programme, Billeting (joint secretaries), Transport, Convention Meetings, South West Tour, Bunbury week-end.

26. We tactfully suggested that visitors make their own travel arrangements to and from the Convention, at the same time offering help when needed. It is recommended that future committees do the same.

27. We aimed to make the keynote of the Convention a personal one, and our methods of reception, etc., were all planned to produce this effect. An endeavour was made to see that each visitor was invited to a meal in the home of one of our members on at least one occasion.

28. Our own club members were kept well informed of all the latest developments in Club Dinner notices

and reports at each club meeting.

29. Convention Dance. The partners provided for the visitors were chosen in such a way that they knew one another rather than that they knew Henpexians. There were about 130 Apexians and about 90 ladies in attendance, and the ratio seemed quite satisfactory.

30. At all functions it is essential at least one member of a sub-committee go on ahead to see arrange-

ments are in order.

31. Convention Business. To allow of possible extension of the business time the entertainment was kept flexible to allow of expansion or otherwise, of the business programme.

32. It is necessary that the shorthand typiste is available for any extension of business sessions, that arrangements are made for her lunch and an invitation

sent for the Henpexians Dinner and Dance.

33. We also suggest that it be a standard practice to appoint one of the floor members who knows of those attending the Convention, to sit beside the shorthand-typiste to help with names, etc.


34. Acting on the suggestion of the National President, the Zone Presidents were seated on either

side of him during the business sessions.

35. The Wool Exchange proved an admirable type of room for the actual Convention.

36. Fellowship was helped by seeing that everyone wore a badge. Our Club Sergeant-at-Arms was supplied with bundles of badges, pins and a fountain pen, thus everyone without a badge was immediately presented with one.

THE 1949 CONVENTION

Although the Perth Convention is just over, as president of Geelong Club I want to issue an early invitation to the 1949 National Convention, which will be preceded by the meeting in our city of the World Council of Young Men's Service Clubs.

From the point of view of numbers, this should be the biggest Apex show ever. Many of those who make it their business to attend conventions regularly but found the distance to Perth too great will start planning now for Easter 1949. And that's just what we want you to do: decide now to come to Geelong, and in the next 12 months work out how it can be done. I can assure you all that a great welcome awaits you.

One high-ranking national official confessed to me at Perth that you don't get the real spirit of Apex until you have visited the home of the movement. A lot of chaps feel this, and it will spur them on to make a special effort to come.

In a city of 55,000 inhabitants, accommodation will be the big problem, especially as fellows from all over the Commonwealth have already indicated that they'll be definite "starters." It may be necessary for us to have the final acceptances by Christmas, because we may be unable to arrange accommodation for those who leave it too late.

A word to club secretaries: Don't be surprised if within the next few months you receive our first convention circular. We in Geelong have a huge task ahead of us, but you can help materially if you give prompt attention to the circulars which will issue from here between now and next Easter.

I repeat: start planning now to visit "Mecca" in 1949. We guarantee it will be "the best convention since Perth."
